Vicar's Letter

Dear Friends and Neighbours,

A 1024MB Memory Card walks into a bar. The Memory Card spots a piano, sits down at it and starts playing some incredible music. After a number of songs, the Memory Card gets up and the bar goes wild with cheers and applause. The bar owner was incredibly impressed and runs up to the Memory Card and says, "Buddy, you were INCREDIBLE! If you come back tomorrow, I'll split the night's takings with you!" "No can do..." says the Memory Card. "I'm limited to one gig!!!" A man and his family walk into the same bar. The man's youngest child sees a Native American sitting under a sign stating "World's longest memory". The child walks up to the man and decides to see if what the sign says is true. The child asks, "What did you have for breakfast 30 years ago?" The Native American states, "eggs." The child states that the native could have just made that up, and then leaves. Years later, when the child returns with his own family, he sees the same native at the bar. Walking up to the old man man, and using the native american word for hello, he says "how?!" The Native replies, "scrambled!!!" Remembering is something that easily escapes so many of us when we are in front of an examination paper, and is all too present when we have done something wrong. While people with good memories are not well liked in casinos, the stories of our past can help to stop us from repeating some of its mistakes in the future.

The son of the train driver that died as his train was derailed, was eventually healed of the trauma of losing his father, by sitting in his father's drivers seat and holding the levers that his father would have held when the accident took place. Self talk is a technique used across the sporting spectrum and is based on the knowledge that we become what we spend our time thinking about. Getting painful memories into a better place can help us all. Because there is no difference between bearing a grudge or being a racist, discrimination of any kind only serves to diminish both ourselves as well as the person we are either targeting or ignoring. Many of us have been encouraged to remember a line or two from our Bibles. Both to help us through a difficult patch, and to help us as we give thanks when things have gone well. It's the same Good Book that provides us with the memory of God's promises for our ultimate destiny. People may have laughed as they gathered around the graves of Micah and Isaiah, saying 'So, where is your Messiah now!' But an old couple called Simeon and Anna remembered God's promises and stuck with them. They were rewarded not only with meeting Jesus, but by holding in their arms the Creator of the Universe in the form of a child.

Precisely because His much promised first arrival came true we can also rely on the promises that His second coming will happen too. Like those who have prepared for anything, from war to the birth of a child, we too are called to get ready. We do so by care and hospitality, kindness and encouragement. The season of Remembrance is an opportunity to give thanks for the sacrifice made by others for the peace and the stability that we enjoy today. Helping those who have survived conflict also honours the memories of those who didn't. We always feel better when we are met with appreciation if not thanks, and in the same way God wants us to be as welcoming and hospitable, especially with those we disagree with, as we would wish Him to be with us when we He comes again. It's then that we discover our True Life in God.

The walk is almost 8 miles long and is highly recommended if you haven't done it



before. The walk is also included within the "Wanborough Circular Walks" book walk, number 10, for those who have purchased it. The next organised walk will be in the spring, so keep an eye out for details.

Bus Service No 47 to Sainsbury's

Did you know that you can get bus 47 to Sainsbury's in Stratton? Bus 47 leaves at 14.25 each day (Monday to Saturday) from the Church Road bus stop, opposite the top of Kite Hill (shown as Calley Arms on the bus timetable), and arrives at Sainsbury's in Stratton at 14.55. The return journey leaves at 16.00 giving you approximately 1 hour to shop, before arriving back at Church Road at 16.27.

The service uses a 16 seat mini-bus and is funded by West Berkshire Council. We are lucky to have the service running through the village to help complement the current limited service to Swindon.

Hooper's Field Expansion Project

At the last Parish Council meeting on 23 September, Parish Council agreed a detailed specification to go out to tender for architectural drawings for the expansion and improvement of Hooper's Field. The aim is to discuss all tenders received at the next meeting on 28 October. Once detailed plans have been drawn up, Parish Council will hold a consultation with residents, before submitting an application for planning approval. More details to follow.

DEFRIBILLATOR FAMILIARISATION SESSION

A Cardiac Arrest Response Seminar has been arranged on Tuesday 29 October 2019 at 6pm in the Village Hall and all residents are welcome to attend. The Community Heartbeat Trust will be demonstrating the use of defibrillators and explaining how the equipment works and its benefits to the community in saving precious minutes in the treatment of sudden cardiac arrest. The more people that know how to use the portable defibrillator installed in the Village, the more chance there is of saving the life of a victim of Sudden Cardiac Arrest. No special skills are required, just your willingness to play an important role in the event of a medical emergency.

Everyone is welcome to attend, so please come and join us.

COMMEMORATIVE OAK TREE

Unfortunately, the oak tree that was planted in the playing field earlier this year to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the end of WW1 has died. A replacement tree has been ordered and should be delivered and planted in early December.

KEVIN MCNAMARA – Interim Chief Executive, Great Western Hospital

Kevin McNamara attended the October Parish Council meeting to give a verbal update on progress that has been made and the plans currently being discussed for the future. He started his presentation by sharing a chart that showed the different areas that are inspected by the Quality Care Commission and where individual areas ratings had improved from 'requires improvement' in 2016 to 'good' in 2018. The overall rating remains as 'requires improvement' so there is still work to be done. Accident & Emergency is still an area of concern, as it was designed to support 48,000 attendances per year when it first opened in 2002, and figures for 2018/19 show that there were around 90,000. This was not helped by the issues at the GP practices that were administered by IMH, as that had created a 20% increase in visits to GWH from the affected practices, with a total of 30,000 patients registered.

The hospital has recently been awarded £30m from the Treasury, which is effectively an loan as it has conditions attached to it, for improvements. Plans for the future include an Integrated Front Door bringing together the Emergency Department and Urgent Care Centre as a more joined up environment for people arriving to hospital as walk-ins or via ambulance. This integration will improve patient flow and help to reduce wait times. Integrated Rehabilitation Services – 5.5 hectares of land to be purchased for expansion and development of a unit designed to offer intensive rehabilitation to patients. that integrates services across primary, secondary and community care. Also a new Private Patient Facility – a stand-alone unit for privatised, personal care to patients which will allow beds in the main hospital to be freed for NHS patients. The current private patient unit contributes £1.2m to hospital funds which is a significant amount.

The next meeting of Liddington Parish Council will be held on Wednesday 6 November 2019, at 7pm in the Village Hall. All residents are more than welcome to attend.

Ridgeway meetings give me 2 hours each month when I can talk to you personally. We genuinely get to have a proper chat! This has taken me back to the time when spending time with residents and listening was an important part of Village meetings.

Over 40 residents attended my September meetings.

RIDGEWAY WARD - The Big Issues of the moment:

RURAL SUPERFAST BROADBAND: We are having increasing issues with 4G Broadband and I have been having regular meetings with UK Broadband (now Three). Complaints have come from Wanborough, Bishopstone, Wroughton, Chiseldon and beyond. I have a meeting tomorrow with Three (as I write this, to find solutions).

As a champion of getting this system going I'm personally sad that residents are having issues (I've been a user since 2014) and I want to see the existing system fit for purpose (as residents across all of the rural areas have recognised my leadership on 4G, they are also asking me to lead on future options and I want to ensure I've covered and future proofed alternatives. I'm also talking to BT and will update you via Facebook and my website in the next couple of weeks on progress.

TREE PLANTING at Pack Hill – 5 November: We will be planting the final 1,000 trees at the SBC owned land at Pack Hill with Woodland Trust and Nationwide staff. I've again invited Wanborough Primary School who will be sending a class. **I need to know if you would like to come so that I can arrange meeting times and staff. Please call or email me before the 5th (790814)**

FLOODING: In the absence of local flood group meetings and as the Cabinet Member responsible I've contacted the **Environment Agency** to arrange a meeting to discuss flooding and land-owner's responsibilities. I'm arranging a meeting at the Civic Offices in late November together with the **Wanborough Anti Flood Group** to try to get things back on track. **I will update on Facebook and my website.**

HIGHWAYS: It would really help me going forward if you could let me know what your priorities are – is it speeding, rat running, visibility or parking?

Separately I will be able to bring forward some schemes soon to start to deal with current and future 'rat running' which would slow traffic through our villages. Once I have draft plans I will organise an event to share what's being considered.

I've had positive site meetings with Parish Councillors, residents and Highways in Bishopstone & Liddington and some improvements they want are likely to happen.

Wanborough PTA News

As the evenings draw in, the rain pours, and thoughts turn to pumpkins, ghosts and witches the PTA held their AGM. We were pleased to see so many new members sign up to join the PTA for what looks to be a fun filled year of community fund raising.

Looking back at the last academic year we reflected on the fabulous range of events held that resulted in a massive £13,487 being raised for the children and school. A few of the highlights include Discos & Film nights £2,500; Quiz night £1,200; Fete & Sports day £4,000; May Day Fayre £2,000 and Christmas cards and Tea Towels £1,000.

Mr Drury thanked the PTA, pupils, teachers and parents for their fantastic support and contribution towards the school. He also gave an update on the conservatory replacement and plans for equipping and using the new space.

We also took the opportunity to thank every single person who attended one of our events, had a drink, volunteered their time, made a donation, ate a hot dog, had their face-painted etc., Mark Woodman and the PTA committee (especially our stalwarts who stood down after multiple years of service), all the fabulous businesses for their fete donations, especially Atwell Martin, Richard James, Trevor Hawkesford & Primary Homes & Lettings for their generosity and finally Nationwide & Vodafone for £1,200 in matched funding donations.

Our goal for the year is to raise £10,000 to support the school in purchasing "new tech" especially new laptops and iPads. Look out for news about the current IT provision and why this ambition is important, along with details of donations we've already made to the school in next month's update.

Our first event of the year will be the Key Stage 1 disco, on Friday 22 November. An opportunity for the very youngest in the school to don their best party clothes, and boogie on the dance floor. Importantly it's a fantastic opportunity to welcome the new parents to the Wanborough School community and create lasting memories for the children.

To cap it all, was a chance to sample their Cider & Perry – Apples and Pears. The weather was autumnal but as we sat on the farmhouse patio supping wine the sun did show it's face.

1st Wanborough compete in annual District Trash Trophy.



Saturday 5 October saw 9 Scout teams and two Explorer teams from all across Swindon, compete in a 9 mile Incident Hike in and around Ramsbury. The event requires scouts and explorers to hike carrying suitable emergency equipment (tent, survival bag, billy & burner, first aid kit etc) ensuring that they are dressed for any weather and have suitable equipment should they end up hiking in the dark (which often happens when more teams across the district enter!)

The route requires the Scouts to use 3 key pieces of equipment for navigation – a compass, map and of course a route card. As they navigated their way around the course (our team were spot on with this unlike some others!) they encountered 6 bases along the way that tested their first aid skills, communication skills as well as some good old creativity.

We entered a very young team – all 4 joined the Scout section this September, but they were amazing. I accompanied them (from a safe distance behind) and they showed good resilience and teamwork. Indeed, out of 4 accompanied teams they came first and they came third overall,

achieving just 7 marks less than second place and 8 marks less than the overall winners. Not bad for a novice team up against many seasoned Scouts who have done this event before as well as DofE.

Jack Lott, one of our new scouts and a member of the team has written his version of the days events:

Before the Trash Trophy began, I felt a little nervous about the distance we were going to walk (just under 9 miles) and the challenges at the bases. We started at the hall in Ramsbury where all of our equipment we were supposed to carry was kit checked. We then planned our route using an OS map of the area and grid references on a route card. Our team was Ralph, Charlotte, Nicola, me and Ziggy (our Scout Leader) as well as Callie the dog! Using the map we set off to Base 1 at around 12.45 and our first activity was making Mickey Mouse ears because the theme was Disney. Then on to Base 2, we started on our snacks at this point to keep us going because it was a bit steep at this stage! At Base 2 we had to answer questions about first aid. Our walk took us down loads of footpaths and past lovely scenery which was very colourful. After Base 2 we walked on to Base 3 where we had to guess the toys in the box (linked to Disney too - my favourite was Eeyore!). It was quite a long journey to Base 4 and we had to encourage each other to keep going as our feet were getting tired. We also had to watch out for Callie's long lead - I had to jump over it once! At Base 4, each member of the team had to pass on information using the Chinese whisper technique to help someone (me) draw the image that had been given to us. Then it was the longest part of

the walk - to Base 5. This bit of the walk was the hardest because it was uneven, and our feet were sore. We had been walking about 5 hours at this stage. At Base 5, we had to listen to Disney songs and guess what movie they were from as well as answer questions on a sheet. The distance between Bases 5 and 6 was the shortest. Base 6 was the best because we had to decorate cookies. I decorated mine as a lightsaber and had eaten it before I got back. At 6.10 pm we arrived back at Ramsbury Hall. I think we all felt happy because we had completed the course, we could eat our emergency rations and let our feet relax! It was really fun but if you are not good at long walks then this might not be for you!

The rest of the team have added their thoughts!

"It's was tiring but lots of fun", says Charlotte Mytton, whilst her sister Nicola said, "It was great. There were loads of fun activities to do."

The last word goes to Ralph Davies. "I really enjoyed the whole event, but two of the best bits were taking my boots off at the end and the hot chocolate once we had made it all the way round. I'm new to the troop so going on a 9 mile walk was a good opportunity to get to know some of the other Scouts. The time whizzed by!"

Chiseldon Local History Group

Our next meeting is on Wednesday 20 November at 7.30pm in Holy Cross Church Hall, Butts Road, Chiseldon, SN4 0NJ, when Nick Humphries will be presenting on "Chedworth Roman Villa".

Evidence for the first stone structure at Chedworth Roman Villa dates to the 2nd century AD. Over the next two centuries the villa was extended and improved, reaching its heyday in the 4th century AD. During this time Chedworth Roman Villa was a place of wealth, luxury and comfort. Imagine stunning mosaic floors, extensive bath house rooms and features made of marble so precious it was usually reserved for the imperial family. Shortly after this period of wealth and decadence the villa was abandoned. The Roman Empire officially pulled out of Britain in 410AD. Chedworth fell into disrepair. The roof fell in, trees grew up through the mosaic floors and soil from the surrounding banks buried the buildings.

A chance discovery by a gamekeeper in 1864 led to Chedworth being unearthed by James Farrer. Local archaeologist Welbore St Clair Baddeley raised enough money by public subscription to buy Chedworth Roman Villa and pass it to the National Trust in 1924. Ever since then the Trust has worked hard to understand more about the villa and protect it for the future.



I have recently come back from visiting friends in Spain. Within this we took a City break to Madrid.

We had already planned a rough route for the day with the first stop being the Botanical gardens which still had so much colour. Then we took in a beautiful church followed by a walk up to the Bernabeu Stadium home to Real Madrid. This is a pretty long walk but again you get to see so much more than hopping on the Metro. Stop as often as you like there is no rush.

The stadium tour was great fun and in my opinion well worth the 25 euros entrance fee. You get to see the changing rooms, sit in the dugouts and experience what it is like to be on the team coach arriving for a match.



After the tour we decided to find somewhere to eat before heading back to the station for the 8pm train back to Alicante. What a great 32 hours and so worth the effort for a whirlwind break.
