News from the Church Bell Towers

Church bell ringing has returned to near normal at Wanborough and Liddington. There are no restrictions on how many bells we can ring, or numbers of ringers in the tower, and I am pleased to say that last month we rang 6 bells at Liddington, and all 8 bells at Wanborough for the first time since March 2020, and what superb sounds those bells made. The ringing rooms in each church are quite small, and we continue to wear facemasks whilst ringing and use hand sanitiser as we ring different bells. So our ringing is near normal, but we continue to take precautions.

Sunday service ringing takes place twice a month, and practice nights are on the 1st, 3rd and 5th Fridays at Wanborough, and 2nd and 4th Fridays at Liddington, both starting at 7.30 pm. We have two weddings to ring for, one later this month and in December.

We are always looking for new bell ringers, especially if you are a lapsed ringer who hasn't rung for many years. Ringing is a bit like riding a bike, you never lose the basic skills, and after a few pulls on the rope, it will feel like you have never given up. If you are interested in returning to ringing, please get in touch with me.

We look forward to ringing for those special occasions later in the year, Remembrance and Christmas, which we were prevented from doing last year.


Village Litter Picks

Initially there will be a considerable amount of heavy duty work, cutting back overgrown shrubbery, digging out silt within the pond area etc so if you have the tools to be able to help do this then please contact the Parish Clerk.

Once the heavy duty work is completed we would like to get more residents involved in maintaining the pond with the aim of bringing more wildlife back to the area so that it can be enjoyed by all.

It was a lovely day and it was great to see so many allotment holders. Afterwards allotment holders got together for a bbq to celebrate their achievements.









Wanborough Road

Swindon Borough Council (SBC) currently have a new Traffic Regulation Order (TRO) for Wanborough Road out for consultation. The proposal is to change the speed limit along Wanborough Road so that it's 30mph along the whole stretch from Merlin Way, Covingham to Wanborough.

The consultation period ends on 6th October and you can submit your comments either in support or to object by either:-

- Go onto SBC's website www.swindon.gov.uk and search on TRO's. Then go to "stage 2 public consultation" and there will be a list of all TRO's currently out for consultation Search down the list until you see Wanborough Road and click on the link which takes you to the online form to complete. **Or**
- Email SBC Highways highways@swindon.gov.uk quoting reference ST&I/TRO/Wanborough Road.

Parish Council have been asked to give their comments in relation to the proposed "Street Lighting Scheme" for Wanborough Road. Parish Council unanimously agreed to object to street lights along Wanborough Road as they felt this would urbanise a historic rural road, plus visually join Wanborough to Swindon. It is important that we do everything we can to keep Wanborough's separate identity as a village.

In addition Cllr Dave Hayward, Cllr Bob Biggs and Cllr Joe Smith had an on site meeting with SBC Highways Officer to discuss the location of the proposed build outs / chicanes, look at the location of field entrances, discuss drainage / flooding and look at the allotment access and security, plus to re-iterate Parish Council's objections to street lighting. We have a number of action points from the meeting that we will continue to discuss with SBC and provide updates as and when we receive them.

Hooper's Field Pond Restoration

Wiltshire Wildlife contractors have successfully completed the clearance and re-instatement of the pond at Hooper's Field.

Contractors arrived early on Tuesday 7th September and with perfect ground and weather conditions they were able to complete the work in two days.

Wiltshire Wildlife have confirmed that work went really well; the pond has been cleared and re-profiled; the base is a very good clay and is holding what little rainfall we've already had. The pond was completely dry during excavation so it will take some time over winter to fill to capacity.

The area has been fenced in with stock fencing to prevent dogs accessing it and disturbing the wildlife. Some vegetation was left in situ to ensure the view from the sports pitches looked similar and to provide some

protection for the pond itself. All cut vegetation has been piled into the eastern area and will be left to essentially grow over and decompose naturally, also providing great overwintering habitat for invertebrates and amphibians. Any excavated spoil has been re-profiled around the pond edges.

Although these sorts of works, never look great immediately after, some time over winter will allow the pond to fill with rainwater and 'green back up', with the surrounding vegetation recovering and filling in.

Wiltshire Wildlife Trust will be back for a visit in Spring to take an eDNA water sample to test for the presence of Great Crested Newts and see how the pond is doing.



Planning

SBC's Local Plan Review 2036

Further to last months Lyden, we confirm that Swindon Borough Council have extended the deadline for this consultation and it is now due to close at 5pm on 7th October 2021.

At the last Parish Council meeting the Local Plan Review 2036 was discussed and it was unanimously agreed to object to the inclusion of the site allocation off Hewer's Close (the field on the corner of Rotten Row & High Street) and have raised a number of concerns in relation to the site allocation off Kite Hill. In addition Parish Council raised concern in relation to the impact of the New Eastern Villages on the village now that the phasing of the development has changed considerably with developments in the south (Redlands) coming forward first. SBC's Local Plan should take this into consideration and assess the impact of the change in phasing on the village, especially as it's such a large strategic development site.

Inlands Farm - Science Park - Planning Inquiry Update

The second part of the Inlands Farm Planning Inquiry took place on 7th & 8th September. On Tuesday 7th a roundtable discussion took place on matters raised by National Highways (formally Highways England). National Highways raised a number of concerns in relation to phase 2 of the proposed development and the impact on Commonhead Roundabout and M4 junction 15 slip roads. In addition a discussion took place on the objection raised by the Environment Agency in relation to the additional discharge into the river.

On Wednesday 8th September we heard closing statements from all parties, SSPG, Swindon Borough Council and the Applicant (Wasdell).

At the end of the two days the Inspector confirmed that he would be visiting the area unaccompanied on 16th September and accompanied on 17th September. A representative from Wanborough Parish Council attended the accompanied walk around the village and was able to point out some of the key locations that would be affected by this proposed development.

The Inspector has confirmed that he is aiming to make his final decision on the application by the end of November 2021. We would like to thank everyone who has been involved in the inquiry, a very strong case has been put across to the Inspector and we hope that he will dismiss the case based on all the evidence that has been provided to him.

Your Borough Councillor update - Gary Sumner: Ward Surgery is 9 – 11am 30th October at Wanborough Village Hall.

White Hart Closure: The closure of this busy junction is extended for up to four more weeks due to the effect of the high water table and installing a geo-grid system to reinforce the new road. Contractors are working 6 days a week, 12 hours a day to try to recover lost time and we anticipate being able to open the Merlin Way access to the A419 later in October. My apologies for this inconvenience.

Diversions are signposted but via the A419 from Commonhead we will still be able to access Sainsbury's and the A420 (the difference being that we will have to travel to the Honda junction and back South to get onto the A420).

I would thoroughly recommend signing up for the NEV (New Eastern Villages) newsletter as this is a regular emailed newsletter which updates you the road schemes including White Hart, Wanborough, Commonhead, Southern Connector Road etc. Go to: www.swindon.gov.uk/newsletter

The Marsh closure: It is now necessary to close the access to The Marsh from the Pack Hill end for the duration of the Southern Connector Road scheme **(to August 2022).** Access to all properties will be maintained from the Burycroft end and access to field entrances will also be maintained.

Wanborough Road changes: A Traffic Regulation order has been submitted to reduce the speed limit from Wanborough to Covingham to 30mph. In the next year or so the road will change dramatically with a new priority junction going into the Redlands Grove development, a few hundred yards further along a new signalised junction with the Southern Connector Road (where you see the hedges removed) and in between each of these the road will be narrowed and a pavement added, as well as traffic calming in terms of 'build outs' installed. We have met with officers as I am extremely uncomfortable with the concept of street lighting the whole road, however a final decision is awaited. This is one of the negatives of 'connectivity' and proximity to Redlands. **The latest update on the Wanborough Traffic Calming Scheme is that SBC are finalising terms and conditions for the scheme designer.**

Local Plan Consultation: You now have extra time to share your views on the Draft Local Plan. The Regulation 19 consultation period has been extended, and the consultation on the Draft Local Plan 2036 will close on Thursday, 7 October 2021 at 5.00pm.

It has come to our attention that there was error with one of the email addresses we provided for responses to the Local Plan. The correct email address **forwardplanning@swindon.gov.uk** can be used to send us your feedback in addition to other methods described below. We understand only a small number of residents have been affected by this error, but if you have recently made a representation to this process that has bounced back, please resend your comments to the above email address. **Any comments sent to the correct email address will have been received and will be reviewed.**

Gigabit Fibre: Our scheme is 'in build' and I recently met the project team. The Pack Hill closure to progress fibre into the village wasn't required and is now installed. There are works on Purley Road and Commonhead under way and within the village you will see Openreach at work installing new telegraph poles and underground cables. More details on roll out and expected dates as soon as I can. If vouchers haven't arrived please tell me and I'll pass onto Openreach.

M4 Junction 15: The works are scheduled to complete mid October.

New Eastern Villages: Outline planning permission has been granted for 1,550 new homes on land at Great Stall East, just south of the A420 (Shrivenham Road) to the east of Swindon.

The planning application for the development, which was submitted by Capital Land Strategic Planning, will also deliver a new primary and secondary school, a site for a Park and Ride, as well as a sports hub.

Community facilities, a local centre, open green space, allotments and walking and cycling improvements will also form part of the development.

Beating The Scammers By Becoming Online Savvy

A man in his 90s from the Chippenham area was scammed by a bogus police officer who convinced him to withdraw £2,000 from his bank account and hand it to a fraudster courier who came to his home address.

This story is not uncommon. Fraud represents a third of all crime reported in the UK, and as we read every day in the news criminals are continuing to find new and innovative ways to extort money from people - whether that is in person or online.



Technology has never been better, and fraudsters have never been smarter, so as part of our summer Click or Call campaign, we are highlighting cybercrime and fraud. Cybercrime is a common method used to scam people out of money. They target victims using phishing emails in hope that you will open an attachment or click on a link to compromise your electronic device and gain access to your personal information, passwords and account details.

Obvious signs of phishing include:

- Misspelling and bad grammar within the email
- Addressing you as "customer" or by your email address, rather than using your name, and links that lead you
 to sign into personal accounts.

Always double check the email address that has sent the email, there could be a slight change to make it look like a supplier you regularly deal with or it could be spoofed, and the real email address is hidden.

Please talk to your elderly relatives or neighbours so they continue to be aware and take some time to stop and think and talk to someone they trust before transferring any money or sharing bank details. Police officers and banks will never cold call residents in this way and ask for card or bank details.

There are some simple steps you can take to help protect yourself from these types of crime:

- Depending on your bank, the security questions they ask may be different, but they'll never ask you to authorise anything by entering your PIN into your phone.
- Never send money abroad to a person you've never met or to anyone you don't actually know and trust.
- Likewise, never agree to keep an online relationship a secret. This is a ploy to get you not to tell your family and friends, who'll see the scam for exactly what it is.

Winter help for hibernators

The vibrant autumn colours are emerging as we move into the hibernation period for our wildlife. Before you engage in your seasonal tidy-up, stop and think about vulnerable hibernating wildlife such as bats, hedgehogs and amphibians who need protection from the harsh weather and predators. They may be seeking out a quiet wild area to create a warm shelter for the duration of the winter.

Bonfires and avid autumn gardening with power tools can pose major threats to garden wildlife. If you come across a ball of leaves you've probably found a hedgehog's winter nest, so put the nest and some of the material back to safety and think about how many slugs your prickly friend will eat in the spring!




Pile small logs or bundles of sticks and leaves into quiet parts of the garden or consider buying a wildlife habitat. A hedgehog house, sited with some weather protection and inviting leaves at the entrance, should increase the chances of getting a tenant for the winter. Hedgehogs also need a good store of body fat to sustain them for the long hibernation period, so provide a good quality specialist supplementary hedgehog food, and of course water, but avoid putting out milk which will make them ill.

Bats can be seen and heard in the night sky in the autumn, well before Halloween. They don't make roosts themselves but seek crevices where possible, but these are not always available. Adding a bat box located high up with a clear flight path in would do just the job and they devour thousands of midges each night for you.

You may not be aware of the frogs and toads in the undergrowth who are looking for a safe place in which to await the spring. Undisturbed areas of long grass, damp vegetation and logs are perfect shelters so be gentle with your digging.

DIY Block paving – A recipe for success!

It will be no surprise to some of you that I have taken on a new home improvement project to see me through the summer. Due to the removal of our much-loved trampoline and a muddy path through the lawn each winter as we access the chickens, this year the project was a block paving patio and path. Here are my key learning points should you want to have a go yourself!

- 1. Planning the project It will take far longer than you expect. Especially if you are using a spade, trying to run a business, keeping your home clean, managing a distant parent and live with chickens.
- 2. Useful equipment a turf cutter gets a thumbs up. A whacker plate is much quicker than a plank and sledgehammer, however if you have Rheumatics or RSI get someone else to do it for you. You are going to need a block cutter and someone that is happy to use it for you, I guarantee this. If offered a digger just say yes. Gardening knee pads are not up to the job and leather gloves are essential.
- 3. Materials delivery Be very, very nice to delivery drivers. If they like you, they will leave the cubic meter bags of hardcore at the top of your steep sloped drive! If offered help to shift 20+ barrow loads of wet cement for your new

summer house base in 10 minutes – say yes and make sure any wheelbarrows offered have fully inflated tyres! DO NOT seek chicken assistance – see below

- 4. Helpful assistance Chickens are very helpful at refilling the holes you have lovingly dug with the soil you carefully piled up for later use. They like leaving permanent footprints in cement, decorating the new patio and path with a layer of dung just after you have swept up. Dung dries solid be warned!
- 5. Getting the job done when laying a path and patio you need to consider level, flat, following the lay of the land or the rustic finish. Three involve bits of string and spirit levels, the other involves a serious amount of skill and creativity I am a creative person, I will say no more!
- 6. Professional help unless you are obsessed with DIY, I am not, or totally and completely stupid, some say I fit this category, there are many good reasons to get a pro in.

I have now completed the task and am pleased with my efforts. I am not offering my skills to others so don't even think of asking, my knees and hands will never forgive me. Next years DIY project will involve taking myself to a spa and a few lazy lunches. The only holes I plan on digging will be to put plants in!

Roasted pumpkin soup recipe

- 1.5kg edible pumpkin
- Olive oil
- 1 teaspoon dried chilli
- 1 tablespoon coriander seeds
- 1 large onion
- 3 cloves garlic
- 1 carrot
- 1 stick of celery
- 1 litre hot vegetable stock



- 1. Preheat the oven to 170°C/340°F.
- 2. Halve the pumpkin and remove the seeds (you can keep these for roasting), then chop into wedges.
- 3. Place the pumpkin on two large baking trays and drizzle over a little olive oil.
- 4. In a pestle and mortar, grind the chilli and coriander seeds with a pinch of salt until finely ground.
- 5. Sprinkle the spices over the pumpkin with some black pepper.
- 6. Roast the pumpkin for 1 hour, or until soft and slightly caramalised at the edges.
- 7. Meanwhile, roughly chop the onion, garlic, carrot and celery.
- 8. Heat a lug of olive oil over a medium heat in a large saucepan then add the vegetables and cook for 15 minutes, or until soft and sweet but not coloured.
- 9. When the squash is ready, add to the pan with the hot stock. Blend with a stick blender, adding a little more water if you like a thinner consistency.

SSPG - Inlands Farm Planning Appeal.

Stage 2 of the Inlands Farm Planning Appeal Inquiry took place on the 7th & 8th of September, with the first day covering submissions by National Highways (formally Highways England),



and the objection raised by the Environment Agency regarding additional discharge into the river. The final day was the opportunity for the all-important final summations by all the parties, including SSPG's advocate John Moe who skilfully presented our closing statement.

This statement is set out below and covers 5 key areas of specific objections and evidence and concludes that the Appellant has not shown a compelling case to justify overriding the many local and national planning policies for such a proposed development on this specific site.

After the close of the hearing, Paul Griffiths for the Planning Inspectorate, followed up with two further visits: independently on 16th September, and then accompanied on 17th September. Our thanks to everyone who kept their objection banners and placards well displayed all around our area, including key points of visibility from the adjoining AONB, Hinton Parva and Ridgeway.

Please be advised that the Inspector has given an estimated date of the end of November 2021 when he thinks he will be able to confirm his decision on the case.

Our Closing Statement. 8th September 2021

Background & Introduction

South Swindon Protection Group represents **the** views of 1700 residents in Swindon, many of whom would be personally affected by this proposed development.

Although we are fully supportive of Wasdell and their desire to expand their successful business, the residents of South Swindon believe this development to support their ambition is the wrong place, and threatens to undermine the Swindon Local Plan, which protects the setting of the AONB and could be accommodated on already available alternative sites in Swindon, in much shorter acceptable timescales.

Specific Objections

SSPG specific objections and evidence encompassed 5 topics covered by this inquiry.

Compliance with Use Classes Order

The first objection is Compliance with the Use Classes Order. From our evidence, given by David Harling, we have shown for the proposed Phase 1 building that:

- The storage and warehouse usage of 66% of the available space is way in excess of any other evidenced B1c site
- The storage and warehouse space has not been proven to be required purely to support the production processes, and includes storage of finished products for customers as admitted by the Appellant
- The Phase 1 development is replacing existing Wasdell Swindon facilities that are primarily of B8 use class
- The Appellant's architect described the building as B8 in their Design and Access statement (CDA-2)

Science Park Viability

The second objection is on Science Park viability. From our testimony, given by Dr Malcolm Parry, we have shown that:

- The Appellant is unable to show evidence of investment in R&D, with no expenditure demonstrated, no patents held or applied for, no IPR allowance on their balance sheet, and no indication of number of staff engaged in R&D
- The testimony provided in the Statement of Case and the Proofs of Evidence is not backed up with factual data on The Appellant's credibility for anchoring a Science Park, and was admitted to being unchallenged by Turley's expert witnesses
- The percentage of scientific and engineering staff for phase 1 is stated as no more than 6% of workforce, throwing into question how effective the Appellant could be as an anchor company
- With over 60% of the proposed site given over to two large factories (compared to the national average of 19%), no comparable science park with such a high percentage of industrial use could be identified

- Consequently, the proposal looks more like an industrial park with outbuildings
- All allegedly comparable science park sites listed by the Appellant were EITHER city-based OR were closely connected with universities and research laboratories. None of the comparators were standalone, green field developments.

Economic Impact

The Third objection is on Economic Impact. From our evidence we have shown that:

- The Appellant's growth projection of 10% per annum would mean that it would take over 9 years to increase headcount from 600 to 1300 for Phase 1, even without efficiency savings implied by Appellant's proposed investment in Al and automation
- It would take over 13 years to increase the number of production lines from 16 to 54 given the growth projection of 10%
- Appellant has stated that they plan to attract 550 science park jobs, with no more than 80 scientific and engineering roles in Phase 1, which appears to be highly optimistic
- Evidence for employment needs was provided by Wasdell themselves and despite being more than double the expected
 density for the use class and building space it was not challenged by Mr Amos and no justification or evidence was
 sought to verify Wasdell's claims
- No evidence was produced that the benefits claimed for the Swindon Science Park are unique to the Inlands Farm site, as the Appellant has stated they would be prepared to relocate to another site outside the region
- This development could potentially damage the regeneration and growth opportunity of Central Swindon by ignoring the Swindon Borough Local Plan (CDF-1), and the Swindon Town Investment Plan (CDI-3) accelerating a hollowing out of the town centre
- No evidence was given by the Appellant, or the interested parties who had submitted letters in support of the SSP, of any specific benefits to co-locating in a cluster
- If insufficient occupancy is achieved for the SSP, there is a high risk of drift in usage leading to a re-purposing for potentially more lucrative housing or other development uses without the stated benefits of the Science Park

Principle of Development

The Fourth objection is on Principle of Development. For this:

- The Appellant has provided no compelling evidence for the unique nature of the Inlands Farm site to achieve the stated benefits of a Science Park
- The Appellant has admitted their failure to comply with several planning policies, including SD2 and NC3 of the adopted Swindon Borough Local Plan 2026 and National Planning Policy Framework

Alternative Sites

The Fifth and final objection is on Alternative Sites. For this:

- No evidence was presented to justify the Appellant needing to own the freehold for the land
- Existing local sites were shown to be available and suitable, including the Old Honda site (with more space likely to be freed up by Panattoni) and Great Stall East
- Wasdell have stated that they could and would relocate to another site on another part of the country if planning permission was not given for Inlands Farm, thereby refuting themselves the assertion of no alternative sites
- If the construction took place in one of the designated development sites, the allowable use of taller buildings would substantially reduce the footprint from over 35 hectares to less than 20 hectares as less mitigation would be required
- The case for co-location or "clustering" at the SSP could not be made; in the interest of sustainability it would make more sense to spread but closely locate this development across 2 or 3 sites of the many available within Swindon

In summary, SSPG believe that the Appellant has not shown a compelling case to justify building the proposed development at Inlands Farm as it fails to comply with many local and national planning policies. We therefore request that the decision to refuse permission be upheld.



Nature Rambles

October

Although Jefferies is usually called a 'nature writer', it is a term that doesn't really do him full justice, nor give us a very clear picture of what he wrote about. Although wildlife and the environment were central to everything he wrote about, he was just as interested in the people who lived in the countryside as the birds, flowers and animals. The following passage from 'The Amateur Poacher' paints a perfect little picture of the sort of cottage that would be found all over the area in Jefferies' day, with little hints of life, such as how well the dairy buckets were cleaned.

"One October morning towards the end of the month, Orion and I started to beat over Redcote Farm upon the standing invitation of the occupier. There was a certainty of sport of some kind, because the place had remained almost unchanged for the last century. It is 'improvement' that drives away game and necessitates the pheasant preserve.

The low whitewashed walls of the house were of a dull yellowish hue from the beating of the weather. They supported a vast breadth of thatched roof drilled by sparrows and starlings. Under the eaves the swallows' nests adhered, and projecting shelves were fixed to prevent any inconvenience from them. Some of the narrow windows were still darkened with the black boarding put up in the days of the window tax.

In the courtyard a number of stout forked stakes were used for putting the dairy buckets on, after being cleaned, to dry. No attempt was made to separate the business from the inner life of the house. Here in front these oaken buckets, scoured till nearly white, their iron handles polished like silver, were close under the eyes of any one looking out. By the front door a besom leaned against the wall that every comer might clean the mud from his boots; and you stepped at once from the threshold into the sitting-room. A lane led past the garden, if that could be called a lane which widened into a field and after rain was flooded so deeply as to be impassable to foot passengers."

The Jefferies' farmhouse was a three-storied brick building, and you can still see it on the Marlborough Road as you drive into Swindon. It was actually quite new when Richard Jefferies was born, and despite its size originally had a thatched roof and wooden slats instead of glass in the upper floor windows to let air flow through. At one end it has what looks like a traditional rural cottage attached to it but in fact, the cottage, which is still thatched, is much older than the house. And if you ever visit, remember to clean the mud off your boots — there is even a besom propped up inside the door to help you.


