Wanborough St Andrews Church Roof Update

The first report and update of the stolen lead from the church roof at Wanborough was given in the May issue of the Lyden Magazine. Since then, much has happened, and I can now give the latest news.

The Diocese of Bristol have given the church plenty of advice on how best to proceed with the repair of the roof, and the Church Wardens and the Parochial Church Council (PCC) are following their guidance closely. I have very recently been asked to coordinate the Roof Project, and I am working closely with our church architect who is now heavily involved. In addition to a new roof, he has identified further repairs that are required to the internal roof timbers.

By next month, it is hoped that the specification for all of the repairs will be available and acceptable to the Diocese, and new quotations will be requested from possible contractors.

In the meantime, rain water is still finding its way into church, and the Church Council are considering how to protect the interior of our Grade 1 listed building until repair work starts later in the year.

The Church Council soon realised that the cost of replacing the church roof would be more expensive than originally thought. The additional repair work required and the ever increasing cost of materials and labour is pushing the price up. I am still waiting for the tendering process to be completed and only then will I have a better idea what the expected cost of the repairs will be.

The Roof Project is another of the never ending list of work required to keep our church in good shape. The last major work done was a new boiler system, and future work includes new flooring that the pews sit on, and a lightning protection system. Based on existing church funds, and cost estimates we have received, there is a considerable shortfall. I would like to appeal to the wider village community for financial support to help us meet our target.



Many thanks to Helen James for playing her bugle, Dave Hayward for reading out the "Proclamation", Bob Biggs for lighting the Beacon and for the church bell ringers for ringing the peals of bells.



Celebrations continued on the Friday with the Beer Run, starting at Cross Keys and running through and stopping at the "Jenner Arms" at Church Meadow. Many thanks to Mike Kent and Colin Blackwell for organising this special run in memory of Mike Jenner.

Celebrations continued at Church Meadow with a picnic in the park. Church Meadow was filled with residents setting up their blankets and chairs ready for the live entertainment. We had the pleasure of live entertainment from Sam James, 41 Degrees big band, The Squirrels and False Gods. The children's activities tent was very busy with over 100 crowns being made and 75 flags decorated as well as a treasure hunt and face painting. It was lovely to see so many children enjoying themselves. St Andrew's Church was open with a display from Liddington Art Group, the lovely decorated wildlife habitats, flower displays and local handbell ringers playing.

A big thank you to all involved in making these events so special for the village and one we will all remember. Also a massive thank you to everyone who helped on the day, including setting up and tiding away afterwards. There are too many to name individually but it was truly a team effort.

Both events have been funded by grants received from Lottery Awards for All and Old Boilers which we appreciate.

Planning

Foxbridge North (New Eastern Villages)

We have recently received notification that the planning application at Foxbridge North - S/OUT/20/0533 - for 220 new dwellings has gone to appeal.

Swindon Borough Council refused the application in February 2022 and the reason for refusal was due to the harm to the scheduled monument and other designated heritage assets. Parish Council also raised a number of objections including:-

- Concern about flooding within the site and surrounding area;
- The proposed 50 dwellings per hectare is considerably higher than agreed in SBC's Local Plan 2026;
- The impact on local archeology.

The Planning Inspector has issued a timetable and those wishing to submit comments must do so by 30th June 2022.

The Inspector appointed to decide the appeal is D Prentis BA BPI MRTPI and the inquiry will open at 10.00am on 11 October 2022 and is currently scheduled to last 8 days.

Although this site is allocated within the New Eastern Villages, the current proposal doesn't take into consideration it's historic surroundings. We hope the Inspector dismisses this application to ensure the applicant submits a more appropriate design for the site.

Wanborough Traffic Calming - High Street

Following on from queries raised by residents at our last Parish Council meeting, Parish Council agreed to submit the following queries (in black) to SBC Highway - The reply we received from SBC Highways is shown in blue for your information.

• There was an accident on the High Street on Friday evening (20th), the build out just after Manor Orchard was hit. Parish Council are concerned that due to the speed of cars coming down Callas Hill there is nothing to slow traffic down until it reaches this build out. Additional signage is not going to make much difference, cars need to be slowed down prior to this build out otherwise there will be many more similar accidents.

Temporary blue and white directional arrows were in place but were stolen. These have now been replaced until night owls installed.

Night Owls to be installed at the end of the scheme – (reflective black and yellow bollards) Locating by Manor Orchard and Pedestrian build out by Village Hall.

• Can the access out of Manor Orchard be re-assessed, with the new build out opposite the road entrance, it now makes it difficult to get out of the road without turning directly into oncoming traffic coming down Callas Hill.

Road Safety Audit (RSA) did not raise any concerns and this was tracked during design. This has also been tested during construction and vehicles can safely turn into the correct lane.

• Visibility is now extremely difficult as you exit The Plough car park as the parking on the right as you exit now extends further into the area where you exit the car park. Previously cars parked up to the end of the green verge and where the dropped kerb for The Plough car park started, now the white lines extend further, allowing cars to park into the previous exit area for the car park. The white lines need to be changed so that they end at the end of the green verge.

Please see below image taken from Google. The design reflected the existing situation. RSA did not raise any concerns



• The stopping point for the chicane just past Chapel Lane - There is not sufficient space for a car to stop where the white lines are, cars have to stop by Chapel Lane entrance where the road is wider.

During the design phase vehicle tracking was carried out using an articulated lorry and a tractor.

As well as the above, at the 'meet the contractor' consultation it was requested that an additional swept path was carried to confirm capacity for large vehicles this was undertaken. RSA audit did not raise any concerns.

• Although not finished the build out and parking near the roundabout, will leave two very narrow lanes, which look too narrow for two cars to pass, let along something larger like a tractor.

During the design phase vehicle tracking was carried out using an articulated lorry and a tractor.

As well as the above, at the 'meet the contractor' consultation it was requested that an additional swept path was carried to confirm capacity for large vehicles.

RSA audit did not raise any concerns.

• Parish Council are concerned that the build outs by the roundabout are going to make visibility from Rotten Row extremely difficult and would like this re-assessed once the work is completed.

During detailed design phase concerns were raised with regards to visibility and the start of the parking area was moved away from the roundabout as a result.

The proposed arrangement provides a like for like visibility compared to the existing arrangement.

Wanborough Parish Council were due to consider responses to these replies at the June meeting

Footpath Improvements

During the next few months you will hopefully see improvements to the public footpaths between Wanborough and Hinton Parva. Swindon Borough Council is working with the landowners to improve the condition of the public footpaths by exchanging stiles with gates, replacing ditch crossings and improving the signage of the paths. However as these public footpaths cross working farmland there are a few golden rules to ensure everyone stays safe and enjoys the countryside.

Grass is a crop. A lush crop of grass is a valuable commodity for farmers and their animals and may be eaten by those animals grazing within the field or cut to be used at a later date as silage or hay. If you are walking through a lovely field of grass

remember that it is the farmer's shop floor, keep to the line of the footpath and clear up after your dog.

Right to Roam doesn't exist in Wanborough. The only paths that walkers can use across the countryside in this area are the public footpaths and bridleways shown on Ordnance Survey maps. Although Open Access Land, often called the right to roam, was established over 20 years ago it only applies to specific types of land and none of that can be found in Wanborough. Therefore, it is important that we all follow the signed paths and don't walk anywhere else.

Not all animals enjoy each other's company. Grass fields will often be grazed by cows and sheep and those animals can be in different fields from week to week. When entering a field look out for farm animals especially cattle; they can be inquisitive and may follow you across the field. Stay calm and walk quickly and quietly around the animals and don't get between cows and their calves. If you have a dog with you keep it on a short lead, 2 metres or less, but let the dog go if threatened by cattle so both of you can get to safety separately.

Man's best friend is not also a cow's best friend. Unfortunately some dogs have Neosporosis, an infectious disease caused by a parasite that can spread to cattle. This disease can paralyse young dogs and cause a wide range of problems in older dogs. It can also cause cows to terminate their pregnancies early and affect their ability to have any more calves. When walking your dog make sure it doesn't eat anything to do with cows, clear up after it and ensure that it is regularly wormed to protect it and other animals.

Please continue to enjoy the countryside on your walks but stay safe and respect others workplace.

Roman remains hindering progress on brand new road

Swindon's past is holding up its future as valuable pieces of Roman history continue to be uncovered on the site of a brand new road.

When built, the Southern Connector Road will provide a link between the New Eastern Villages (NEV) and Commonhead roundabout, close to Great Western Hospital.

Specialist consultants have worked extensively with the County Archaeologist to minimise the impact on any known remains in the area but, during the course of the work so far, a number of new items of archaeological importance have been discovered.

These have been excavated and recorded, in accordance with agreed practices and guidance, while some of the finds including a large rectangular building, Romano-British trackway and several smaller finds such as arrowheads and bone pins have been shared on the social media of both the Council and Headland Archaeology, the contractor leading on the excavation.

Overall costs for the scheme have already risen by £4.7m. To allow for further archaeological discoveries, rising material and labour costs, and ground and ecological constraints, an extra £5.6m has been set aside in contingency funding for the scheme.

The new road, which was due to be finished by this December is now expected to be completed by next summer.

Councillor Gary Sumner, Swindon Borough Council's Cabinet Member for Strategic Infrastructure, Transport and Planning, said: "We always knew there was a chance we would uncover additional Roman artefacts, despite the careful planning and design of the scheme ensuring the new road avoided the dense known areas of archaeology such as the Roman town of Durocornovium.

"But when you are working in a site such as this archaeology is very difficult to avoid entirely. We therefore have to build in this extra time to complete the scheme to ensure we can deal with any additional finds carefully and sensitively and, of course, we have to mitigate this risk by putting aside appropriate contingency funding. This is also at a time when costs are increasing across the board.

"We will be working extremely hard with the contractor to bring forward the revised completion date, while at the same time continuing to share any important pieces of Swindon's Roman history as we go.

"I'd like to apologise to residents in Wanborough as it does mean that The Marsh will remain closed for a longer period of time to allow us to finish the scheme."

The New Eastern Villages is one of the largest greenfield developments in the country. It will consist of 8,000 homes, new schools, employment spaces and community and leisure facilities, as well as accompanying infrastructure like the Southern Connector Road.

Gigabit update:

From my latest update Openreach are working on both Liddington, Church Road, High Street and out towards Horpit. As mentioned before vouchers have been extended and they have ceased to use the sub-contractors in Wanborough and have all Openreach staff on the build. There have been blockages in Ham Road, new poles have been ordered for numerous locations and they are keen to get the build completed in the coming months. I'm sure that those residents connected have seen the amazing difference and having started this scheme just over two years ago as lockdown commenced I'm delighted that we are becoming connected. Foxhill is not forgotten and this is being progressed via 'Project Gigabit' which seeks a commercial solution for areas which cannot be funded via the Gigabit Fibre project due to costs above voucher value.

If you are having any issues with installations due to Openreach do let me know as I've sorted out a number of these problems for residents.







offering a vast range of good quality plants at reasonable prices. Needless to say, they supplied bags! Our only restriction was the number of hands to carry them. It was a great experience and I look forward to going to another sale at a different location later in the season. Hopefully when late summer or autumn plants will be on offer.

Summer Salad

Perfect for a summer BBQ

Ingredients

- 400g black beans, drained
- 2 large handfuls baby spinach leaves , roughly chopped
- 500g heritage tomatoes, chopped into large chunks
- ½ cucumber , halved lengthways, seeds scooped out and sliced on an angle
- 1 mango , peeled and chopped into chunks
- 1 large red onion , halved and finely sliced
- 6-8 radishes, sliced
- 2 avocados, peeled and sliced
- 100g feta , crumbled

handful of herbs (reserved from the dressing)

For the dressing

- large bunch mint
- small bunch coriander
- small bunch basil
- 1 fat green chilli , deseeded and chopped
- 1 small garlic clove
- 100ml extra virgin olive oil or rapeseed oil
- 2 limes , zested and juiced
- 2 tbsp white wine vinegar
- 2 tsp honey

STEP 1

Make the dressing by blending all of the ingredients in a food processor (or very finely chop them), saving a few herb leaves for the salad. You can make the dressing up to 24 hrs before serving.

STEP 2

Scatter the beans and spinach over a large platter. Arrange the tomatoes, cucumber, mango, onion and radishes on top and gently toss together with your hands. Top the salad with the avocados, feta and herbs, and serve the dressing on the side.


