Parish Council wish both candidates the best of luck. We will notify everyone of the result on our website and Facebook pages soon after the election has taken place.


Village Maintenance

Village Bins

We have recently installed a number of new bins to replace those that are broken or completely rusted around the village.

Please note that all the large general waste bins in the village are suitable for both general waste and dog waste. We have recently added some additional signage to some of the bins to confirm this. Unfortunately the signs are not suitable for the new bins so we have not been able to put them on them all but the message is the same for all bins in the village.

We also have two additional dog waste bins to install in Hooper's Field car park, one next to the new footpath as you enter from Rotten Row and the other at the back of the car park by the Bowls Green, near the entrance to Warneage Woods.



We have purchased a large number of bulbs for the High Street (crocuses, daffodils and snowdrops), with thanks to Beth's Potting Shed for organising this for us. We still have some funding left from the Jubilee lottery grant to cover the cost of these bulbs.

We had our first planting session on 16th October, the sun shone and with 14 residents coming out to help we managed to plant about a 1/4 of the bulbs. A great community effort, so well done to everyone who helped.

Planning

Foxbridge Village North - Public Planning Inquiry

Tuesday 11th October was the first day of a two week Public Planning Inquiry in relation to the Land at Foxbridge Village North (A site allocated within the New Eastern Villages). Swindon Borough Council refused the planning application and the applicant is now appealing this decision.

Parish Council attended the Inquiry as this site is within Wanborough Parish. Bob Biggs read out a statement on behalf of Parish Council confirming the Council's objections to this application.

At the time of writing the Inquiry still had a week to go. The Inspector is due to listen to arguments from both sides in relation to the impact on local heritage, infrastructure requirements and viability before making his decision.

Land North Of Redlands Farm Wanborough Road

S/OUT/22/1415 - Land North Of Redlands Farm Wanborough Road - A Hybrid Planning Application for a residential development of 248 dwellings.

Parish Council discussed this application at their Planning, Finance & Policy meeting on 17th October and strongly objected to the application for the following reasons:-

- The large area of the proposed site is outside the boundary for the New Eastern Villages (NEV), within the area of non coalescence and therefore is in addition to what has already been allocated for this development site. Parish Council strongly object to this additional area and dwellings on top of what has already been allocated contrary to SBC Local Plan 20236 policy NC3.
- The main access to the site will be through the new Redlands development and onto Wanborough Road. Parish Council object to any further houses being built with access onto Wanborough Road. Wanborough Road is a narrow rural road that cannot cope with the additional traffic that this proposal will bring. This is not what has been planned and is contrary to SBC Local Plan 2026 policy NC3.
- Some of the proposed development is within the area allocated as green infrastructure between the New Eastern Villages sites and the buffer next to the Lyden Brook. Parish Council strongly object to any development within these areas, green infrastructure is an important element to this large development site, which not only provide important green spaces for those living at the NEV but also provides a flood alleviation area around the Lyden Brook. This area should be protected from development.
- The Proposed development includes no supporting facilities such as play areas, shop, allotments, primary school etc it relies completely on the neighbouring NEV villages at Lotmead and Redlands for these facilities. This is not acceptable.

Parish Council are extremely disappointed to see an application which is clearly trying to expand and add to the already large allocation of houses within the NEV. This is something that we were concerned might happen and we hope that SBC refuse this application as it doesn't comply with their Local Plan policies.

Wanborough St Andrews Church Roof Update

I will start by updating you on the latest developments:

The tender period was extended to allow extra time for quotes to be submitted, and this resulted in only one complete quote received. Partial guotes were also received.

The Roof Committee were uncomfortable with only one expensive quote, compared to the architect's estimates. We are now waiting on a second joint quote.

The tender process has given the Committee a better idea of the Project costings. There will be a significant shortfall, in order for the work to start. However, the committee have secured a loan in principal from the Diocese of Bristol, repayable over 10 years.

The loan will get the job done and bring the church back into good working order, that said we will still need to continue to raise funds to make the loan repayments (which include interest). Work starts at church in early November and should last about 17 weeks

The Roof Project team are working hard to raise money by applying for grants from charitable organisations. There have been a few good results, but many applications have been rejected.

Contributions towards the new roof costs continue to be made from a number of sources - fund raising events and individual donations. £300 was raised at the Cross Keys Fun Day, £160 from the BIngo Night, and a grant for £1,000 was received from the Benham Charitable Trust.

Your Borough Councillor update - Gary Sumner:

My Ward Surgery is 9– 11am 26th November at Wanborough Village Hall – please call in if you have questions on any subject.

There is no Ward Surgery in December.

Pack Hill works:

You will all have received a letter confirming that the works on Pack Hill and down to the Commonhead Roundabout are to continue until next summer to tie in with the Southern Connector Road (SCR). As we drive down Pack Hill the existing road will bear right from its current route, onto the new roundabout you can see in the field.

I genuinely appreciate the extraordinary tolerance and patience of the majority of residents during these works. Building a 1.5 mile long road through the countryside and across numerous water courses, in an area with lots of archaeological interest has been enormously challenging, but I had a site visit a couple of weeks ago and was impressed with progress towards the majority of the road being under first levels of tarmac shortly.

The project will deliver a road which will be the only way into and out of the approved 'New Eastern Villages' for around half of the 8,000 eventual homes. The SCR does NOT have a direct connection to the A420 and is specifically designed to end close to the Primary School in Lotmead.

Only the Redlands development and around 200 homes at Lotmead will have access to the Wanborough Road and for those at Redlands the most convenient route to Commonhead will also be the Southern Connector Road. That road will have a signalised junction with Wanborough Road to prevent vehicles from driving towards Wanborough other than from Covingham or returning to the village from Commonhead.

Wanborough Rd – an explanation of changes including street-lights:

The 'New Eastern Villages' was given approval as part of the 2015 'Local Plan' which allocated it as part of the required expansion for Swindon and there were many public consultation events which in Wanborough residents raised concerns about the inclusion of Redlands. Despite those concerns at the time, it was approved and the result was also that an area of 'Non Coalescence' was guaranteed.

Street lights on the Wanborough Road (some 600ft from Horpit) are part of the requirements of Highways safety as the Wanborough Road will change. It will be narrowed, a pavement installed from Wanborough to Covingham and it will have 'build-outs' to oblige road users to give way at regular intervals to both slow speeds to 30mph and to deter 'rat running'. There will be a new 'give way' junction with Redlands, as well as the junction with SCR.

The 'obvious' choice for residents of the new homes at Redlands (370 homes plus a primary school & shop) will be to use the Southern Connector Road as their main access.

I negotiated as part of the Redlands consent that traffic movements will be monitored by camera and if they exceed predicted numbers heading towards the village a potential 'no left turn' out of Redlands could be considered. The same applies to camera monitoring of The Marsh.

Whilst these changes were agreed in 2019 as part of the Redlands planning application by the then owners, the lighting issue has come about as a result of two independent 'Road Safety Audits' which say they are essential. Initially I was very much against them and raised my concerns, but have to accept that SBC Highways are responsible for safety on the roads. In future, people may well be walking or cycling on the road between the village and the new school, between the development and our pubs & clubs. The lights will be lower than normal and will have a dimming regime overnight, whilst it has been agreed that baffles will be fitted to prevent light spill (although as we have already seen from installed LED street lights in the village, the light spills far less than the previous sodium lighting).

Planning application for Land north of Redlands:

I have submitted my own objection to this application for 248 homes as some of it sits outside the red line boundary agreed for the New Eastern Villages in the Local Plan and some of the site sits where green infrastructure was planned. Site access (if via Redlands which I anticipate) would also be a major worry as that would mean an increase in cars using the Wanborough Road. Full details of how to object or raise concerns will be posted on my website below.

Wanborough Poet - Olivia Tuck

Sometimes you meet a young person, and you know you're in the presence of talent. My friend, Olivia Tuck, is such a person. She read her poems over a few years at Poetry Swindon, and I marvelled at her presence even though she was young and shy. Olivia holds an audience, with poems that are troubling, fascinating, engaging. Her command of language is astonishing for one so young.

She excelled in Creative Writing at Bath Spa University, then a Masters at UEA, and had her first pamphlet published, *Things Only Borderlines Know*.

Olivia is a Swindonian, parents in Wanborough, grandparents lived in Liddington. Remember her name: we'll be hearing Olivia on the big stages in the coming years. Here are some lines from a poem Olivia wrote about her grandparents' house "Downs Edge" – with a nod to them both, Gill and the late Alan Jefferies:

We kept coming for tea, even after we'd grown our fringes and curves. The garden burned in autumn. Who can outstare a marble-eyed stone deer? We tightrope-walked along the wall to try, but I grazed my knee, and the days shrunk: the apples fell

with the clocks. Once, we visited after an October gale — in storms, you'd promise the Downs would guard us, yet the old yew had been wrestled to the ground. I wondered, if a gust had done that to an ogress with four hundred rings,

what it might have done to girls unfurling, if it'd wanted to, if it'd been angry enough. I'm told children only ask questions if they know they'll be able to shoulder the answers' weight. I didn't speak.



We Will Ren

- 1. Edgar John HINTON was born in 1894 at Clifton Street, Swindon, and moved to Wanborough with his parents, firstly to Inlands Farm and later to The Croft. Edgar enlisted in 1915 at Swindon and joined the Duke of Edinburgh's Wiltshire Regiment and took part in a number of battles at the Somme. On 21st March the Germans launched the 1918 Spring Offensive along the Western Front. Edgar was killed in action on that first day, the same day as William Charles KENT (see below). He has no known grave and is commemorated on the Arras Memorial in France, on the memorial in St Andrew's Church and on the Hinton family grave at the top of the south face of the obelisk.
- 2. **William Charles KENT** was born in 1895 at Haydon, north Swindon. His father, who worked as a farm labourer, was from Wanborough and his mother from Bishopstone and they moved around the area as work demanded. William was also a farm labourer and was working at Nythe Farm when he enlisted in 1915. William served in the Durham Light Infantry and like Edgar HINTON (see above) was killed in action on 21st March 1918. He has no known grave and is commemorated on the Pozieres Memorial in France, on the memorial in St Andrew's Church and on the headstone, with his young sister and father, although the inscription confusingly states 28th March.
- Frederick MORSE The Morse family were born in the villages around Shrivenham as Fred's father James 3. moved around in his work as an agricultural labourer. Fred was working as a Milk boy on a farm in 1901, when the family (two sisters, four brothers, including Frank who is also listed on the memorial in the church) was living in Stratton St Margaret and later moved to Burycroft Row, Wanborough. In 1907 Fred enlisted in the Wiltshire Regiment at Swindon claiming to be aged 19 years, 2 months. A month later he was found to be unfit for service due to being underweight (perhaps because he was underage) but eventually he was accepted for service and after serving in India and South Africa he was posted to France in September 1914. In October he was seriously injured in the arm by shrapnel at Lille and evacuated to hospital in the UK four days later. In an interview Fred described the attack and how they were ambushed, and also recalled how his two of his brothers were in the same regiment and were also wounded. In March 1915 he was discharged as he was found medically unfit for further military service with the blunt comment "right arm useless" and was demobilised to Purton. Fred died on 31st August 1916 aged 27 and is buried at St Andrew's Churchyard, the first of four headstones in the graveyard maintained by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission, and also listed on the memorial in St Andrew's Church alongside his brother Frank who also died of his wounds and is buried at a cemetery near Arras.
- 4. Charles HATT TODD was born near Theale, Reading, where his father Richard was a land agent. In 1901 he was living in Clifton, Bristol where he had started his career as a bank clerk and by 1911 had moved back home, joining his brother, sister and widowed father. He later moved to work at Lloyd's bank in Folkestone. Soon after, he enlisted in the Royal Fusiliers and on 16th February 1916 he was married at St Andrew's church to Elsie WISEMAN from Lotmead Farm, sister of his bank clerk colleague Bruce WISEMAN. Charles served initially as a private and later as a second lieutenant. He was killed in action, aged 33, on the 12th October 1917 at the first battle of Passchendaele. He has no known grave and is commemorated on the memorial at Zonnebeke, Belgium, and on a separate plaque in St Andrew's Church while his brother-in-law Bruce WISEMAN is listed on the main memorial plaque, and also remembered on the Wiseman family grave as the husband of Elsie.




- 5. Clarence Depledge KENDREW was born in 1922 at Wakefield, enlisted in the RAF Volunteer Reserve in 1940 and attended Signal School in 1941 at RAF Yatesbury where he met his future wife Ethel CONSTABLE who worked in the NAAFI. Ethel's parents were Thomas CONSTABLE from Hinton Parva and Martha FISHER who lived at Inland Cottages, Lower Wanborough. The family had moved to West View, Church Road, when Clarence married Ethel in June 1943 at St. Andrew's Church. Following training and promotion to Sergeant, Clarence was posted to Bomber Command. On 3rd September 1943 his Lancaster took part in an attack on Berlin and while returning the pilot was forced to ditch the crippled plane. Clarence was one of three crew who died from exposure before the rescue launch arrived. On 16th September 1943, just one week before his 21st birthday, and three months after attending Clarence and Ethel's marriage, family and friends returned to St Andrew's Church for the funeral. The headstone is the second of four in the churchyard maintained by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission, and Clarence is also listed on the memorial in St Andrew's Church.
- 6. Herbert Stephen POTTER. Emmanuel POTTER was a farm labourer and shepherd who moved with his wife Frances in search of employment and accommodation. The couple lived at Charlton, where a son Herbert Stephen was born in 1899, moving later to villages around Devizes where daughters Kathleen and Ellen were born. Later the couple with their young family lived at Urchfont and Market Lavington. Herbert enlisted in the Hampshire Regiment in 1914 and later transferred to the Machine Gun Corps. Herbert died on 30th December 1919 from pneumonia at Basra and is buried at Kazvin British War Cemetery. After the war sister Kathleen married Robert PARSLEY and lived at Kings Lane Farm and younger sister Ellen married Charles FENN and lived at Marsh Farm. The sisters arranged for their parents to be buried at St Andrew's so they could visit the grave and also included a tribute to their brother which explains why Herbert, who had no known personal connection to Wanborough and is not included on the memorial plaque in St Andrew's Church, is remembered on a gravestone in the churchyard.
- 7. **Albert Edward PICKERING** Although the memorial in the church shows George Pickering the gravestone in the churchyard has the name Albert Edward Pickering. Was George the family name? Military records show Albert's birth county as Leicestershire in 1903 and that he was the foster-son of Phyllis SMITH who with her husband Percival SMITH, a carpenter and joiner, lived in the cottage that is now 12 Church Road. Albert enlisted as a corporal in the Lincolnshire Regiment and embarked for France in October 1939. He returned from Dunkirk and then spent the next four years training in various parts of the UK before taking part in the D-Day landings in June 1944. He was reported wounded on patrol just a couple of weeks later on 22nd June and died on 31st August 1944. Albert is buried in St. Andrew's churchyard, the third of four headstones in the churchyard that are maintained by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission and Albert is also listed on the memorial in St Andrew's Church.
- 8. **Gary NICHOLSON** Gary "Nic" NICHOLSON was born in Hull and joined the RAF in 1982. Initially he was posted for training at RAF Finningley and was awarded his Air Engineer brevet in 1983 before being posted on 14th April 1984 to RAF Lyneham where he started a long and distinguished career with the Hercules of 47 Squadron. On 31st January 2005 the Secretary of State for Defence issued a statement reporting the loss of a RAF Hercules and its crew of 10, including Gary, in Iraq. Although Gary was from Hull in Yorkshire and he was living at Stratton at the time of the disaster his love for Wanborough meant he chose the village as his final resting place and was buried here with full military honours. His headstone is the last of four maintained by the Commonwealth War Grave Commission in St Andrew's churchyard.



The Open University – My journey so far!

I was not fortunate enough, and most definitely not ready, to study for a degree when my college friends went off to university in 1984. I almost had the chance again 25 years ago and again 13 years ago, but the time wasn't right and I put it off. Last year I was guided to allow a little time for myself, having had to give so much to others. As a result of this, some hard work and a little good luck, I started to study with the Open University by taking an access course. I enjoyed the study and the ability to block out time in my diary just for myself. It was a great stepping stone to re-engaging in higher education and a distinction at the end was a bonus. I have now just completed the first of 6 modules of my Open Degree, am waiting for my final mark and getting ready to start the second module in October. Taking an Open degree means I can choose which subject modules I want to study and build a degree of my own choosing by earning the right number of credits.

When I started, I had to prioritise and clear down my diary and some of that reprioritising has not been met well by others. I have always coped well working alone, so studying alone was not an issue. I had to brush up on the study skills I left behind so many years ago, I was never good at writing essays! As a mature student, my life experiences have benefited my study. Viewing things from different perspectives and being able to apply this learning to every day experiences has benefited to my life.

On line learning is much more remote than class-based study so it is challenging to meet and make new friends and it can be isolating. On the plus side I have not had to deal with things like; leaving home for the first time, living in student accommodation, learning to cook and fend for yourself. My classroom is everywhere, including; the surgery waiting room where I studied after having my covid jab, on the train, at home and in the garden. Both the reading and on-line study materials are easy to use and I found the on-line tutorials helpful. The tutors repeat the tutorials at different times and days making it all flexible. Whilst the University try to support engaging with others, with forums, networking groups and inter study tutorials, I have not had time to engage with these opportunities.

All in all, I have enjoyed the learning experience, being a part time student allows me to fit in my life commitments. Like so many others my life has been through significant change, I want to embrace that change with both arms open. 18 months in, it will take me another 5 years before I graduate, assuming I get through it, but that is nothing compared to the length of time I have waited for the opportunity to try. The biggest challenge is not taking the degree, it is being able to manage others' expectations of myself whilst I do it. I am not doing this because I want a new career, although there is still time for that, or because someone else expects it of me, or because I need to. I am doing this because I want to, I am doing this for myself!

CHISELDON LOCAL HISTORY GROUP

Our next meeting will be on Wednesday 16th November, in the Church Hall at 7.30 p.m. Peter Petrie will talk to us on "Gloucester Cathedral Through The Ages". Gloucester Cathedral, formally the Cathedral Church of St Peter and the Holy and Indivisible Trinity, stands in the north of the city near the River Severn. It originated in 678 or 679 with the foundation of an abbey dedicated to Saint Peter (dissolved by Henry VIII). The most notable monument is the canopied shrine of Edward II who was murdered at nearby Berkeley

Castle in 1327. The building and sanctuary were enriched by the visits of pilgrims to this shrine. In a side-chapel is a monument in coloured bog oak of Robert Curthose, eldest son of William the Conqueror and a great benefactor of the abbey, who was interred there. Monuments of William Warburton (Bishop of Gloucester) and Edward Jenner are also worthy of note. The Abbey was the site of the coronation of Henry III on 28 October 1216. This is commemorated in a stained-glass window in the south aisle. More recently the cathedral has been used as a film and TV location, including Doctor Who, Harry Potter, The Hollow Crown, Mary Queen of Scots, and Wolf Hall.

Membership subscriptions are now £20 per year, with the subscription year starting in October. Visitor fees for non-members are £5 per meeting. The schedule will be published on the website (see below).
