Remembrance Day

Unfortunately due to the roof work at St Andrew's Church there wasn't a remembrance service in the village this year. However we did purchase some poppies from Royal British Legion (RBL) which were put up around the village to pay our respects and remember those who served for us. The aim is to reuse them next year but to still make our usual donation to the RBL.





Tree works

Parish Council have approved works to carry out some maintenance to the trees within the Council's ownership. This includes cutting back the large ash tree branch overhanging the play area at Church Meadow, removing the dead willow at the Lower Rec and cutting back the branch overhanging the footpath at the back of Hooper's Field. This work is due to be carried out at the beginning of December. Please note that Parish Council are only responsible for tree maintenance within Parish Council owned or leased land, all other tree maintenance is still the responsibility of Swindon Borough Council.

Village Maintenance

Our contractors, Idverde, are carrying out their winter maintenance and by the end of December they should have completed all hedge cutting that we are responsible for around the village. If you notice anything that you feel has been missed then please let us know.

The Handyman has been doing a great job of keeping our pavements clear of leaves, especially on Kite Hill where is can become very slippery. He has also made some improvements to the footpath from Callas Hill to level the path off and spread wood chip around the pond at Hooper's Field to soak up some of the mud. Please let us know if you think there is anything that you feel can be improved and we will look at what we can do.

Bulb planting - High Street

We have now completed the majority of the bulb planting on the High Street, where crocuses and daffodils have been planted. Platinum Jubilee wildlife boxes

As part of the Platinum Jubilee village celebrations we held a couple of workshops to make and decorate wildlife boxes. We have now started to put these up around the village within Council maintained areas.

Make sure you look out for them when you are out walking around the village.

Hooper's Field - Dogs on Lead



New signage around Hooper's Field has now been installed. Please show that you are a responsible dog owner and put your dog on a lead whilst walking across Hooper's Field. It's only within the sports field itself not within the surrounding Warneage Woods.

Just to clarify a few points raised by residents. The land at Hooper's Field was donated to the village for the purposes of providing a sports facility for the local area. As the land is owned by Parish Council we do not need to gain permission from Swindon Borough Council to implement a "dogs on lead" order on the sports field. We also confirm that there are no public footpaths across the sports field, the only public footpath is from the far north east corner (kissing gate from the field to the east of the sports field), which cuts across the

corner next to the pond, it doesn't go across the sports field.

Parish Council have a responsibility to the sports clubs and users to make the sports field a safe environment for those who use it. Putting an order to keep "dogs on lead" within the sports field is a decision that has been discussed at both Full Council and Hooper's Field committee meetings, it's a

decision that has been fully considered. It has been agreed that the Hooper's Field committee will be monitoring this over a one year period, which includes looking at other improvements such as signage and bins. We have recently installed a new bin next to the footpath from Rotten Row as part of those improvements.

Many thanks for your co-operation in this matter.



Allotments

During the weekend of 29th & 30th October, the allotment site was targeted by thieves with a number of allotment holders' sheds being broken into and tools stolen.

It is sad to report that this has happened, but we would like to remind everyone to be vigilant and to keep an eye out for any unusual behaviour.

At the allotment committee meeting on Monday 14th November a discussion took place in relation to the security of the site. With so many changes within the Wanborough Road area it may be that the Council will have to consider some sort of fence around the perimeter of the allotment site.

Please make sure that all incidents of crime are reported to the police, via 101, so that they have a record of all cases in the area.

Planning

Foxbridge Village North - Public Planning Inquiry

On the 11th November 2022 we received confirmation of the Planning Inspector's decision following on from the Planning Inquiry in October 2022.

It is disappointing to confirm that the Inspector has allowed the appeal, which means the developer will be granted permission.

The site, Foxbridge Village North, is an allocated site within the NEV as part of SBC's Local Plan, however the scheme that was being put forward by the applicant was not right for the area, being a high density development without the necessary supporting facilities, which Parish Council objected to. It is therefore disappointing that the Inspector has chosen to allow the appeal.

Land North Of Redlands Farm Wanborough Road

S/OUT/22/1415 - Land North Of Redlands Farm Wanborough Road - A Hybrid Planning Application for a residential development of 248 dwellings.

Police and Crime Commissioner Philip Wilkinson's Column

Policing has been under the microscope in the last year and I don't see this scrutiny letting up any time soon – and neither should it.

The public want their police force to keep them safe, protect vulnerable people, put victims first, catch the criminals responsible, produce quality investigations and lock the bad ones up.

Wiltshire Police has had its fair share of criticism. It has received a poor PEEL inspection report and is currently in 'special measures'. I can reassure you progress is being made and my scrutiny of that performance is ongoing.

We have had some solid successes too. You told me road safety and speeding was a key concern. I have committed investment into the roads policing unit, increasing the number of officers and cars by 20%.

We also tripled the capacity of the speed enforcement team, with extra police staff and state-of-the-art cameras. With this joined up approach, there are more traffic officers on our streets and there has been an increase of 42% of the number of people caught speeding and given tickets.

There is still more to do but our roads will become safer as the deterrent of speeding tickets and prosecution starts to bite.

The rural crime team has also doubled since I committed investment in the team and in extra equipment. I was also pleased with the force's commitment to visit all victims of home burglary – let me know if this doesn't happen and I will act on your behalf to scrutinise that commitment.

We are also in the process of recruiting the next Chief Constable of Wiltshire Police and I hope to have them confirmed in post by mid January. We look forward to welcoming them to the county.

In the meantime, our current Chief will carry on implementing the improvements needed to satisfy HM Inspectors and provide stability so the force can continue making Wiltshire safer for all.

Please also make sure you take part in my survey, taking place in December and January, which will ask you about your confidence levels in Wiltshire Police and about the policing precept for 2023/24.

It is important we capture as many people's thoughts as possible and you will find this on my website from mid December.

Wanborough St Andrews Church Roof Update After many setbacks and delays, I am pleased to report that work has now started on the replacement roof.

The costs of materials and labour has increased dramatically in the last year, and the prices quoted by contractors were far greater than the architect's original estimates. However, a loan from the Diocese of Bristol has been secured, which has enabled the Church Council to appoint a contractor, which means that work was able to start.

Fundraising is continuing, and will do so for many years to repay the loan.

Roof Project Costings and Funds

This has been a complex and difficult process but I can now give you some idea of what the costs are, and you will see that there are a lot more funds to be raised, with an expected shortfall of £68,285.

Total Roof Project Costs are projected to be £230,820 (gross), which includes the main contractor costs, cost of the temporary roof, fees for the church architect, professional investigations, surveys, planning and a faculty. Plus, a small contingency, which is planned to be used on a security alarm and a much needed deep clean of the church afterwards.

Whilst the Parochial Church Council's (PCC) General Funds was very healthy at the beginning of the year, the PCC funds available for this project have now diminished to £67,050, having already paid out £52,345 on costs to date. Thankfully, this project qualifies for The Listed Places of Worship (LPW) Grant Scheme which gives grants to cover the VAT incurred in making repairs to listed buildings in use as places of worship and as such I expect a further VAT reclaim of £31,140 will be made through the remainder of the project.

The Roof Committee have been delighted by the award of recent grant applications made by both the Benefact Trust (the charitable arm of the church insurers, Ecclesiastical) and the Wanborough Community Trust. The latter award of £12,000 was a great boost to the Project.

Applications have been made for a number of grants and we hope a few more may prove successful.

Fundraising efforts

A BIG thank you to everyone who has contributed so far. The response to the "Sponsor a Tile" campaign has been quite overwhelming with just over 50 donors raising £2,500. Fundraising events held to date, have brought in a further £1,240 including the Charity Fun Day, Bingo evening, collections at the Farmers Market, The Harrow Pub, and in church collections for the Jubilee celebrations, Tower Tours and at Wanborough Show. Thank you to all those that have volunteered time and help to the cause.

LIDDINGTON CLUMP

Liddington Hill is one of Swindon Borough's most visible landmarks and we have the privilege of it being in our Parish. At one end sits the Iron Age Fort and at the other a beautiful Clump of trees that for many mark their homecomings after days out or weeks away. Liddington Parish Council, in conjunction with the 2 landowners – for each end of the Hill is in the ownership of a different farmer – are in the process of applying for a grant to enhance both areas. Permissive paths take visitors to both of these ancient sites and we wish to ensure this continues for generations to come.

The original platform around the trig point at the Iron Age Castle collapsed earlier this year. We will be replacing the platform with a more robust structure that should last for many years to come, thereby enabling viewing of the trigpoint again.

The Clump has become a memorial garden with many areas marked out, some trees planted and headstones and other items placed to mark the passing of loved ones. We are looking at restoring this area to its natural state whilst providing a discreet 'frame of remembrance' that will provide space for small memorial plaques. The changes will be done sensitively and carefully and over a period of a year to give families and friends time to remove treasured keepsakes to alternative places.

We must keep in mind these areas are private land but also that people find great solace in their midst. The Parish Council feel the current plans for the way forward will ensure the natural beauty of the area is restored and will be in keeping with the ancient Ridgeway that brings people to that iconic place that is Liddington Hill.

Your Ridgeway Borough Councillor update - Gary Sumner:

My next Ward Surgery is 28th January at Wanborough Village Hall 9–11am – please call in if you have questions on any subject.

There is no Ward Surgery in December.

Looking back on 2022:

The year started with the fantastic news in January that the application to build an industrial scale **development at Inlands Farm had been refused by the Planning Inspector** after the appeal. I consistently spoke against the application both during the initial application, at the SBC Planning Committee (where it was refused) and during the appeal. A huge relief to us all when it was soundly rejected.

April saw a consultation on **my Borough Councillor request for 20mph speed zones** for the villages and later surveys were carried out to assess speeds. The locations were agreed with Parish Councils. I'm expecting the results in the next few weeks to see if any of our requests have been successful.

During the year I joined residents at litter picks in the Ridgeway Villages.

In April I started work on our entry for the annual Scarecrow Trail (we started doing this in 2005 – the year the trail started) and now my children are older, I continue the tradition.

In June I joined the **fantastic Platinum Jubilee celebrations** in our villages and in August my wife and I worked on the payment entry at the **Summer Show in Wanborough**.

June saw the **Wanborough Traffic Calming Scheme** implemented which was preceded by several site meetings with residents to accommodate changes and whilst not everyone agrees, the scheme has a long-term purpose to deter rat running through our village and to slow speeding. I've had many positive comments.

The closure of the Wanborough Road has caused much inconvenience and I requested that the road closure be lifted from November to mid-January to assist our pubs and residents in the build up to Christmas. Sadly, it will close again until June. Due to the location of drainage and services Conlon are unable to provide any access during their works. This is not an SBC project but the developers at Redlands.

Although it has gone over it's intended completion the **Southern Connector Road** is proceeding well and due to complete late next summer. Much of it has now had at least the first tarmac laid and will also have cycle ways and pavements. This road will serve thousands of new homes to be built and will not allow them to drive towards Wanborough.

The **Gigabit fibre project** is nearing the end with a few locations requiring difficult road closures that are scheduled in the next few months. The two years of work which I started in April 2020 have certainly been welcomed by those connected.

During the year I also deal with residents enquiries from housing, parking, flooding, planning, road defects, noise, nuisance and around the villages I report potholes, road and pavement defects, tree problems. If you have a question please contact me.



Cycle Trip in France

'Well it must be downhill' was my immediate reaction to an email from friends inviting us to join them cycling from Geneva to the Mediterranean. It sounded absolutely crazy but there was something strangely appealing in the challenge; we love France and we knew we'd enjoy the time with our friends, so why not?

That was before lockdown and the plan had been to embark on this crazy undertaking in September 2020, then Covid happened. So, 2 years later, after some local training rides (the first of which this year involved a broken arm requiring surgery - not a brilliant start you could say) we set off with a mended arm, serviced bikes and a good deal of trepidation, in mid September.

Andrew and Daphne Green used to live in Liddington but emigrated to Canada 16 years ago; we've kept in touch, visited each other but never done anything like this with them.

They have done some long rides in North America and helpfully sent us a packing list for the panniers Will was to carry. It was very brief; essentially 3 x cycling kit each, a few other clothes for our rest days and toiletries. Since I don't usually travel light or go anywhere without a hairdryer and several books, this in itself was a challenge.



Travelling with bikes on French trains isn't straightforward (unless they're folding Bromptons) so we flew to Geneva with our bikes semi dismantled in huge cardboard bike boxes (thanks to Mitchells) clutching the rest of our belongings in a small bag.

So our first task in Geneva was to reassemble the bikes and get our heads round what we were doing (while watching the Queen's funeral in our Airbnb).

The route we were to take is the Via Rhona, which loosely follows the Rhone from the Alps to the sea; it is largely on designated cycle tracks though there are some stretches on quiet roads and a few on quite busy roads especially near the big cities.

Coming out of Geneva during rush hour in the cold, crisp morning air on busy roads crisscrossed with tram lines was a potentially hazard laden start. But having successfully negotiated our way through, with our nerves intact, we soon emerged into the quiet and peaceful countryside where the sky was blue, the air warmed up and the views of Mont Blanc were stunning: it was exhilarating, scenic and altogether rather wonderful

(By the way, it's not all downhill; we climbed over 2,500' feet that day.)

On the second day, shortly before arriving at our hotel (think Escape to the Chateau) Andrew encountered a serious problem and his pedal came off rendering his bike unrideable. Our host kindly tried to fix it with PTFE tape but it was soon evident that we needed a specialist bike shop, the nearest being about 10 km away. It was by then 6pm and the shop closed at 7. Before we knew it, our host, who we'd really only just met, put the back seats of his car down, lifted the bike in, set the satnav and, to our astonishment handed us the keys. Ignoring protestations, he said he couldn't come, he was preparing our Dinner. Since I was the appointed French speaker for the trip I went with Andrew – once he'd worked out how to start an all-electric car. The shop had the exact Shimano part required and all was fixed so in less than an hour we were back, incredibly grateful for the kindness and generosity shown us by our host/chef. It certainly made a good story to share with our fellow diners that evening!

Perhaps it was because we were relatively late in the season that there were not many other cyclists on the route; we often had long undulating stretches of track more or less to ourselves, sometimes bordered by vineyards, at others sunflower and lavender fields and often within sight of the vast river and its countless bridges. The mornings were always cool/cold but clear and sunny with the promise of fine weather ahead – that undoubtedly helped us on our way; we might have resorted to doing sections by train had we had much rain.... We're not that hardy!

After 3 days of cycling we reached Lyon where we were to spend 2 nights and have our first 'rest day'. We've often driven past, or flown into but never visited Lyon so enjoyed having the time to explore the city *on foot*, taking in the historic sights and sitting at pavement cafés watching the world go by.

From there to Tournon and Montelimar (home of nougat) where we stayed in a lovely little hotel, a member of the Porsche Touring Club. I think they're more used to having the drivers of rather smart cars than cyclists with heavily laden bikes. Then on to Avignon, home of the famous Pont as well as a papal palace and lots of beautiful shaded squares, museums, churches and pretty shops. While Daphne, Will and I admired these on our rest day, Andrew 'did the Ventoux', a gruelling section of the Tour de France. A triumph deserving an excellent meal out that evening.

From Avignon it was 72 miles to Port St Louis, on the Mediterranean coast. Our route was fairly flat taking us through the Camargue with wild white horses, pink flamingos, salt flats and a huge number of wind turbines. It was very windy (against us sadly) and they must have been generating enough power for the south of France. But there on the beach was a huge sign marking the end of the route, 850km (about 530 miles) if you go round Lake Geneva, a bit less if like us, the start was Geneva. Port St Louis is an industrial area so not a typical Mediterranean beach nevertheless we dipped our front wheels in the sea and headed to our hotel feeling a huge sense of achievement and even now, I can hardly believe we did it!



There was one more day in the saddle before we finished; our route took us north again following the Via Rhona as far as

Arles (and past Van Gogh's famous 'Bridge at Arles') where we turned off towards Nimes for our final few days relaxing, reflecting, exploring the beautiful city of Nimes and, in a hire car visiting some of the surrounding area (Pont du Gard, Aigues Mortes and the almost endless sandy beach at L'Espiguette) and of course, sourcing cardboard boxes for the return journey.....

Would I do it again?

Definitely.

(Rumour has it there's a route from Vienna to Salzburg along the Danube. Sounds good.)

Where has all our wildlife gone?

With the sad news that the bird flu has hit Swindon, it is ever more concerning that I have not seen as many of our summer migrant birds this year. Notable absentees included Burt, the Corn Bunting, and Wally, the Yellow Wagtail, made famous from his magazine front cover photo back in 2018. There has been no sign of Wally or any of his descendants amongst the crops in the fields on the chalky plain of The Hollow this summer. Whilst there were early sightings of Burt, he did not settle and nest this year, he has kept 3 wives happy in the past and last year managed to tolerate a neighbouring Corn Bunting, whose patch overlooked the valley to the East, and has also been absent.

Added to this our precious protected plant, the yellow vetchling, has had a bad season, and we had a very poor showing of our usual abundance of butterflies along The Hollow verges. Sadly, we have lost of one of the two colonies of Vetchling plants. The young plants were crushed by vehicles crossing the verge and they are unlikely to regrow in this location as the soil has become compacted. The remaining colony only managed 7 plants this year to produce the next seasons seeds. Other annuals I usually spot along the verge were notable absentees as well, Yellow Rattle being one that helps keep the grass down, supporting the growth of the Yellow Vetchling.

So, what has kept these favourite little birds away? Is it the weather changes we have had this year, the bird flu perhaps cutting their lives short, changes to the crops grown impacting on the suitability of nesting sites or a reduction in the wild flowers and insects they feed their babies on? I am sorry I don't know the answer. It could well be a local indicator of the world environmental issues we hear of on a daily basis. I sincerely hope that this is just a bad year and that they all return next Spring in abundance. Our winter migrants are arriving as I write. I have this week seen and heard the Redwings chattering in the tall trees on my way up the hill, albeit in smaller numbers than usual. It lifts my heart to see these little travellers as they visit us for the season. To lose any of them would be a terrible thing.
