Dear Friends

At last I feel I can buy the Easter Eggs for the grandchildren! I shouldn't be surprised that they were on the supermarket shelves the week after Christmas, alongside chocolate bunnies, and next to the reduced packs of Christmas cards – for that seems to be a regular feature in the past few years. Add to that the fact that Hot Cross Buns are on sale all year, it is not surprising that the story of Holy Week and Easter gets 'watered down'.

There is so much drama and passion in the events of Holy Week and Easter and it is good to be reminded of the story that moves along so quickly. The Christian Church begins Holy Week with Palm Sunday, when we remember Jesus coming into Jerusalem riding on a donkey. Excited people were waving palm branches and laying them on the road in front of Jesus. They were shouting 'Hosanna, hosanna to the King of David' – although this was not the kind of king that rode a magnificent horse and wearing purple with a crown on his head. The crown that would be placed on Jesus' head later in the week would be a crown of thorns.

On Maundy Thursday we recall Jesus washing his disciples' feet, taking the form of a servant in a gesture of humility. Then sharing a supper of bread and wine with his disciples, an event we remember each time we celebrate the Holy Communion. We then remember it was this night that Jesus was betrayed, arrested and mocked by the authorities, as well as the people crying 'Crucify Him'.

On Good Friday we remember the crucifixion and the death of Jesus on the cross, wearing the crown of thorns. In Bishopstone our service begins in Church and then the cross is carried to the top of the hill, with the readings and prayers of the Stations of the Cross along the way.

Then, with the dramatic events of Holy Week in our minds and on our hearts we come to the most joyful day of Easter. This is when we celebrate the Risen Christ who conquered death and we give thanks and praise that we can share in his life. It is the event that stands at the very heart of the Christian faith – speaking of new life, new hope and renewed faith.

As we break into our Easter Eggs this year let us remember that it reminds us of Jesus bursting out of the tomb into the glorious light of day and new life.

Foxhill Phonebox - refurbishment

We are pleased to confirm that the refurbishment of the phonebox at Foxhill is now complete. For those who remember the phonebox was in a very poor state of repair, the front door was rotten, paint peeling off and some of the windows broken.









The refurbishment was completed in stages, first the door frame had to be replaced, Paul from Foxhill Cottages very kindly carried out this work, charging only the cost of materials. Once the new door was installed, the whole phone box needed sanding down, priming and painting, this work was carried out by Graham our Handyman.









The paint used on the box needed to be the correct "red" paint that had to be purchased from a specific supplier.

Once painted we were then in a position to install the new defibrillator cabinet purchased by Parish Council. The cabinet had to be suitable for a phonebox with low voltage which was recommended to us by Community Heartbeat. The cabinet was installed by CTS Electrical Services LTD, who again only charged us for materials and gave their labour charge for free.

We are very pleased with the final result, transforming a derelict phonebox into a lovely village asset. This is the 4th defibrillator we now have in the Parish.

With special thanks to Martin Rowley for donating the defibrillator, Great Moorleaze Farm for the donation towards the material costs, Paul from Foxhill for giving up his time to replace the phonebox door, CTS Electrical Ltd for installing the cabinet and to everyone else who have been behind the scenes organising the work. It has been a great team effort.

Church Meadow Play Area - New fence

Many thanks to everyone who submitted their preference with regards to installing a new fence around the play area at Church Meadow. The survey monkey results showed that 63% were in favour of the Parish Council investing in a new fence.

The Planning, Finance & Policy Committee at their meeting on 10th March discussed the quotes received and options and have agreed to put forward a recommendation to Full Council to approve a quote to install a fence. We will provide further details on this soon.

Village Maintenance

Lovely to see the spring bulbs in bloom on the High Street. Three new planters have been ordered for the High Street and we are looking forward to installing these over the next few months. If successful the plan is to purchase further planters in the future.

Footpath WA14 (From Oakapple Close along next to Springlines)

Parish Council have met with SBC Rights of Way Officer who have confirmed that they will be installing a new surface on the footpath that runs from Oakapple Close up the side of Springlines to the top of the hill. The footpath will be 2 metres wide, with wooden edges and fully tarmaced. While the work is being carried out the footpath will be closed for a period of 6 weeks. Construction access will be via Springlines Meadow, so again access to the field may be restricted from the footpath side of the field. Work is due to be carried out over the summer most likely in June / July, but we will confirm the exact date nearer to the time. Please look out for further details on our website and facebook page.

Planning

S/RES/23/0026 - Redlands Primary School

At the Parish Council meeting on 27th February 2023, Parish Council unanimously agreed to object to the proposed design of the new Primary School at the Redlands development site. Parish Council are not objecting to the school itself and realise a school is needed. However the design that is currently being proposed is not in keeping with the rural setting, especially as the school will be located on the southern boundary of the site, closest to Wanborough. The current design shows a 13.2m high building, built in materials more in keeping with an urban environment on the outskirts of the rural countryside, within sight of the North Wessex Downs AONB. Parish Council have requested that the application be considered by SBC Planning Committee if the Planning Officer is minded to grant permission. Full details of Parish Council's objection and plans can be found on Swindon Borough Council's planning portal using the above reference.

Highways

Parish Council have recently attended a couple of meetings, the first with Conlon to discuss Wanborough Road works. The aim of the meeting was to provide us with an update on their proposed work schedule. They have confirmed that the road is currently due to re-open at the end of July 2023. The main reason given for such a long road closure is that they need to install a storm drain from Redlands down the middle of the road to Wanborough. We have raised a number of questions with them to see how this work schedule can be reduced, plus the Wanborough Roads Working Party are also working hard, with regular meetings, to look at what can be done as well. A further update next month.

The second meeting was with Swindon Borough Council to discuss the Southern Connector Road (SCR). The main purpose of the meeting was for SBC to provide Parish Council with an update. Parish Council had a number of questions including asking if The Marsh could be opened ahead of the SCR being fully complete. The meeting was positive but since the meeting SBC's Officer has backtracked on some of things he offered to consider. Again we will keep you updated on any progress on this.

The next Full Parish Council meeting of the Council is due to be held on Monday 24th April 2023 at Wanborough Village Hall starting at 7.30pm.

Wanborough St Andrews Church Roof Update

I am pleased to report that the St Andrews Church is once again fully roofed. The final tile has been put in place, and the scaffolding has been removed.

The work was completed during the first week of March, and subject to receipt of final invoices, it was completed within budget. The final site meeting with the church architect and contractor took place in mid-March, when the responsibility of the church, and the keys, were handed back to the churchwarden and PCC.

Roof Project Costings and Funds

There has been little change to the financial position, and the Total Roof Project Costs are still projected to be in the region of £230,000 (gross). Income from grant applications, donations and fund-raising continues to be received which has reduced the shortfall to just over £45,000.

Sponsor a Tile Campaign

The response to the "Sponsor a Tile" campaign has been quite overwhelming, and Roof Committee members are delighted with the support of over 109 donors raising £5410.00.

This fund raising initiative will shortly be ending, but it's not too late to have your donation to the Roof Project recorded on the Framed Document to be mounted in church.

The churchwardens and PCC are keen to re-open the church for worship as soon as possible, but there is still work to be done inside the church:

- The church interior needs a good top to toe clean, and it is hoped that a professional cleaning company will be doing this
- The organ needs to have all protective covering removed, and then it will need its annual service
- The contents of the church, church brass, hymn books, kneelers, etc. all need to be replaced in their rightful place

Your Ridgeway Borough Councillor update - Gary Sumner: There is no Ward Surgery in April - please call or email me if you have questions on any subject.

Commonhead Roundabout:

Residents will have seen the works being undertaken on the Commonhead roundabout and by the time this article is being read, they should be completed. These works are to partly signalise the junction of the Southern Connector Road (Pack Hill) with the Commonhead to allow traffic to enter the roundabout without the extended waits we sometime see and to allow for the many additional cars which will use it in the future. For those who have asked about the 'bump' in the ground on Pack Hill leaving the village by Great Moorleaze this is a BT/Openreach asset under the road which they have to remove but have not yet specified a date. It is not anticipated that a closure will be required to carry this work out.

Wanborough Road: Work continues as planned, but I have had to speak to both Conlon and the Redlands developers and their contractor about working practices and at times the unacceptable condition of the road for those who live along it. Deliveries are being made to Conlon via the village for the road works, but all deliveries to the Redlands Grove housing site are via Covingham (and when opened this will be via the Southern Connector Road). I understand the first houses should be completed in June so hopefully an added incentive to see the Wanborough Road opened again without delay.

Road & Highways issues:

I had a 'Ward walk' (actually a drive) around Wanborough, Liddington & Bishopstone with the Head of Highways from Swindon Borough Council at the start of March to highlight some of the requests I have made for safety issues as well as to show him the condition of some of the roads such as Kite Hill and The Street in Liddington. By driving over the many potholes I was able to clearly demonstrate that these two roads in particular are in an unacceptable state for residents. Further updates in due course.

20mph zones:

The survey results are back for High Street and The Beanlands and I'm talking to the Highways team about next steps. Further updates in due course.

A beautiful and unusual moth that looks like a Hummingbird in flight appears to have had a bumper year in 2022, with an estimated ten-fold increase in sightings reported across the UK.

Wildlife charity Butterfly Conservation have reported an influx of people getting in touch with them last summer after spotting the insects, with many stating that it was the first time they had seen the species.

Unlike many moth species, Humming-bird Hawk-moths are often spotted during the day, hovering at flowers while feeding on nectar using their inch-long, curved proboscis.

The species is an immigrant from southern Europe and North Africa, and can now occur widely across the UK, with sightings reported across England, Wales, Scotland and Ireland in 2022.

Humming-bird Hawk-moths are usually seen flying between May and September, but there are occasional sightings of them throughout the year and several have already been reported this year. They are found in many habitats, including gardens, which is where many of the people who reported their sighting to Butterfly Conservation spotted them.

The insects particularly like tubular flowers with a good supply of nectar, so if you are keen to attract them to your garden this summer, having plants like honeysuckle, buddleia or red valerian might help. The moth will dart from flower to flower as it feeds, looking very much like the Hummingbird it is named after.



Drought Tolerant Gardening

Those who know me will agree that I love to plan! Early spring is a great time to start preparations for possibly another dry summer so this month, we're having a quick look at drought resistant gardening techniques.

Drought resistant gardening is all about preparation and 'right plant / right place, it's super easy and suitable for all gardens all year round!

The following tips will help make your garden more resistant to the possibility of drought conditions.



- Cultivate your soil deeply will help to retain water and make it accessible for your prize plants, it also improved soil structure.
- Digging large quantities of organic matter e.g., well-rotted garden compost, composted bark or leaf mould, well-rotted farmyard manure or mushroom compost will help no end.
- Try to choose plants which suit your garden soil type and aspect, they will be more tolerant of varying climatic conditions as well as pest and disease problems.
- Plant things whilst they are still small. It's very cost effective and they'll develop much greater resilience as they adapt to their conditions from a young age, they'll also repay your patience with beautiful healthy blooms.
- Choose plants with grey green or silver leaves, they reflect the sun's rays, helping to conserve moisture.
- remove weeds regularly to prevent them depriving your plants of water.
- Thoroughly watering all new plants and keep them watered in the first season after planting so they establish well.
- Mulch: After planting, mulch the bed with two to three inches of gravel, or better still, a layer of compost or straw
 covered with gravel, to help retain that precious moisture.

Early spring to do list

At last spring arrives! By mid-March frequently sunny days provide an opportunity for a range of gardening tasks and it's time to get busy preparing seedbeds, sewing seeds, cutting back winter shrubs (if you haven't already) and generally tidying up around the garden.

- Plant onions and early potatoes! Growing-your-own means, you'll always have this versatile vegetable to hand, and they'll taste amazing.
- Lift and divide, overgrown clumps of perennials and replant them straight away or share/swap with a friendly neighbour. Once they have finished flowering you can also lift and divide large clumps of snowdrops 'in the green', to give you a wonderful additional display, next year.
- Top dress containers with fresh compost
- If you must mow the lawn: Try and do it on a dry day and please consider leaving some wilder longer grass for the insects.
- Hoe and mulch weeds to keep them under early control.
- Protect new spring shoots from slugs. Please consider the hedgehogs and other animals and choose "hedgehog friendly" slug, pellets, or take a bag with you to the hairdressers for your trimmings'. It works better than you might think!

Sadly our meeting in March had to be cancelled due to the bad weather, Our speaker Mandy Bradshaw was coming from Cheltenham and as the forecast for more snow that evening made it very unwise for her to travel. However, we hope to arrange another date for her to come and give us her talk on a date yet to be decided.

I hope all your gardens have survived the cold snap and that the real spring is just around the corner.

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

Some Confessions of an Antiques Dealer

The year was 1964 and we had just experienced a very cold and long winter the year before. Some of us may still have memories of that. I was 17, fresh out of school after a fruitless education involving my passage through the halls of several minor but costly private schools. With no qualifications how would I be able to earn a crust? My father thought he had the answer; he was in charge of a company that managed the imports of tobacco into the Port of Bristol. It must be possible to find a place for the boy within the company. Perhaps a trainee accountant or office clerk? However, the very thought of sitting behind a desk and organising numbers filled me with dread; there must be another way to earn a decent living! Eventually I was persuaded by my father to accept a post as a warehouse boy working in a firm of Stationers in the centre of Bristol. My father knew a man etc. The starting wage was £5 a week.

While working in the Warehouse it was then that fate lent me a hand. My boss in the stationers was interested in history. He had written several papers on the old Bristol Potteries and was a member of Bristol and Gloucestershire Archaeological Society. Ken had close ties with the Bristol Museum and worked as a volunteer in his spare time.

At this time in Bristol, the city was undergoing many changes. This involved sweeping demolition of some old parts of the city in order to accommodate the needs of the motor car and to relocate many of the residents to in and out of town tower blocks and new estates. One of these mass demolitions took place on one of the hill slopes bordering the centre of the city. Kingsdown was a complete Georgian suburb built in the mid 18th Century. Mostly Georgian terraces with gardens some of which had stone grottos and caves. There were also larger houses with grand entrances and lavish interiors. The whole hillside had to be cleared to make way for the concrete tower blocks which still stand there today.

(According to Bristol Civic Society. " The destruction of Bristol's most important



suburb in the 1960's was perhaps the worst of all the crimes committed in Bristol in the name of progress since the Second World War").

As a Museum volunteer, Ken was given the keys to any empty houses in Kingsdown prior to demolition. His task was to rescue any fittings and features of interest and arrange for their removal to the Museum. One day, as we were taking a break in the basement tea room at the stationers, he asked me if I was interested in history and archaeology. I said yes, and recalled digging holes in the garden at home when I was younger in the search for treasure. The only thing I found was a spent incendiary bomb from the Second World War! Ken said, well, then we can start here. Do you realise that you're leaning against the original Bristol City wall which



dates to the 12th Century and under our feet is the Moat? Then he asked me if I was interested in taking time out in the lunch break and climbing up the hill to Kingsdown, He had to pick up some keys from the City Council offices and check out a few empty houses before imminent demolition. Well yes! This sounded very interesting so I tagged along.

So off we went up the hill. As we climbed away from the centre of town, I could make out what appeared to be a scene from a war film. Half demolished houses, dust, debris and the roar of diggers and bulldozers. The houses that Ken had the keys for were in the middle of this chaos. Ken explained what we were looking for. Any architectural features such as alcoves, staircases and in the fireplaces, delft pottery tiles. Any unusual features that were original to the houses. Delft fireplace tiles were difficult to spot as they were black with 200 years of soot. Ken had a special tool which he used to prise the tiles away from the fireplace and avoid breaking them. We couldn't see what the scenes on the tiles were but it was incredible when later in the day we could clean them off to reveal the picture beneath the soot. we found light fittings in one hallway comprising carved eagles holding metal rings in their talons to support the light. We found a bubble glass window which is now in the American Museum near Bath. It is displayed as a good example of Bristol made glass which was exported to America in the 18th Century. We occasionally had to balance on exposed beams as the floorboards had been removed. We found boxes of tiles in the basement of one house which had been left by the builders in the 18th Century!

We presented our finds every week to the Museum; some of the tiles we were allowed to keep as they were repeats of others in their collection.

After that first foray, I was hooked. I looked forward to our lunchtime treasure hunts. After a while, I had collected a reasonable amount of "unwanted" treasure which was rejected by the Museum. I knew next to nothing about Antiques but I was keen to learn. I then asked Ken if he fancied opening an Antique shop with me. He was tempted but he had family commitments which would make it difficult for him. However, he encouraged me to do so and would help out when he could.

So began my search for a premises. I approached the Estates department of the local Council; they offered me a Georgian shop with living accommodation above. It was on the wrong end of town but I reckoned that I could draw customers to the shop. (Antique shops were usually in secondary positions but enthusiasts sought them out.) The shop and flat rent combined was £4 a week!

So there I stood, ready to embark on a prosperous journey into the Antiques World. In the next 50 years I would encounter Specialists, Experts, Craftsmen, Crooks and Con men, also quite a lot of misfits who were in one way or other connected to the trade. An exciting journey, but it was the Swinging Sixties, I was 18 years old, there were plenty of distractions, so not as straightforward as I had hoped!

In the course of my work I would travel all over the UK, make my way to the Continent and undertake buying trips in France, Spain and Portugal and eventually get to live and work in the USA. Everywhere I went I would search for treasure, always hoping to locate that special piece!

Finally, many thanks to you Ken, you saved me from that Office job!


