














No need to book, bring a mat or towel.

All residents are welcome to attend and raise questions during public questions near the start of the meeting.



Wanborough Roads Action Group (WRAG)

The Wanborough Roads Action Group was formed by residents following a packed public meeting in January. The Group has formed various teams to look at the different problems facing residents.

In the past few weeks, one team has contacted the senior officers of the various developers and contractors working on the SCR and Redlands Grove. So far replies have been received from Buckingham (SCR), Vistry (Phase 1 of Redlands Grove. marketed as Bovis and Linden) and Bellway (Phase 2 of Redlands Grove), but no response has been received from Conlon (contractor for Wanborough Road works).

The response has been disappointing – the usual excuses about archaeology, unknown services, redesign requiring permission from Swindon Council – and now there is even a suggestion of one project blaming the other.



More Road Closures? More HGV's?

Plans have recently been submitted for the remaining section of Wanborough Road from Redlands to Covingham. The proposal is to reduce the road width from 7+m to 5.5m and include a 3m wide footpath and cycleway.



It has been suggested that the Southern Connector Road will be open to site traffic for this work and for Lotmead housing. BUT it has also been confirmed that SBC is unable to enforce Site Traffic Management plans and Vistry have indicated that they consider "it is a very small percentage [of site traffic] that get it wrong".

With the possibility of many more years of HGVs following sat nav, like this lorry at Pack Hill and one stuck at The Marsh, WRAG also has a team exploring ways to ensure Wanborough roads are designated NO SITE ACCESS.






Wanborough St Andrews Church Roof FINAL Update

Since June 2022, I have tried to keep you all informed of the progress of Wanborough Roof Project. I have received many comments and thanks for the updates in the Lyden, and as the Roof Committee bring the Project to a close, this is probably my last contribution to the Lyden Magazine on this subject, but others might write about church services and fund raising events, in the coming months. I would like to thank everybody who has supported and contributed to the Roof Project.

Following receipt of the final account from the main contractor, we have now removed various contingencies and can report that the Total Roof Project Costs should fall to £220,000 (gross). Income from grant applications, donations and fund-raising continues to be received, which have reduced the shortfall to just over £36,000.



Recent fundraising has been successful. First the Community Café at the March Farmers Market kindly offered to donate the charity contributions to the Roof Fund and many people signed up to the Sponsor a Tile Campaign, this amounted to £500 approx. Following on from that, the sell-out Quiz Night raised over £1,800. The Roof Committee extends their thanks to all who worked so hard in organising and supporting these fundraising events. It really has been wonderful to see the Village pulling together for the church, and having such a fantastic time too.

The church was professionally cleaned just before Easter, and the organ was due to be serviced and tuned after Easter, with the first church service taking place at Wanborough on St Georges Day, Sunday 23 April.

Sponsor a Tile Campaign

The "Sponsor a Tile" campaign is being wound down, but it is not too late to show your support for the Roof Project. Final donations will be accepted until **15th May 2023.** The support for the campaign has been quite overwhelming, and Roof Committee members are delighted with the support of over 130 donors raising over £7,200.00.

Your Ridgeway Borough Councillor update - Gary Sumner: Ward Surgery is 27th May 9-10.30 at Wanborough Village Hall.

Southern Connector Road:

Works are proceeding well for a summer completion with considerable tree planting, the bridge over the Liden Brook going well and this will be the future route for all of the construction traffic for both Redlands and Lotmead. When completed this will make 'Manners Wood' (left of Pack Hill going down) more accessible. Hopefully the pupils from Wanborough Primary School will be impressed to see the trees we planted growing well.

I'm also sure that the cycle route and pavement from Commonhead to Wanborough Road will be popular which will join up with the new pavement along Wanborough Road. There will be updates forthcoming on the archaeological works and findings.

The connection to Commonhead will include a new pedestrian crossing across the slip road and signals are being installed to aid access onto the Commonhead roundabout.

20mph zones:

I supported the Beanlands/Magdalen Road 20mph zone primarily for the safety of school children and younger residents. The school are also supportive and part of the signage will include (at my request) signs designed by the school children to remind us why it is there. This will now lead to a formal consultation before implementation. The High Street traffic calming had already reduced average speeds to 24mph, so I am not in favour of proceeding with a 20mph scheme there and this was discussed with the Parish Council. That will now not go ahead. Part of my recent Ward walk with the head of Highways was also to look at issues like the narrow pavement on the corner of Church Road from Ham Road which is dangerous to pedestrians – particularly those with push chairs.

Road & Highways issues:

I am pleased that potholes have been filled on Kite Hill, Church Road, The Street (Liddington) and Pack Hill, but this replicates roads all around both the Borough and surrounding Wiltshire, Berkshire & Oxfordshire Roads. On Kite Hill I have requested additional work and Highways are looking at a more comprehensive scheme to remedy the issues with the road surface. I had Highways out again which stopped the spring water flooding down the road by jetting the gulleys and that will be monitored.

BISHOPSTONE WITH HINTON PARVA WI

As many of you may know, the late Queen Elizabeth II was a member of Sandringham WI and was in fact their President and always attended the January meeting. The National Federation of WI's asked individual WI's to mark what would have been the Queen's 97th birthday in April.

INSPIRING WOMEN

We were fortunate at our April meeting to be joined by Sarah Troughton, His Majesty's Lord



Lieutenant of Wiltshire and a newly appointed Companion to the Queen Consort. Sarah lives in Wanborough and was appointed to the post of Lord Lieutenant in 2012. This was the first time that Wiltshire had a female in this role since the post was originally created in the 16th century. Sarah is His Majesty's personal representative in Wiltshire and her first and foremost duty is to 'uphold the dignity of the crown'.

Sarah explained that she undertakes some 150 engagements a year across the whole of Wiltshire. These may include the planning, welcoming, and escorting of Royal visitors to

the county, participating and supporting British Citizenship Ceremonies and working closely with the Armed Forces. Sarah has also been busy planting trees as part of The Queen's Green Canopy initiative.

Some of our members shared their royal anecdotes. Maggie Simons recounted how she met The Queen at The Royal Albert Hall at the WI Centenary celebrations and found herself telling Her Majesty that she couldn't remove a rolled up banner from the cushion on which it was placed......not many people get to say 'no' to the Queen! Clare McGlashan shared her experiences of attending a WI garden party and, as any good WI member would, commented on how delicious the cakes were. Happy Gardens!

Hi Folks! This month, I thought it might be useful to introduce you to gravel gardens because they really suit the Mediterranean-style- drought tolerant planting that I mentioned in my last article and need little, if any watering.

Gravel Gardens


I'm going to jump straight into the pro's and cons before you decide whether this style of garden is right for you!

- On the plus side: Gravel gardens (once established) are low maintenance, need little watering or care and encourage wildlife. They really suit a sunny, well-drained spot, especially if it has sandy or gravelly soil that hasn't been improved - think of those awkward spots full of builder's rubble, neglected rockeries or perhaps close to a house wall where little grows, or where the removed base of an old shed or patio used to be, this could be the planting solution you re looking for. it's also fun to watch where the plants decide to travel to! Plants such as Cistus, Santolina and Phlomis thrive in gravel and provide an abundance of nectar and pollen for our visiting insect friends.
- Gravel gardens can be a little bit needy for the first few years until the plants are established and have grown large enough to supress other unwanted plants. You will need to weed for a growing season or three, even with the use of landscape fabric (more on that to follow). They're also not suited to rich or clay soils or areas with a high-water table. Lastly, the plants can sometimes have a mind of their own, so if you like everything ordered, this style might not be for you!

Beth Chatto was a great proponent of gravel gardens and ahead of her time as both a horticulturalist and designer, her famous Gravel Garden in Colchester was created on a former car park, it's never watered and is a sight to behold. View it at www.bethchatto.co.uk or on my web site *https://janepearsondesign.com/blog where you will find a link.

It's easy to make a gravel garden:

- Choose a sunny spot with well-drained soil.
- If you don't want your plants to self-seed then lay landscape fabric over your soil and cut crosses to insert each plant root ball (without doubt this method is tidier, but here's Beth Chatto's gravel garden the spoiler, given time, weeds will still germinate in the gravel but your specimen plants can't multiply to crowd them out, which seems a shame). I'm currently in the process of pulling up inherited membrane from our own front garden to let everything spread.



- Choose local gravel, its often cheaper and is more likely to match your surrounds.
- Visit my web site for a selection of suitable plants or call me to have bespoke plant lists with care instructions made- just for you- Then plant up and water sparingly until everything is established, sit back, relax, and enjoy the show!

Gravel Garden Hints & Tips

- To stop small new plants becoming swamped by gravel, plant them into a small mound to raise them slightly above the gravels level.
- Avoid using limestone chippings if you want to grow acid-loving plants.
- To blend in nicely, try to match the gravels colour with other paved or stone structures in your garden.
- Choose medium rather than fine grade gravel (20mm or more) It's easier to walk on and cats wont mistake it for kitty-litter!

Gardening tasks to do in May.

- Check for nesting birds before clipping your hedges!
- Lift and divide overcrowded clumps of daffodils and other spring flowering bulbs.
- Mow lawns but please consider leaving some areas uncut for wildlife.
- Open greenhouse vents & doors on warm days
- Get your hoe out and hoe off weeds.
- Earth up potatoes and (note to self!) promptly plant any remaining.
- Hold off planting out summer bedding until the end of May, however tempting the sunshine seems, it's still possible to have late frosts.



No-Mow May!

Take part in Countryfile's #NoMowMay and see your lawn spring to life with flowers, bees, and other pollinators.

The Countryfile web site suggests that "Gardeners, councils and landowners across the UK are gearing up for No Mow May, letting their lawns, verges and grasslands grow freely to give nature a boost. It's not too late to take part this year – any break from your routine mowing will enable bees, butterflies, and other wildlife to get a much-needed boost this spring. All you have to do is resist the urge to cut the lawn during the month of May- Last year's results showed that gardeners who took part reported up to 250 species of plants, including Wild Garlic wild strawberry, declining Orchids and the meadow flower snakeshead fritillary, flowering within the grasses." The lovely editor might even print your 'No Mow' photo's?! Last year my partner gave it a try and left unmown strips of grass in our long but narrow lawn, to our delight we discovered orchids. Try mowing pathways or glades through your lawn and leaving the rest. The possibilities are endless!

They specialise in unusual and rare plants, all raised in the nursery and Paul brought along a large selection to show us. He explained the virtues of each variety, its size, shape, colour, care, hardiness and the best location to plant it.



We also learned why so many of us lost plants during last winter. It was not so much to do with the actual temperature as the rapid change from mild(14 degrees) when they were still growing, to well below zero (-10 degrees) for a sustained period. Apparently those evergreens with larger leaves are more likely to be affected. Not surprisingly many of us went home with a selection of plants fill those gaps and Paul was happy with a much lighter load in his van at the end of the evening!

It's been a roller-coaster, challenge after challenge. Hannah endured, never bent and her poems are a testimony to the positive. Several poems stayed with me. This one about her mother's solution to an argument:

I felt Mum's silence in the car, the negative pull until I was a black hole sucking everything into my void,

except her. She sat on the edge of Nan's spare bed. *You will never come home again.* I am a half-circle. I am an apple falling from the tree.

And the positivity of these lines in another:

You have to keep faith in the kindness of other people who are still strangers but who might become makers of a draught of air that is the difference between success and a crash.

Don't think of the mangled bones at the bottom of the mountain. Think of the beautiful open sky.



Some Confessions of an Antiques Dealer

1965. The era of Pounds, Shillings and Pence. None of which I had when I decided to reject the idea of a cozy office job and embark instead upon a very probably precarious career as an Antiques Dealer.

I had agreed to rent a shop from Bristol City Council and there was living accommodation provided above the shop. My parents, although aghast at the idea of their only son setting out on such a perilous course, nevertheless were willing to give me £150 to enable me to buy a car. I chose a green mini van - economic, especially as petrol was priced at 5 shillings a gallon! Added to which there was plenty of room in the back for my purchases.

That was the extent of my parent's commitment; I think that they thought that sooner or later I would come to my senses and abandon the whole plan. Everything seemed stacked against me; the shop I chose was on the wrong side of town, but I assumed that my reputation for finding and selling fine and rare antiques would draw them in from far and wide! I was wedged in between a fish and chip shop and a pub, so not ideal neighbours!

There were other downsides to my venture; no money, practically no stock and no idea what I would sell and no knowledge of Antiques in general. My initial interest was in Pottery and Porcelain; my friend Ken who first encouraged me to have a go at the business used to take me around central Bristol and point out the sites where the pottery and porcelain manufacturers existed in the 17th and 18th centuries. We would stop at likely places where pottery and porcelain shards could be found. These included churchyards, especially after a rainstorm, or just holes in the ground where work was going on or excavations where buildings were being demolished. In this way I learned to look for different types of pottery. Hand painted earlier Delftware or the later transfer printed wares.

All this along with visits to the relevant areas of Bristol Museum and I would soon develop a basic knowledge. But where would I start in my search for stock? I had a few things that I had acquired when I was rescuing the interiors of derelict Georgian houses from the bulldozers, but hardly enough to fill the shelves of my shop. Anyway, regardless, I took the plunge and opened my almost empty shop. Early visitors included two burly members of the local East Bristol mafia; they informed me that if I paid them £1 a week they would make sure that my window glass wasn't broken. I declined their offer but my window remained intact!

Not a good start, and before long I came to realise that some other source of capital was needed if I was to continue. So with all this in mind I marched into the Cooperative dairy in Kingsdown and applied for a job as a milkman. I was accepted, and thus began my long days and nights. I would get up at 4am, get to the dairy, load up and be away by 5 am. If I ran, I could complete the round by 10am, just in time to open my shop by 10.30am. As I was also fond of downing a few pints and partying in the evenings, this really was burning the candle at both ends. But it was the swinging sixties, after all!

Another early visitor to my shop was a man from the Council who informed me that I had to close on Wednesday afternoons otherwise I would be breaking the law. So I decided to close on Wednesdays and use the time to go in search of suitable stock. At first I didn't venture beyond the Bristol city boundary in my search. When vast areas of the city were being demolished in the slum clearance schemes of the 1960's, a great number of junk shops would spring up all around the town and they would sell unwanted bric a brac for next to nothing. Other places I visited were scrap yards; my favourite was in the almost completely demolished Barton Hill area of east Bristol. A real life Steptoe and Son set up, with a horse and cart and always an enormous fire in the fireplace, stoked up by the small kids with the aid of some gigantic bellows. The family always welcomed me in, although they were curious to know why someone with such a posh accent would want to venture into Barton Hill!

Amongst other things I would buy brass and iron beds from them and also all brass ones. I preferred the brass and iron ones because I soon learnt that they sold better than the all brass ones. I think this was because there was less brass to polish. Anyway, the brass ones were more expensive at £3 each and the brass and iron ones were only £1. I painted the iron white and polished the brass and when completed I could sell them for £12 each. So, gradually, I would fill the shelves, turn the back room into a basic workshop and furnish my tiny flat upstairs. I was beginning to see a glimmer of light at the end of the tunnel, although I was absolutely exhausted by the end of the day.

I felt that my crazy decision to go it alone may possibly be about to pay off. Now all I needed were some regular customers, hard to find in this area of Bristol. I was starting to notice an increasing number of immigrants from the West Indies and after that from India and Pakistan. One of my first customers was a West Indian lady who introduced me to the art of haggling, something that was unheard of in my very middle class upbringing. There was definitely a clash of cultures here, as she insisted on haggling for each penny. I eventually became accustomed to this method of trading and I felt that maybe I had begun to break the public school mould that I had been brought up into. I saw that I was benefitting after engaging with different ideas and cultures and was learning to appreciate their diverse viewpoints. As to the search for treasure, in the next couple of years I would travel a bit further away from Bristol in the hunt for affordable and saleable stock, so the country salerooms beckoned, but that's another story or two!!

The sun shone, the maze is well managed, and my eight-year-old grandson cracked the Kit Williams puzzle. It was lovely listening to him explaining how to solve it to crowds of bemused adults! I can highly recommend a visit to this educational and beautifully planned maze, especially if you have an eight-year-old in tow.




