Parish Council's Update - October 2023

New Parish Councillors

Wanborough Parish Council has now co-opted new councillors onto the Parish Council, introductions will be made in next month's edition of the Lyden.

Park Yoga

Park Yoga on Hooper's Field has now finished for 2023. Bonny will be running some trial sessions starting Sunday 22nd October at 9:30am in the Village Hall up to Christmas, weekly on Sundays alternate mornings (9:30) and afternoons (14:30), which the parish council have made a contribution to get this off the ground. Please note there will therefore be a small charge to participate. All you need is a towel or mat – everyone is welcome.

If the sessions are a success, Bonny will continue to offer sessions throughout the winter until Park Yoga resumes once more in May 2024 in Hoopers Field.

Road works at Kite Hill

We have been informed that the Kite Hill closure for roadworks which was scheduled to take place at the beginning of September has now been moved to October half term, commencing on 23rd October.

In the meantime, whilst investigating the drainage issues, it has been discovered that Wales and West Utilities (WWU) have drilled through the pipes from the surface water drainage system which has contributed to the flooding issues we have been experiencing. Unfortunately, this means that WWU and the drainage contractors are working simultaneously to redirect the gas main away from the drainage system to ensure that the anticipated 4-week schedule of work is completed before SBC undertake the carriageway resurfacing which will be for a week commencing 23rd October.

There will be quite a bit of disruption whilst the works take place, and the parish council have received apologies for the disruption to us all.

Hooper's Field

CCTV is being installed, having been agreed by the council in December 2022 and will be installed at the beginning of October. We are pleased to note that the LED floodlights have now been installed at the tennis club which have been part funded by Wanborough Parish Council.

Your Ridgeway Borough Councillor update - Gary Sumner: Ward Surgery is 28th October 9-10.30 at Wanborough Village Hall.

Southern Connector Road: The contractors building the £40m road went into administration in September which has now caused some difficulties. I am being updated regularly by the Head of Highways and subject to legal and insurance 'sign off' The Marsh should be opened initially whilst the opening of Southern Connector Road still awaits completion of the traffic lights at Wanborough Road and some other relatively minor landscaping and remedial issues alongside the road. Swindon Borough Council are fortunate that the road construction is complete and assessed as fit for purpose following a road safety audit.

Wanborough Road:

Following the demise of Buckingham it is now for Conlon to complete the missing section of pavement from Southern Connector Road to Covingham. They must complete the drainage designs for this but will look to complete as soon as possible. There is a planning condition that camera monitoring of the use of Wanborough Road should be implemented ready for first completion at Redlands Grove and I have reminded officers at SBC that this is important – as is the completion of the pavement (both are planning conditions on the development).

Kite Hill: In the spirit of 'you couldn't make it up' the drainage works on Kite Hill have uncovered a huge error by Wales & West utilities who laid the new gas main in 2020. Apparently, they laid it through the SBC drainage causing the repeated leaks and now (having admitted liability) they are working to move their pipe and make good the damage caused. The road will close for 2 weeks from 18/9 from Church Road to The Beanlands and will then re-open until it is closed again for 1 week from 23/10 to resurface from the top down to Jenner Close.

Ham Road: The closure for utility works to serve the new houses next to the GP's surgery has been delayed due to the closure of Kite Hill and will now NOT take place in October half term. A sensible decision which means no clash with Kite Hill closure.

20mph zones: I met with the team leading on this and we are looking to try to get a re-design for Church Road / Kite Hill scheme. This attracted 6 comments in the public consultation with 4 against (albeit one person commenting doesn't live in the village) and I believe there is danger to pedestrians from speeding at the top of Kite Hill and on Church Road where people cross the road by the GP's and the Church so we will organise a 'workshop' so that residents and the Parish Council can also be involved in designing something which isn't 'urban' but which serves a much needed purpose for the safety of villagers.

Gigabit Fibre Update:

I'm hopeful that this scheme to deliver fibre to our villages should be complete by now.

A visit to the Records Office at Chippenham

One thing that is clear reading the Liddington Church Minute Book for 1936 and 1937 is that the problems that confronted the church then are not dissimilar to the ones facing it today, even if the monetary values have changed. In fact, it is striking that two major problems were getting a new Vicar and fixing the boiler while throughout funding to support the upkeep of the church and do good works was a perennial problem.

William Baker Pitt was the incumbent Prebendary and Rector and had held these posts since 1882, although he had spent a short period serving with the Church Army in France in 1916-7 during the First World War. He was still in post having passed seventy-eight years of age when severe bronchial disorders led him to decide to retire.

The problem of finding a new Vicar was solved much more quickly in 1936 than has been the case today. Having decided to retire due to his failing health Prebendary, William Pitt at a meeting on the 2nd March 1936 read from deeds his authority for appointing a Rector for the living of All Saints. Despite this, he was open to ideas from the members of the council as the Minute continued no suggestions were made and it was left to Prebendary William Pitt to appoint his successor as it was the general feeling of the Council that he would do his best for the spiritual welfare of the Parish.

By the next meeting of the Council held on 14th April the problem had been resolved the relevant Minute recording that William Pitt had offered the living to Rev Francis Fishponds of Bristol who had been highly spoken of by the Bishop ... pleased to report Mr Francis had accepted. The Minute went on to say that no date had been set for the induction but by the meeting of the Council in July the Rev Francis was in post and taking the Chair.

It was at this meeting in July that the Rev Francis's wife was appointed for a three year period as the Diocesan representative on the Council, replacing Mrs Pitt, who having gone to Bournemouth with her husband had resigned the position. Francis Fishponds became the new Rector but the position of Prebendary disappeared.

The following year saw the Boiler problem crop up. Having contacted a firm in Highworth, the Council learnt this would cost £39 (less two and a half per cent for cash). The Council discussed how to raise the funds and besides putting a list for subscribers in the church door several members of the council agreed to do house to house collections in the village. Although these efforts were fairly successful and the Diocesan council donated £5 funds the total needed had not been reached. The August 1937 Council Meeting saw a Sunday collection devoted to the Boiler Fund rather than the Farmers' benevolent Association, a decision taken by 7 votes to 4.

Cash problems becoming evident is reflected in the Account Book of the period.

In 1931 this had just seen a weekly entry of money raised and money in the account to a much more detailed breakdown by 1935. By this time the amount taken from each of the three Sunday services held at Liddington every week is meticulously recorded. Money was still being found to finance a Children's Outing although the fact that exactly what this would be was dependent on finances shows money was hard to come by. A special meeting held on 18th August decided on a trip to Bournemouth. This was made possible by the Bristol Bus Company that made buses available for just £7 each while an anonymous donator agreed to cover the whole cost of the Childrens' teas.

The last financial problem, I am sure he himself would have said was totally unnecessary, was how would the church commemorate their now, sadly, late Vicar William Pitt. He had retired to live in Bournemouth where it was hoped the sea air would be good for his health but alas, he died there on 21st November. His body was brought back to Liddington. His funeral service was conducted there on the 25th of November by the Bishop of Malmesbury followed by interment in the graveyard

The November 1936 meeting, held on 30th November contains a Minute reading desire to place on record their most sincere appreciation and grateful recognition of the devoted work of the late Prebendary Pitt as Rector of the Parish and wish to express their very deep sympathy with Mrs Pitt and her family. How he was to be remembered was recorded more briefly question of a memorial was held over.

A following meeting heard that a deputation sent to Mrs Pitt heard that she had no suggestions to make and it was eventually decided that an oak frame around the Vestry door would be installed with an inscription to show it was in his memory. Strangely, I don't think I have ever noticed this although to me, with so much stained glass and the organ having been donated by William Pitt or his family, to me the whole church is his memorial.

His own grave was restored and rededicated courtesy of Swindon Town F.C. on the seventy fifth anniversary of his death in 2011, a hundred years after this Club, which he had founded in 1889, when he was Curate at Christ Church, won the Southern League Championship for the first time

Week 14: Waste and Recycling Update

Date:05.09.23

With all the recent waste & recycling problems across Swindon, Chris Watts (SBC Borough Councillor) has issued the following statement.

In my previous July update I focused on the challenges with driver shortages, elevated sickness levels and the unreliability of the aged and obsolete fleet of wagons that are end of life. The summer holidays further impacted the service with general staffing levels not being sufficient to accommodate minimum expected holiday entitlement. This year's additional bank holiday, and a request that drivers and loaders avoid taking holiday later in the year when the roll out of the new food waste collection is implemented in the autumn, further pressured the service over the summer.

The challenge over the last six weeks has been to avoid succumbing to political pressure to implement expensive knee-jerk short term actions that do little to address the financial and structural deficits and only serve to deflect officer resources and attention from the task of implementing meaningful medium and long term solutions, whilst working to introduce the food waste collection later in the year.

It should be noted that whilst the waste and recycling service has been under pressure, it is because of the hard work and dedication of the loaders/drivers, mechanics and back office staff/officers, that the service has largely kept pick-up delays experienced to one working day and up to two working days at its peak. There has been a slight uptick in collection errors but that is mainly and understandably due to the introduction of new teams and utilising drivers from other Council departments.

As the summer holidays come to an end we believe that we will see an increase in available personnel coupled with the introduction of new wagons, as they are delivered, that should see the service back on track by the middle of September.

By observing the systems under pressure over the last 6 weeks we are able to ascertain what works well and where we need to be to resolve the weaknesses in the system. This can be listed as follows:

Vehicles

Issue: The current fleet of wagons is past its best, regularly breaking down and difficult to source bespoke parts. There has been a two year project to supply a replacement fleet, that will include food waste collection, due to roll out in the late autumn. It could be argued that the timing has ensured that the Council has extracted the maximum value out of the current fleet but it still remains that this has been a major contributor to the issues experienced this summer.

Resolution Short Term: Delivery of the new fleet has just started and we have taken the decision to commission two of the new wagons into service early. This has been a useful exercise this early in the process as several teething issues were identified and resolved with the new wagons. We can only bring the refuse wagons into service at this early stage as the new recycling wagons are bespoke to the new collection system to be rolled out. We currently have three expensive leased vehicles in the fleet that we would seek to discontinue at the earliest convenience on deliveries and commissioning of the new fleet. This saving can be utilised to secure additional staff.

Medium Term: By the end of the year all new wagons will be in service and we will see an improvement in reliability and resilience and a much-reduced risk of vehicular failure.

Long Term: In order to meet the Borough Council's Net Zero obligations, the new fleet will need to be replaced with electric vehicles (EV) by 2030. This option's appraisal is underway as this will require a full restructure of the Waterside depot infrastructure to accommodate an EV fleet.

Staffing:

Issues: As stated above, systemic personnel shortages, recent historic national HGV driver shortages and elevated sickness have all had an effect on the service delivery this summer. Staff positions are too rigid and lack flexibility to be able to be proactive when shortages occur. The Council has previously contracted in a central temporary staff agency, based in Milton Keynes, that handles relationships with all other agencies. This has placed an additional layer of bureaucracy and delay in the temporary staff engagement process.

Resolution Short Term: Last month, the proposed position of Hybrid Loader/Driver had been passed through Human Resources and subsequently advertised internally resulting in several applications. These positions will provide the much-needed flexibility and allow for a proactive response to resource issues, particularly with drivers. Whilst we employed three new drivers last month, this just covered drivers leaving through natural churn. We re-advertised driver positions and have had 14 applicants with 9 assessments taking place this week. We will still seek to draft in drivers from other departments if the needs arise, but this does have a negative knock-on effect to other services.

Medium Term: Hybrid Loader/Drivers operatives to be put through HGV training, induction and brought into service whilst working directly with a local staffing agency to build up a bank of pre-inducted temporary loading staff that can be called upon when needed.

Long Term: Build a flexible workforce that can be pro-active to challenges whilst ensuring that the hierarchy is restructured to allow progression routes and training for staff.

Other issues that have been highlighted are:

improvement required on the back-office systems that will allow better communications when rounds are dropped (medium term)

Review of In-cab systems to improve comms and route management (medium term)

Budget:

As stated previously, the desperate state of the Borough Council finances is proving to be challenging. The budget set by the previous administration had catastrophically failed within weeks of the new municipal year starting. In our first meeting as the new Administration at the end of May 2023 with senior officers, we were warned that the budget already projected an £11,000,000 in year overspend. This was adjusted up to £15,000,000 weeks later on further scrutiny. It is a legal requirement for Councils to set a projected balanced budget, but the level of risk built into the last budget has led to this unprecedented position that we now face. The lead member for finance is working hard to bring lasts year's budget in line but this remains in a position of high risk.

Reasonably, residents have asked why the service is reducing across the board when Council Tax has risen, and the tax base has increased. The answer is that the borough has three income streams through Council Tax, Business Rates and Central Government Grant CGG. Since 2012 the austerity has reduced the CGG from £45,000,000 to approx. £4,000,000 and this has precipitated a year-on-year budgetary deficit that has required cuts when the borough is increasing in size coupled with recent high inflation. All being equal, with inflation and growth, the CGG should be £60,000,000 a year to equate in real terms to 2012 budget levels.

The Council annual revenue budget is £160,000,000 and debt is £400,000,000 that has a cost of £7,000,000 a year to service.

Keyless car theft

Keyless car theft – also known as relay theft – is relatively simple. With a relay amplifier and a relay transmitter, a thief can detect whether the car has keyless entry. Working in pairs they identify a house with a car parked nearby and one person stands by the car with a transmitter, while a second waves an amplifier around the perimeter of the house. If the car key is close enough the amplifier will detect its signal, amplify it, and send it to the accomplice's transmitter.

This transmitter then effectively becomes the key, and tricks the car into thinking the real key is nearby. The thieves can then open the car, get in and drive away.

The whole process can take as little as 60 seconds and can be completed in near silence

TOP TIPS TO AVOID KEYLESS THEFT

To avoid keyless car theft remember DISTANCE, SIGNAL, STEERING WHEEL.

- **KEEP KEYS A SAFE DISTANCE FROM THE CAR:** Keeping keys far away from doors and windows. This will minimise the chances a thief will be able to find and amplify the key's signal and is general good practice.
- **BLOCK OR TURN OFF THE SIGNAL**: Consider purchasing a Faraday pouch to keep your car key in. These pouches contain signal-blocking materials that stop your key transmitting its code, preventing crooks from being able to detect and amplify the signal. Check your manual or speak to your dealer to find out if your key can be switched off
- STEERING WHEEL LOCK: Consider using a steering wheel lock, a driveway parking post, or even a wheel clamp



Wilts & Berks Canal Trust - The Eastern Swindon Route

The Wilts & Berks Canal Trust is restoring the 50 miles of canal from Semington to Abingdon with its side branches in a programme to create benefits for local communities, wildlife and leisure while recognising and restoring our heritage. See our website for more information www.wbct.org.uk.

It was recognised back in the 1990s that it would be impossible to restore the canal through all of Swindon and so the grand scheme for a southern and eastern bypass was conceived. The first part of it has been built in Wichelstowe. 25 years later we are still working to develop the scheme. Here we focus on the eastern section from the crossing of the A419 near Junction 15 of the M4 to the railway line near Acorn Bridge on the A420 – a distance of 7 km.

The route selected from the options follows the Liden Brook valley for the central section and passes through the planned New Eastern Villages development of about 8,000 homes. In principle this route is protected against development by the Swindon Local Plan policy. Any other scheme which gets planning consent first takes priority over our plans except for the limited protection afforded in the local plan so we must fight hard to retain a viable and affordable scheme and eventually get our own planning consent. In the design stage we have assessed many landowners' schemes, objected to some developments, negotiated with developers and participated in two public inquiries to protect the route. One inquiry resulted in a good, reserved corridor through the proposed Lotmead Village and the other resulted in a refusal of the development which meant that the canal was not forced into a very poor and expensive route. We still have more to do.

In 2015 we presented a scheme to the borough council and parish councils that integrated the canal with flood protection for the area, which is notorious for flooding. It was rejected and each developer now must deal with their own flood risks without an overall plan. Since then a small engineering team of local volunteers has been developing the current scheme. Its detailed alignment has been changing due to the introduction of the Southern Connector Road which runs close by, the developers' plans for their new villages, the need to avoid newly discovered Roman archaeology and various other constraints. The current horizontal alignment is, we hope, finalised.

The alignment starts from a tunnel under the A419 and as it heads North and East it passes under four important roads, proposed new roads and a few farm accesses, and then crosses over several streams while avoiding the Roman remains and minimising damage to the local ecology. The southern section is partially within an AONB. The developers of the new

villages prefer to locate it on the periphery of their schemes within a green corridor but this usually means it is close to or in the flood zone thus making it more difficult to build.

The canal position and level is fixed at the ends, by the tunnel under the A419 from Badbury Park and the existing canal near Acorn Bridge. We want to keep the levels down to pass under the roads without having to raise them, which is very expensive and disruptive, although we expect to have to raise The Marsh road by more than one metre. The route must pass over the watercourses whilst meeting Environment Agency requirements for clearance which tend to push the canal upwards. We already need 11 locks between the two ends and do not want to have to introduce any more.

We have three options for the stream crossings and water levels in the pounds which range from the lowest levels with some watercourses passing in and out of the canal to the highest in which the main Liden Brook is crossed on an aqueduct. We also have to consider the sources of water and how it can be managed efficiently. The engineering team is studying water resources for the whole canal but this scheme will need to contribute to the capture and storage of water in wet periods because it is so close to the summit pound. We need to engage with the EA and the local flood authority to agree on the solutions but that is easier said than done.

The Wilts & Berks was built at minimum cost so usually the waterway is narrow with a restricted towpath. We are building a modern canal for widespread use by the public and must make it safe and accessible to all. This means higher standards all round for new build sections. A minimum width of three metres for the towpath with a safety verge either side will permit use by walkers and cyclists. In urban areas or elsewhere if high usage is expected it may be wider. A proposal to make this route a national cycle path between Swindon and Wantage might also require more space. Connections to other paths and roads require accessible gradients needing more space. Slopes of cuttings and embankments will be less steep to meet modern engineering standards.

We can expect to see waterside planting of species to support wildlife and will need to provide more environmental

improvements with hedges, trees and other planting. Support for local wildlife will mean creating habitats and pathways along and across the canal for land animals and aquatic life. A complicated calculation is needed to demonstrate meeting the minimum acceptable biodiversity gain required by planning regulations.

We continue to protect and develop the route with the aim of getting an outline planning consent to protect the vision of a complete bypass around Swindon. There is much to be done, and pots of money to be found, to just get to that critical point.

In the new villages the canal will be a key feature winding through the green spaces to greatly enhance the attractiveness of the nearby homes. Despite this the trust gets little or no support from the village developers who are commercial housebuilders. This contrasts with the landowner-driven development at Wichelstowe which is proving so successful. In our consultations and discussions with the public we get a great deal of moral support. That is not going to pay the bills but the vision keeps us optimistic that it can be done. You can support our efforts by joining the trust.


Not so much an adventure more a series of BIG SHOUT OUTs




