Dear Friends

This is a busy time for the churches in the benefice. First of all, we have the service for All Saints and All Souls, which will be at All Saints, Liddington, on Sunday 29th October at 10.30. The next big event is Remembrance Sunday, which will be at St Andrew's, Wanborough, at 10.30 on Sunday 12th November. Both of these are always significant moments in the life of the church and of a community, so it will be great to see lots of people at these special services.

The other notable thing happening currently in the benefice at the moment is behind the scenes but it is still very important. We currently have two PCCs (the Parochial Church Council is the body responsible for making sure a church is running properly!) across four churches but are exploring coming into one, responsible for Wanborough, Liddington, Bishopstone and Hinton Parva. It means fewer volunteers needed to fill positions and the opportunity to share resources and collaborate. As we're already doing this in lots of ways, it makes sense to streamline this, too. Please be aware, we are still only exploring this, it has not been decided yet!

The catch is that we need a name. We can't use anything with Ridgeway, because that is already

taken, and the same goes for Icknield. We are currently looking at options that include "The Villages" but no decision has been made. United Villages sounds like a football team, while Villages Unified sounds like a maths term! If you have a suggestion, or would like to contribute to the discussion, please either email me (curate@wroughton.com), talk to a church member or come to the service on a Sunday to chat with us. We are gathering ideas until our next joint PCC meeting, on the 27th of November, so that is how long you have to come up with a great idea!

Steve says: "I look forward to joining the communities of Lyddington and Wanborough,

Bishopstone with Hinton Parva in their worship and service of God, to begin to get to know them and find out what God is doing among them, and through them, and where that might lead us in the future. Just as these communities formed around sources of fresh water flowing from the Downs, so I pray that our ministry may open up new channels for God's life-giving Spirit to flow into these places and its people."

Steve's special interests are mountain walking, cycling, sailing, bee keeping and virtually all things to do with the natural world. He has served as the Creation Care Lead in the Willesden Area of London for the past few years. He is married to Jennie and has four grown up sons: Jono, Dan, Matt and Luke and one enchanting granddaughter Lily.



Parish Council's Update - November 2023

New Parish Councillors

At the full council meeting on 25th September, two new Parish Councillors were co-opted. We are pleased to welcome Debra Maslin and Martin Rowley to life as a Parish Councillor. We thought this would be a nice opportunity to allow Debra and Martin to introduce themselves to you and explain what has motivated them to step forward and take on the opportunity of the Wanborough Parish Councillor role:

Debra Maslin

My name is Debra Maslin and I moved to Wanborough in 1984 with my family to live in my husband's family home on Kite Hill. We brought up our 2 sons here and apart from a period of travelling I have never wanted to leave the village.

After a great deal of thought I decided to seek co-option onto the Parish Council. This decision was made after the 2 years of disruption we have been and continue to suffer due to the commencement of the NEV and the construction of the SCR. I feel village life has been eroded and wanted to try to restore our way of life. Also, to ensure villagers' thoughts and wishes are listened to and acted upon.



Martin Rowley

I was born near Ealing, and raised in Maidenhead, Berkshire. I went to school at Desborough School in Maidenhead completing sixth form and A levels. I then declined an offer to attend Leeds University preferring to go straight out to work.

My career was pre-dominantly in the telecoms industry. Initially at BT and then with Vanderhoff Plc. After Vanderhoff there was a short spell in retailing, again in telecommunications and in 1992, Trevor Grove and I formed Comec Voice & Data Ltd which we ran successfully for 30 years until we sold the company to investors, just prior to Covid.

I am married to Sally and we have lived in the village for approximately 10 years now. I have two adult daughters one of which is a midwife at GWH.

Being a great advocate of keeping Wanborough a village environment for as long as we can, in the past few years I have raised the money for Olive's bench at Hoopers. Raised the money for the defibrillator at The Plough and Trevor and I personally donated the defibrillator for Foxhill.

I passionately believe the Parish is not making the most of the assets at its disposal and feel we could do so much more with my contribution and support.

Highways

Swindon Borough Council have notified us of temporary road closures due to take place in November in the village. At time of submission of this article the dates are:

Notice of temporary road closure - The Marsh, Wanborough

This Order is being introduced for OPENREACH works and will impose a restriction on driving on The Marsh at the junction with Burycroft. Traffic to be diverted via High Street, Church Road, Pack Hill, The Marsh and vice versa. The Order comes into force on the 9 November 2023 for 12 months, but it is anticipated the works are taking place on the 9 November 2023 between the times of 9:30 to 15:30 hours.

Notice of temporary road closure - Rotten Row, Wanborough

This Order is being introduced for THAMES WATER works and will impose a restriction on driving on Rotten Row between Orchard Close and College Gardens. Traffic to be diverted via Kite Hill, Church Road, Un-named road between Church Road and Callas Hill/High Street Junction and High Street. The Order comes into force on the 8 November 2023 for 6 months, but it is anticipated the works are taking place on the <u>8 to 11 November 2023</u>.

Notice of temporary road closure - King Edward Road, Wanborough

This Order is being introduced for OPENREACH works and will impose a restriction on driving on King Edwards Road between the junctions of Ham Road and the Ridgeway. Traffic to be diverted via Ham Road, Church Road, Callas Hill and the Ridgeway. The Order comes into force on the <u>13 November 2023</u> for 6 months, but it is anticipated the works are taking place on the <u>13 to 15 November 2023</u>.

Hooper's Field

By the time this is in print the CCTV should have been installed at Hooper's Field. This will hopefully act as a deterrent but will also assist with any issues should we have the misfortune to be targeted at the Pavilion.

Footpaths and Village Maintenance

Our Village Handyman continues to work his way through cutting back the village footpaths. This time of year, as the growing

season comes to an end he will be focusing on preparations for winter including leaf clearance. Kite Hill being one of the key

footpaths to be cleared of leaf matter. Please do continue to report any issues with footpaths or any village maintenance issues to the Clerk or any of the Parish Councillors.

Church Meadow Playground Fencing

The fencing has now been installed around the play equipment at Church Meadow. This should eliminate the issue of dog fouling by the play equipment which was a commonly reported issue.

Next Parish Council Meeting

The next Parish Council meeting is due to be held on Monday 27th November 2023 at Wanborough Village Hall starting at 7.30pm. All residents are welcome to attend.

Your Ridgeway Borough Councillor update - Gary Sumner:

Ward Surgery is 25th November 9-10.30 at Wanborough Village Hall.

The Marsh: It was a relief to see The Marsh opened on the 6th October after a two year closure. I've been contacted by residents already about whether restrictions can be put in place to stop HGV's using it as a cut through and I've agreed with the Head of Highways that additional signage is put on Wanborough Road and Pack Hill to remind delivery lorries heading to Redlands Grove that this is not the permitted route. Deliveries to businesses within The Marsh would of course be allowed.

Southern Connector Road: There should be a separate SBC statement in this issue [page 13] to update residents as I have had numerous meetings with the Cabinet Member for Highways and the Head of Highways on the difficult situation following Buckingham Group entering Administration.

Liddington Village Clean Up: About 15 of us spent a productive morning, cleaning road signs and clearing overgrown brambles blocking the view of signs. We cut a hedge alongside Purley Road blocking the pavement, cleaned the pedestrian crossing safety bollards, cleared litter around the village and were then given tea and bacon rolls by The Village Inn which was very welcome. Thanks to all those who joined.

Wanborough Road: I have requested a programme of works so that both the Parish Council and I are aware of what to expect in terms of traffic lights and time to complete the works. I spoke to the Streetworks Manager and he agreed that the previous practice of having lights up whilst no work was being done was excessive and he told Conlon to remove them and to notify myself and the Parish when they are to be up.

Kite Hill: Drainage and gas pipe works have been completed and by the time this edition is delivered Kite Hill will have been resurfaced from the top down to Jenner Close.

Ham Road: There will be a couple of days of road closure in November for some Thames Water and Openreach works.

The Hollow: Road closure for Openreach 13th to 15th November.

The Marsh: One day closure 9th November for Openreach to connect premises to fibre.

Rotten Row: Closure from 8th to 10th November for Thames Water to connect a new house.

Refuse/Recycling Collections: It seems to be that not a week goes by that I'm contacted by residents about missed plastics or garden waste. The council made a statement in the last issue and gave guidance about reporting missed collections, however as they have been so sporadic residents will often find they can't report after 48hrs. Let me know if this happens and I can contact the waste managers directly to resolve.

Gigabit Fibre Update:

I've had confirmation that the works in Liddington and Medbourne Lane are complete and that they are in the commissioning phase so by time of publication they will be able to order service.

Police Drop in at Wanborough Village Hall: I booked the village hall on the 27th September and a number of residents joined for advice on crime (very low in the villages), video doorbells, faraday pouches for car keys, leaving a light or two on at home when you're out (particularly in the winter) and locking vehicles, garages and sheds. I also asked them to join the regular coffee mornings (which they did) and they will drop in for my Ward Surgeries when available. They had also done a Speedwatch session on Wanborough Road with 50 cars stopped and given words of advice including 17 who got tickets.



Wanborough Primary School

This month, the children have taken on a sponsored walk / run around the running track to raise funds for Julia's House Hospice, the charity for which we painted a 'Swinpup' named Sir Wagalot (which was on show in the Central Library in addition to the larger Swindogs located around Swindon as part of The Big Dog Art Trail). The children dressed in blue, pink and orange (the logo colours of Julia's House) and had a great time being cheered on by other classes. Assistant Head Teacher, Miss Watts was interviewed by Sue Davies on BBC Wiltshire about the school's involvement.



We held our twice yearly 'What's Under Your Feet' day, where each class removed a 30cm square

of turf to explore and record the number of creatures living in the soil. This activity is repeated in Spring and Autumn each year by various schools around the country and the results are recorded so that patterns of change can be monitored. This scheme is run by the British Trust for Ornithology

For European Day of Languages on 26th September, we were lucky to have a number of visitors who read stories to us, taught us some useful phrases and explained things about their languages. The languages we learned about were: Welsh, Punjabi, Polish, Czech, Afrikaans and Hindi. Most of the visitors were parents of children at school, plus Mrs Evans, a former teacher and governor who works with Year 6. We are very grateful to them all for giving us their time, the children and staff found it very interesting.

The NSPCC visited the school and talked with Year 5 and 6 about keeping themselves safe and who to contact if they are worried or need help. This talk emphasised topics covered within PSHE (Personal, Social, Health and Emotional) lessons at school.

Harvest Festival was held at school and we were fortunate to be visited by the Reverend Chris Hunter. We sang some upbeat Harvest Songs such as Harvest Samba and Cauliflowers Fluffy! The children were very generous with donations of tins, jars, bottles, cartons and packets for the Swindon Food Collective a charity which aims to reduce the impact of food poverty on people in crisis in the Swindon area.

Reception enjoyed dressing up like pirates for 'Talk like a pirate day'. They have been talking about and drawing pictures of their families, and sharing their baby photos.

Year 1 decorated boomerangs in the style of Aboriginal art and learnt about Dreamtime stories – the foundation of Aboriginal religion and culture.

Year 2 were the first to go on their class trip, enjoying a day at Cotswold Wildlife Park. The children had a great day learning about animals from hot and cold countries and their different habitats. They even had time to go to the playground and for a train ride around the park.

Year 3 enjoyed learning more about Anglo Saxons. They created Anglo Saxon houses from cardboard, and they also made delicious Honey Shortbread.

Year 4 have been making Roman armour and weapons. They used these to march with then practised different Roman army formations including wedge, testudo and repel.

Year 5 have made amazing models of the solar system which have filled the classroom. In Science, the class discussed the ideas of flat Earth and spherical Earth whilst investigating the evidence from each viewpoint.

Year 6 created beautiful paintings representing Flanders' Fields as part of their topic, Britain at War. They have been learning about life in the trenches and wrote diaries as soldiers of the time. The children created art based on impressionism during their study of Monet. In computing, they learnt how to code and debug.


Young Carers have enjoyed spending time together with a drink and a snack, playing games and planning the activities they

This included free rides, food and a drink.

The PTA organised a collection of second-hand clothing and raised a fabulous £295 with 'Rags2Riches'. The next collection date is 5th February 2024.

New road to undergo final safety checks following collapse of contractor

A brand-new road which will provide a link between the 8,000-home New Eastern Villages (NEV) and Commonhead roundabout is likely to open in the spring after the company that built it went into administration.



Buckingham Group called in administrators Grant Thornton last month shortly after completing the new Southern Connector Road for Swindon Borough Council.

However, despite building the road, the company was not able to complete the necessary safety and technical checks in line with the contract for the scheme before its collapse. This includes any remedial works and other adjustments needed before the road can be opened to the public.

The Council is now currently in discussions with the administrators to ensure all legal aspects of the contract are finalised and that the road meets the required standards before it is opened to the public.

Over the next few months, the Council will carry out its own technical checks to ensure the road meets the necessary nationally recognised standards and will continue to meet the needs of the local community for decades to come.

Further adjustments at the southern end of the road near the junction with Pack Hill also need to be carried out, including further signage and additional works to the embankments. These activities are planned to commence before the end of the year and we will aim to keep disruption to local traffic to a minimum while these works are carried out.

Diligent work to protect the archaeology, ecology and natural landscape around the Southern Connector Road will also continue as planned, including attention on the tree planting in the area.

The Council is working as quickly as possible to get the new road reopened and earlier this month, Pack Hill, Wanborough Road, and access to The Marsh were all opened up to traffic to benefit local residents and motorists.

Councillor Chris Watts, Swindon Borough Council's Cabinet Member for the Environment and Transport, said: "The collapse of Buckingham came completely out of the blue and meant we were not able to open the road as quickly as we would have liked.

"Fortunately for the Council, and local taxpayers, the new road had been built so we were not left with an unfinished road and many of the issues that would have come with it.

"However, with no contractor in place, we now have to complete a lot of quality assurance to make sure the road is fit for purpose. This may involve remedial works and we know we already have to carry out work to the embankments near Pack Hill. There will also be lots of tree planting and ecology work that still needs to take place.

"The good news is that we have recently been able to reopen The Marsh, which will hopefully help local residents and businesses, and we will be working as hard as we can to get the new road open as soon as we can."



Not so much an adventure...

Our latest ride out brought us to the White Horse at Uffington where some of the group ventured up the full climb before an exhilarating freewheeling return down. I (sensibly) volunteered to wait at the bottom and take photos.

Big Breakfast Plus is the opposite of relaxed leisureliness with numbers coming in for breakfast rising exponentially. In September 2022 we served 812 hot breakfasts. For the same time period in September this year we served 1506. We rely a lot on food donations, so it was great to be invited to Central Church Harvest Festival to talk about our community café breakfast club and receive some wonderful breakfast food donations. As you can imagine fresh garden grown tomatoes went down a storm with our guests over the following week. We also received 10 boxes of bacon containing 1926 rashers from Asda at Haydon Wick along with 240 eggs that certainly sorted out October's breakfasts! Best of all we have received some funding from the National Benevolent Charity that will enable us to open seven days a week throughout the winter months. Open day planned for Sunday 5 November. I can't wait to be in there taking orders and buttering toast.

Finally, I managed to organise childcare and get off to the Watermill Theatre to see a matinee performance of Lord of the Rings. To be honest I'm not much interested in the story (shame) but rather more in the technical aspects of staging such a big play with such a large cast (21) plus musical instruments on the tiny performance space that is



the Watermill Theatre. Wow It was superb; beautifully performed with much gusto and enthusiasm by a very talented cast. Gandalf, (though not sadly Ian McKellen) was suitably imposing, surveyed the open garden scene from the top of the stairs leading to the stage door. Outside in the Shire we celebrated with Bilbo at his eleventhly first birthday party before being ushered back into the theatre and into Middle earth. Gollum was super creepy and frightening especially when he climbed out over the balcony, the elves wrought their magic, the dancing/fighting Orcs and the hobbits, gentle happy folks struggled from one alarming situation to the next in infectious wide-eyed wonder. Suffice to say three hours and fifteen minutes later we were all back outside, shell shocked from watching these talented actor musicians who were not only playing a variety of instruments but dancing, fighting, acting, and singing their hearts out. A real treat.

We remember those from Wanborough



William Kent was born in 1895. William was a farm labourer and was working at Nythe Farm when he enlisted in 1915. William served in the Durham Light Infantry and like Edgar HINTON was killed in action on 21st March 1918. He has no known grave and is commemorated on the Pozieres Memorial in France, on the memorial in St Andrew's Church and on the headstone, with his young sister and father, although the inscription confusingly states 28th March.





Clarence Kendrew was born in 1922 at

Wakefield, enlisted in the RAF Volunteer Reserve in 1940 and attended Signal School in 1941 at RAF Yatesbury where he met his future wife Ethel CONSTABLE who worked in the NAAFI.

Ethel's parents were from Lower Wanborough. The family had moved to West View, Church Road, when Clarence married Ethel in June 1943 at St. Andrew's Church. Following training and promotion to Sergeant, Clarence was posted to Bomber Command. On 3rd September 1943 his Lancaster took part in an attack on Berlin and while returning the pilot was forced to ditch the crippled plane. Clarence was one of three crew who died from exposure before the rescue launch arrived. On 16th Sept 1943.






Although the memorial in the church shows George Pickering, the gravestone in the churchyard has the name Albert Edward Pickering. He

took part in the D-Day landings in June 1944. He was reported wounded on patrol just a couple of weeks later on 22nd June and died on 31st August 1944. Albert is buried in St. Andrew's churchyard, the third of four headstones in the churchyard that are maintained by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission and Albert is also listed on the memorial in St Andrew's Church.









Federick Morse

Fred died on 31st August 1916 aged 27 and is buried at St Andrew's Churchyard, the first of four headstones in the graveyard maintained by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission, and also listed on the memorial in St Andrew's Church alongside his brother Frank who also died of his wounds and is buried at a cemetery near Arras



His sisters arranged for their parents to be buried at St Andrew's so they could visit the grave and also included a tribute to their brother which explains why Herbert, who had no known personal connection to Wanborough and is not included on the memorial plaque in St Andrew's Church, is remembered on a gravestone in the churchyard.







Gary Nicholson

Although Gary was from Hull in Yorkshire and he was living at Stratton at the time of the disaster his love for Wanborough meant he chose the village as his final resting place and was buried here with full military honours. His headstone is the last of four maintained by the Commonwealth War Grave Commission in St Andrew's churchyard.



For the love of Gardening! By Jane Pearson (Garden designer & Horticulturalist)



October Musings

Hello! The days are growing shorter, and I find myself scanning the garden for cheerful colour to brighten up our shortening hours of light. It occurred to me that this is the time of year where colour is needed more than ever, and yet many of our favourite flowers are fading. My musings led me to research, and I have selected a lovely collection of 'carry-on's' (see plant spotlight) that you might like to include in your borders next year.

Feature: Box caterpillar Damage.

I had intended to chat about compost but whilst recently wearing my border maintenance hat, I've had the sad task of diagnosing box caterpillar damage in our area. Unfortunately, both box blight (a fungal disease) and box caterpillar damage are spreading across UK. If you have box plants, please check them for brown patches. Both ailments affect trimmed or topiary plants more than box that's left to grow naturally. Blight will change the leaf colour to brown and fallen leaves are found at the base of the plant. Treat your specimens with a spray such as Topbuxus Health



Mix. Box caterpillars tend to eat the leaves and leave brown patches of twigs. Their webs are difficult to see with the naked eye but take a closeup photo of the damaged area with your phone and enlarge the image, hopefully you won't see any tell-tale fine webs but if you do, all is not lost. A range of treatments are available such as environmentally friendly Topbuxus XenTavi found on Amazon or use nematodes. Please let me know how you get and if you have experience of using other control methods, I'd love to know and share your findings with our community.

Plant Spotlight-Long flowering 'carry-on" blooms for your garden

These lovely 'doers' are great value and a reliable and long-lasting source of nectar and pollen for insects. I've split them into cool and bright colour groups.

Cool colours:



Rosa 'Sally Holmes' AGM-Huge sprays of single flowered blooms from June to October on this shrub rose.



Dahlia 'Wine Eyed Jill' a soft peach, early flowering dahlia that lasts for four months.



Alstroemeria 'Apollo' AGM-flowers from June to the first frosts once its settled in.

Bright colours:



Achillea Filipdulina 'Gold Plate'-Long lasting golden plates of colour.

The Potting Shed- Things to do in October/November.

- Clear up fallen leaves and make leaf mould piles to use as next year's mulch.
- Protect ponds from leaf fall with netting.
- Plant tulip bulbs for next spring
- Prune roses (if you haven't already) to prevent wind-rock.
- Insulate outdoor containers that aren't frost proof with bubble wrap and raise them off the ground with 'pot feet' or bricks.
- Place grease bands around fruit trees to prevent winter moth damage.
- Mulch, mulch, mulch!
- Come along to November's Bishopstone Gardening Club and join our two-part design workshop.

Confessions of an Antiques Dealer No. 6

Well, the Summer of 1967 wasn't easily forgotten. I had left my Antique shop in what I was certain was the capable hands of my Spanish friend, bought a large van, found some fellow travellers, set off to travel over Europe in the spring and had returned in the autumn.

Apologies for straying from the Antiques' theme, but briefly I had run out of money in Spain, abandoned the van, sold my excess clothes in the medina in Tangiers, sold my blood in Granada, picked grapes for the harvest in Bordeaux and arrived back in England in October. Phew! My first port of call was my shop in Bristol, where I was certain that my Spanish helper had been able to turn some stock into money in my absence. What a hope!

As I turned the corner and approached the shop, I spotted a group of people gathered outside amidst various pieces of broken china and glass which were scattered on the pavement. The Spaniard was in the doorway gesticulating and shouting at the mob outside. It seems that he had let his Latin temperament get the better of him when he was subjected to the price haggling that the locals were renowned for. "I'd rather smash it than let you have it for that price!" So, he smashed it! Luckily only my cheap stock and nothing serious. "Do they know who I am?" he shouted when he saw me approaching. "I am from a noble family" It seemed that my former efforts to befriend the locals had been undone. To summarise, things were so bad that I decided to give up the shop and me and the Spaniard parted company. Back to square one! I retired hurt, rescued what I could from the shop, paid any bills with the modest sales that had transpired before the final debacle and rented a modest flat in Clifton whilst deciding my next move.

I had made the acquaintance of a jovial Irishman who I'd met in the Greyhound pub in Clifton; in conversation he informed me that he had a stand in Portobello Road in London which he set up every Saturday morning. Portobello was, and still is, a well known Antiques' hub in west London with shops and stands up and down the street. The outside pitches only operated on Saturday mornings. The Irishman wondered if I'd be interested in helping him out on the stand and using my mini van to transport his goods. He had a friend who had a large flat in Elgin Crescent close by where we could stay on Friday night. I saw this as an opportunity to learn more about the trade in London and how it operates through market stalls and outside venues, especially as my expenses would be met and I'd be paid commission on items sold.

So, on Friday morning I stopped off and picked up the Irishman from his flat and he loaded the back of the van with his boxes. It was only when we were halfway to London that I asked him what sort of Antiques he sold. "Oh, I don't sell Antiques "he said "I sell silk ties, they go like hot cakes!". Oh dear, I thought.

Anyway, with much apprehension and some disappointment I drove on to London and helped the Irishman sell ties on the Portobello Road. On the positive side, I took the opportunity to look around and learn from some Antique traders as to what was selling and what level of trade was going on. I ended up spending three days and nights staying in Elgin Crescent and frequenting a pub called Finchs and listening to some good pub folk music and jazz! So not a totally wasted trip.

I returned to Bristol from my Portobello Road experience, inspired to look for possible locations that could perhaps be used for a street market, in other words in order to create a mini Portobello Road in the West country. Because of its bohemian flavour, I reckoned that Clifton would be the ideal location. The area was changing but there was still a very laid back and creative feel to the place.

Clifton was always called just Clifton when I grew up there but the name changed to Clifton Village which is what it is known as today. There was a folk club called the Troubadour Club that I occasionally frequented and the owner was the chief instigator of the name change with an attempt to emulate Greenwich Village in New York! The folk club was in a street called Waterloo Street, little used and with cobblestones down one side. An ideal site, I reasoned, for the new Clifton Village's Portobello Road. I wasn't the only person with this idea.

A potter named Paula was the driving force behind the eventual setting up of the market which was to operate on Sunday mornings. So, in December 1967, the Clifton Stallholders Association was formed. There were nine of us, each paying a fee of £1. Newcomers after that were required to pay a fee of 2 guineas, which would be used to defray legal costs.

I was the only Antique dealer of the original 9, the rest selling Art, Pottery and other hand made goods. As a new venture it was very well attended; I could see some sort of future selling in this way. Before long, however, some residents complained owing to the lack of access to their garages on the street, so after a wrangle or two which involved the City Council, we had to relocate

to another site but still in Clifton. A visitor to Clifton nowadays will be aware that the whole of this part of the "Village" has been pedestrianised in the last few years despite the reservations of some traders. The roads are adorned with flower displays in wooden planters and wooden benches and café tables complete the transformation.

Cars may finally be in retreat! In 1967, we were obviously ahead of our time! Anyway, For the time being, my shopkeeping days were over. I was happy to travel with my stock and sell in this way. I wonder if this could catch on!

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
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
