Dear Friends

A couple of months ago, I wrote about the process the four churches in Wanborough, Liddington, Bishopstone and Hinton Parva are currently undertaking to choose a name that might represent us as one locality. In the new year, we will be considering combining into one administrative body (Parochial Church Council) under the name of the Wellspring Villages. We will be asking for views from people throughout the four villages to decide if this is the right course of action for us, so watch this space!

The reason Wellspring Villages was chosen was based on two main factors. First, the obvious! Throughout this area, there are many springs and wells, including in our churchyards! I went for a beautiful walk over Charlbury Hill last week and was constantly seeing and hearing the trickle of running water. It was beautiful. The name feels like it really represents something about this part of the world.



The second reason is a bit deeper. Wells and springs give us water, something that is essential for life, but also symbolic of other and less obvious needs. This comes up throughout the bible. In Proverbs, the writer says "Wisdom is the wellspring of life to one who has it, but folly is the punishment of fools" and "The words of the mouth are deep waters; the wellspring of wisdom is a gushing stream." (Proverbs 16: 22 and 18: 4) When Jesus meets a woman by a well in Samaria, he says "Everyone who drinks of this water will be thirsty again, but those who drink of the water that I will give them will never be thirsty. The water that I will give will become in them a spring of water gushing up to eternal life." (John 4: 13-14) We need water to sustain life, but we also need those other things that come from God alone.

I am really pleased about this choice of name and it is the basis for our prayers as we move forward: that God will grant us wisdom, a wellspring of life that gushes up to eternal life.

Parish Councillor Profiles

After introducing your new councillors in the November issue we thought it would be nice for you to get to know your current serving councillors too. This month the profile is for the Vice-Chair of Parish Council – Councillor Omar Mirza.

You will need to be able to attend monthly Parish Council meetings which are held on a Monday evening, plus spend some extra time working on areas of specialism and smaller committees.

You will need to confirm that you meet one of the following criteria:-

- You are registered as a local government elector for the parish;
- You have occupied as owner or tenant any land or other premises in the parish during the whole of the 12 months before the day of co-option;
- Your main or only place of work during the 12 months prior to the day of co-option has been in the parish; or
- You have lived in the parish or within three miles of it during the whole of the 12 months before the day of co-option.

Parish Council Elections

Swindon Borough Council will be changing its election cycle in 2026 to whole council elections once every four years and parishes were given the option via a consultation to harmonise their election cycle with the borough benefit from cost sharing. A response to this consultation was discussed and provided at the Full Council Meeting on Monday 27th November where the council unanimously agreed to harmonise with the Borough Cycle. This means that there will be no Parish Council Elections in 2024. The next election will be 2026.

Happy New Year

Planning: At the time of writing this article I am attending Planning Committee to support the application for the new Church school at Redlands Grove. At the last meeting members raised an issue about an additional pavement in the school car park and this has now been resolved so I'm hopeful that it will be approved and begin construction to complete September 2025. This is important as new residents will have to drive their children to schools either in Wanborough or Covingham or further afield – putting more cars onto our roads and not adding to the new community.

I will be objecting to the Foxbridge South planning application for 320 homes and a 'mixed use hub' (this is on top of the 200 homes at Foxbridge North which was already approved at appeal). My problem with this is that there is now to be no primary school for this new community at all as the inspector didn't think one was justified for 200 homes, and wasn't obliged to consider the other half of the development.

This will make it an unsustainable community where all trips to school will likely be by car and not as the 'New Eastern Villages' was designed with 'walking neighbourhoods.

I'll update in the next edition if I was successful in getting the application refused.

Council Motion: I submitted a motion to Swindon Borough Council for the Council meeting on the 23rd November, asking the new Labour Administration to strengthen the protection of the 'Area of Non Coalescence' (in effect the green belt) around our village to prevent additional development beyond the New Eastern Villages from coming closer.

The motion was voted down without debate as they said we can all participate in the 'Local Plan Review' next summer and there may be developments on greenfield sites they would support.

Kite Hill resurfacing works – following observing myself and a resident raising concerns with the quality of the surfacing works I requested a site visit from the Project Manager and Highways team. We met on site this week and walked the length of the works. They explained that the material used 'Ultilayer' is used as any imperfections will be corrected in warmer weather as the surface softens. Some areas had been heat sealed by the contractor following a call back and the remainder they are confident will not be a problem. There is a 1 year warranty on the re-surfacing and they will inspect again next summer before the warranty expires. Overall comments have been very positive.

School Safety Zones - Wanborough & Bishopstone: The consultation for Wanborough has finished ad the one for Bishopstone will end on the 2nd January. The 20mph zone for The Beanlands will also have a final formal consultation and we will be looking at Kite Hill/Church Road again.

He opted out of speaking but when he saw the negative feedback from villagers he relented, allowed children in, removed "reserved" on every table, and opened a shop that sold morning papers. It was a good result for the landlord and the village.

I collected feedback from the teenagers for the Plan. We made a short movie, "Waiting for Gordo," a nod to Samual Beckett's play. The teenagers were great, now adults themselves and they still talk about it.

Frustration at getting things done in a timely manner is the lot of parish councillors. I admire them for their patience, more patience than I have. At one meeting we discussed flooding on Purley Road. Letters were exchanged with Swindon Borough. Nothing happened, twice. Irritated, Gordon, Sid Bishop and I met at the flood with picks and shovels. We dug a trench in an hour and that was the end of the it.

The Liddington logo was designed by Gordon and I got a poem out of it. It's a tribute to Gordon for years of being chair and for his public service. And as you're still on the PC, Gordon, can I tell you the flood is back.

We did another cycling trip!

I suppose it was inevitable.

After having been taken in by the idea that from the Alps to the Mediterranean would be 'simply downhill' (well, in the long run it is, but in practice there's a bit more to it than that) our cycling adventure in September '22 with two good friends way exceeded expectations. So we planned another.

This year we went a bit further, took a bit longer and followed 2 major routes, connected by a 3rd. So in short, we started in Vienna, followed the Danube to Passau and from there took a connecting route to Salzburg where we joined the Ciclovia Alpe Adria Radweg to the Adriatic coast (Italy).

One of the many questions we've been asked (after 'Why?') is about the bikes we used – did we hire them? (no) were they electric? (no) and so how did we get them to Vienna? It turns out many airlines

will take bikes in the hold (boxed obviously) and we find this is easier than trying to travel with them by train. Once again Mitchells supplied us with the cardboard boxes new bikes had been delivered to them in, and with some jiggery pokery (front wheels off, handlebars rotated, tyres deflated...) and plenty of duct tape they were loaded onto our flight in Stanstead and we retrieved them a couple of hours later in Vienna where we met our friends who had taken 3 flights to get themselves and their bikes from British Columbia, Canada to Vienna. The other FAQ is about our luggage when cycling, was it transported for us each day? No, the men are brave and carry panniers – we travel as light as possible but even then, the panniers are heavy!

So it was on a rather disappointingly damp and drizzly morning at the very beginning of September 2023, that with some trepidation, we worked our way through the city centre's cobbles and cycle lanes during the morning rush-hour. But once alongside a canal leading us to the river (Danube), away from the traffic and noise, the drizzle ceased, the day brightened and yes, we were off!

The Danube *isn't* blue but as Europe's 2nd longest river, flowing over 1,700 miles through 10 countries, it's very wide. Travelling west, when we weren't on the banks of the Danube, we passed through picture postcard Austrian towns and villages, often with cobbled streets and onion topped churches whose bells rang out in unison (well, almost), painted houses with geranium filled window boxes, castles, vineyards and monasteries in what turned out to be beautiful weather. It was relatively flat too – a bonus!

There was always some slightly nervous anticipation to see if where we'd booked for the night lived up to the write up and reviews. We usually stayed in small rustic hotels though we spent one memorable night in a somewhat quirky castle; our room keys allowed us to view the rather eccentric collection of suits of armour, stuffed birds and animals and gun displays all very unexpected, but part of the adventure.

On a 'rest day' (i.e. do the washing and sightsee while it dried) we stayed in Airbnb's. Our first rest day was in Passau, the imposing ancient town stands at the confluence of the Danube, the Inn and the Ilz; it was an exciting spot to explore with its

castle high up on a hill offering spectacular views, and pretty squares in which to sit and sip.

From there we followed the Inn towards Salzburg and this is when the landscape changed and the mountains came in to view – and the route got hillier. Lush green meadows, towering rock faces, crystal clear lakes fed by tumbling streams, Tyrolean chalets with more geranium filled window boxes, cowbells, church bells, occasionally passing through dormant ski resorts. Stunning. We loved our day in Salzburg; climbing up to the fortress set high on a hill above the town offering spectacular views in all directions. In the town itself we recognised scenes from the Sound of Music, enjoyed mouth-watering apple strudels and walked miles. Maybe more of a change than a rest after all! The 3rd cycleway of the trip would lead us through the Alps to the coast, so not surprisingly there were some challenging climbs over the next few days in particular up to the old spa town and ski resort of Bad Gastein built into a steep mountainside. A few miles further on, we took a 10 minute train ride through a tunnel saving us thousands more feet of ascent. On the other side of the tunnel our route took us across the border into Italy (totally unmanned by the way!) and through more stunning scenery, now with welcome stretches of downhill! One day our route

followed a disused railway line taking us through 13 long tunnels – some only lit by motion activated lights, others were unlit; scary!

Villach with its nearby lake side beach, Udine with its lovely piazza and Aquliae with astonishing 9th Century mosaics, were just some of the fascinating ancient towns and villages we came through as we headed towards the coast at Grado, our final destination, 554 cycled miles from Vienna.

So on arrival, we paddled, took the customary celebratory photographs before locating our last Airbnb of the trip where we spent 3 days luxuriating in the warm glow of achievement, swimming, resting and eating. The food, the wine and the coffee were all good!

Would I recommend it? a resounding Yes!

Would we do it again? Carpe Diem; it seems Sicily is beckoning.

Walk of the Month - The Ridgeway, Wayland's Smithy and Ashdown House



You can either park in Ashbury or there are small car parks either side of the road on The Ridgeway, marked on the map with the green marker point. This is where I would recommend parking if there is space.

Ashdown House

This is a lovely walk to Waylands Smithy on The Ridgeway and then across fields towards

Ashdown House

This is a 7 1/2 mile walk ,intermediate level and good walking shoes are recommended.

If you are unable to walk this distance then an alternative option is to park at Ashdown House and walk around the grounds which are very nice at different times of the year, especially when the Bluebells are out in late spring.

Also recommended is a walk around Alfred's Castle (an Iron Age hill fort) located to the west of Ashdown House. Hopefully you can see "castle" marked on the map next to Ashdown Park.






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For the love of Gardening! By Jane Pearson (Garden designer & Horticulturalist)



I read a fascinating article in last month's Telegraph (Saturday 11th November) about the need for flood resilient and weatherproof gardens. There is no denying that we're experiencing weather extremes. In parts of UK, plants now have to cope with temperatures as low as -20C and as high as +40C along with prolonged drought conditions. "2023 is predicted to have been the hottest year on record", not to mention the deluge of rain from more frequent storm events. "6 out of ten wettest years have occurred since 1998". RHS Wisely garden manager Sheila Das sums it up nicely "water is often in the wrong place at the wrong time!"

Note to self: Dig a very large pond for water capture and plant a lot of trees for shade.

For the love of gardening:

Building a sustainable garden for a changing climate

Here's a few tips to help make your garden more resilient to our changing climate:

- Invest in water butts the more the merrier!
- Ditch the fake grass. 1 in 10 UK gardens now have 'garden carpet' their microplastics leak into the soil, and they can't take up rainwater.
- De-pave your garden- try to create more permeable surfaces for water to drain away.
- Create rain gardens by keeping the undulations rather than flattening them out, create areas for water to pool instead of eroding your soil when there are downpours. Dig out low lying areas to create ponds and expect them to be either full or dry, surround with marginal bog plants which survive rising and falling water levels.

- If your garden is prone to heavy flooding, consider raised beds, they'll stop your prize plants from drowning in mud.
- Plant trees, they mitigate flooding through their root network while their canopies slow the rain's path onto the ground.
- Plant plants! More plants in our gardens will create healthy soil which is, ultimately the best water butt we have.

"Should I cut back my Verbena Bonariensis plants before winter sets in? They're about 1m tall.

Leaving the foliage in place offers some frost protection and helps you see where the plants are in the border. The seedheads are a valuable food source for birds and the stems provide shelter to overwintering insects. You could venture outside and cut back any over long and broken stems now, but I'd suggest leaving the rest for a good spring trim.

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
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Confessions of an Antiques Dealer No. 8

By the beginning of 1969 it seemed that I was destined to hop from one Antique shop set up to another, as I searched in vain for a suitable outlet for my treasures and a more permanent home, but none of the opportunities on offer to me were in any way ideal. So, for the time being I was dealing on the move, mainly selling to the few customers that I had acquired since I started out in 1965. This wasn't all bad, however, for moving around rather than sitting in a shop would create different chances and may allow me to develop new contacts within the trade. So it was that another encounter set me on a different course and eventually would see me travelling abroad again.

I had made the acquaintance of a lady called Olga in one of the watering holes in Clifton; she was introduced as an artist who struggled to find fame or fortune and in order to earn a living had to resort to colouring antique prints for Frost and Reed, the renowned Art and Print dealers who were based in central Bristol. Sometimes she didn't get the colour quite right or the paint crept over the edges, so Olga had amassed over time an enormous pile of prints that were rejected by Frost and Reed. These "seconds" Olga sold from time to time in order to raise a bit of cash. One night over a pint or two we discussed the print trade worldwide. Olga informed me that hunting and sporting prints were very popular in Spain. As she had a large quantity of these, I reasoned that a bulky folio could be taken to Spain quite easily and I saw the potential for a trip to the continent, especially as I had been told by my Portuguese friend Nito that I needed to visit Albufeira in the Algarve in southern Portugal before the tourist hordes descended on the place following the opening of an airport a few years earlier. So, a decision was made. Olga had agreed that we should split the proceeds of the print sales once reasonable travelling expenses had been taken into account.

The summer of 1969 would be spent selling Antique prints and doing a bit of travelling around the Iberian peninsular. I decided to offer the chance of a trip to some friends and persuaded four of them to join me and we would share expenses. Now all I needed was some suitable transport, so I managed to find a van owned by a firm of builders in Clifton. It was a Bedford Dormobile which the builders had converted and used for carrying builder's materials. I bought it from them for £40. I reckoned that the profits from the sale of the prints would more than cover the costs and a pleasant summer would be spent abroad. So, in April 1969, we set off for Spain. We travelled through France and crossed over the border into Spain. At this stage we held a meeting to discuss our route. A slight change of plan was agreed! We would divert to Marrakesh in Morocco once we had reached the southern coast. We took the ferry from Algeciras to Tangiers and I drove down to Marrakesh, encountering a dense swarm of locusts on the way and some scary Moroccan drivers!

After a few days in Marrakesh, we stayed in Casablanca on the way back. Tense moment there, when we were chased out of a dodgy hotel at dawn by several knife wielding men who wanted to rob us! Fortunately, we reached the van and sped away before they caught us! We were pleased to leave that hotel, especially as there was a scorpion under the bed in one of our rooms! Pleased also to be back in Spain where we travelled to the Portuguese border and crossed a river on a small ferry (I think it was a chain ferry). On to the Algarve and the fabulous unspoilt beauty of the fishing village of Albufeira where we spent a few days and nights in the company of the local fishermen. We were having such a great time that I had almost forgotten the main purpose of the trip; the sale of a large quantity of Antique prints to interested dealers in Spain! Onwards then, taking the very scenic route up through Portugal and stopping eventually in the Basque country in Northern Spain.

I decided to try selling the prints in San Sebastian. I had no knowledge of what dealers to approach, so I just drove into the city, parked near the centre and started walking around with my folio under my arm. I found a small antique shop after an hour's fruitless searching. The owner knew a little English, so we were able to understand each other. As well as the Hunting and Sporting prints, I had some Antique prints of Spanish towns which Olga felt may be of interest. The owner of the shop tried not to be too excited, but I could see that he was very keen to buy. Anyway, he bought the lot! I'm sure that I could have asked more, for he didn't even haggle! I was happy, because even allowing for expenses, I came away with a clear profit of around £450, quite a lot of money in those days. I would be giving Olga half, but still a good day's work! With a spring in my step, now we headed for home and a well-deserved rest from our travels.

This time the van made it back with us, that was a good £40 worth! Time perhaps to start looking for another outlet; soon the search for another antique shop would begin in earnest.
