



Wanborough Parish Council

At the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council in May, John Warr and Omar Mirza were re-elected as Chair and Vice Chair, respectively, for another year. Details on committee chairs and members of each committee are available on our website, Wanborough.info. Under delegated powers, the Footpaths and Village Maintenance Committee and the Hooper's Field Committee now have their own budgets to spend on small projects. Feel free to contact Tracy

(clerk@wanborough.info) or the chairs if you have any suggestions.

One of the first actions of the new council was to agree on proceeding with the Hoopers Field driveway project, partially funded by the sports clubs and led by Martin Rowley. Regrettably,

Martin has since resigned from the council. We thank him for his contributions and the wonderful legacy he leaves behind. Thank you to the villagers for your kind comments. We just need to ask people not to speed down the driveway!!

Graham, our handyman, continues to stay busy and has recently refreshed the play areas between Beanlands and the recreation area with new bark.



Lorna has also been hard at work and has added a new planter at the entrance to the village from The Marsh end.

Grass cutting remains a challenge due to the unusually wet and warm weather, which leaves significant grass debris despite frequent mowing. Our new contractor is doing his best, but the cost of collection is prohibitive. We hope for better weather soon to make this task easier.

The Wanborough Road works continue, with Swindon Borough Council not alerting the Parish Council to works about to commence with additional build-outs. As you read this, work may have already begun, adding a build out to Wanborough Road, close to the allotments, posing further challenges for lorries, agricultural vehicles, and steam

engines navigating this road. Gary has been liaising with SBC and those affected. They are looking at potential solutions to accommodate these large vehicles. If you have any opinions, please email the Clerk or contact our Ward Councillor, Gary Sumner.

On the 8th and 9th of July, you may experience some disruption as parts of Church Road are resurfaced.


The Council met on the 24th to discuss the proposed HGV Refuelling Station on the land to the South of Purley Road, Liddington just past the Commonhead Roundabout. Thank you to everyone who provided comments and feedback to aid our discussion.

Your Ridgeway Borough Councillor update - Gary Sumner: Ward Surgery is 27th July 9-10am at Wanborough Village Hall

Wanborough Road: Conlon finally commenced work on the 17th June (completing mid-September) on the missing section of pavement between Redlands Grove and the SCR junction. This work will also include resurfacing the road which was missed last year and a small section of missing pavement by Horpit. A further 30/50m section beyond the SCR is still being surveyed. Street lights will be switched on in July. I want to see the pavement completed so that Redlands Grove residents and others can safely use the whole road.

Controversially (but in the original 2018 approved plans) are two additional build-outs. One is between Redlands and the SCR by the stone bridge and the other is nearer the build out by the farm track to the north of the allotments. This one creates a chicane which has concerned both the people who run the steam engines and local farmers who use the road for their work outside the village.

I have been liaising with officers in the Highways team and they are actively looking at what solutions could be implemented to make this work.

We have to consider that the point of the changes on Wanborough Road was to reduce speeds and rat running, and whilst there are large agricultural vehicles, the last thing we want are more HGV's finding it a convenient route.

Pack Hill: I recently met with officers on the SCR project to discuss signage directing HGV's up Pack Hill. This is incorrect – whilst HGV's are allowed we should not be encouraging more. They are arranging for signage directing construction traffic for Redlands Grove via Covingham as per the construction management plan until the Southern Connector Road opens in about 6 months.

Three/Relish 4G Broadband: I have been contacted by numerous residents who received a communication from Three saying that their 4G broadband would be turned off mid June. I met with directors from Three and BDUK (Government department for Building Digital UK) and Three admitted their communication was poor. Nobody will be cut off and services will be upgraded once new masts are in place or existing ones are upgraded. They will email all customers before making any changes which will be done over the coming months – this will include free installation of new equipment.

Controversial Planning Application: A full planning was submitted for a field at Purley Road, Liddington to construct a Bio-Compressed Natural Gas HGV refuelling facility for HGV's on what is farmland within the 'Natural Landscape' (formerly known as the AONB). I have called this to planning committee.

Comments can still be made on the full application by putting the reference number S/24/0014 into the SBC planning search page. There are objections from SBC Highways, National Highways (who believe that the plans are incorrect and the site sits closer to the Lyden Brook into which it will discharge). They have requested a pause for 6 months whilst the applicant addresses their concerns.

Liddington Footpaths: Call Out for Supporters

With several other villagers, I presented recently to Liddington Parish Council (LPC) on an initiative, and it was a breath of sweet air. The PC will get things done. The councillors were welcoming, patient and engaged. The fifteen minutes for the public became thirty minutes and that was fine with everyone. I was anxious, to be honest, and it turned out to be a pleasure.

Footpaths around the village.

We're cut off from Badbury Park (now part of our village), the Hospital and the Swindon network of footpaths. I believe we need a path to Commonhead Roundabout, good enough for cyclists, prams and wheelchairs. Purley Road below the cottages is a death trap.

In addition, a safe path to Liddington Hill would open multiple circular routes. I can't run up there now with my dog and I certainly wouldn't try with children.

And there are suggestions for other links to make circular paths.

How do we do this?

Andrew Poppleton has agreed for us to pull this together initially. We need supporters who can commit a few hours each month so that we make quick progress. We have several committed already including parish councillors. Nea Joffe has agreed to be tea and cake manager!

LPC have kindly agreed to discuss funding for the path to Commonhead at the July meeting. We'll set up a public meeting soon afterwards to get engagement, invite suggestions and agree specific tasks. Please drop me a note if you'd like to be involved:

'The Harrow Inn'

We're back in Wanborough High Street again this month for a visit to the 'Harrow Inn'. The 'Harrow' is by far the oldest inn in Wanborough, with its history going back before the earliest existing deed of 1747, when it was known as the 'Harrow and King's Head'. In the late 1800's there was also a brewery next door to the inn. Interestingly, the inn is apparently haunted by the friendly ghost of a coachman, Charlie Marlow, who crashed his coach outside, killing himself and all his passengers. A previous landlord at the inn reported several ghostly encounters, but one does have to wonder if these could have been the result of a little too much sampling of his own beverages!

The 'Harrow Inn' is another pub that has experienced some choppy waters in recent years. The last landlord, Sanjay Dogra left after only 18 months. Luckily for Wanborough, Richard and Charlotte True have taken up the baton and the inn opened again for business in January this year. Richard is a former estate agent who has held a lifelong dream of owning and running a pub.

We booked our table by email which was answered promptly by Richard and visited on a wet and windy summer's evening. We expected the pub to be quiet but boy were we wrong! The main bar was busy and noisy with a mix of locals and visitors to the village. Two large TV screens were showing the US Golf Open and there were two more big screens in a covered area outside in the back garden.

For drinks I chose a pint of 'Deer Stalker' from the Ramsbury Brewery and my better half started with an Elderflower Cordial. Other beers on tap included 'Dizzy Blonde,' a pale ale from the Robinsons Brewery and the popular 'Butcombe Original'.

Richard admits that his focus is on building up a 'drinks-led' pub rather than one that majors on food and the menu is quite short with largely typical 'pub-grub'. We went through to the adjoining and quieter restaurant where another couple were dining. With its thatched roof, low beams and fireplaces, the 'Harrow Inn' should be a cosy pub, but this room was quite cold on what was a chilly evening. To start with my better half selected the Korean Chicken Wings and I went for the Calamari with garlic aioli and scorched lime. My wife found the Chicken Wings yummy and served in a sweet and spicy BBQ sauce. My

Calamari was OK but the batter coating was quite thin so they weren't very crispy. For mains, my wife chose the Fish & Chips, whilst I selected the Local Sausage with a black pudding mash, gravy and crispy onions. The Fish & Chips, served with peas was fine although the batter on the fish was a little sparse. My black pudding mash was smooth and tasty and I appreciated the accompanying large jug of onion gravy. To finish off we shared a Sticky Toffee Pudding with ice cream which we both enjoyed.

During the evening we were well looked after by Zoe our waitress and it was good to see the 'Harrow Inn' back in business and attracting customers once again. If you are looking for somewhere to watch the Euro footy, drink some well-kept beer and maybe enjoy a simple meal, then this dog and children friendly pub is well worth a visit. We also heard some good things from one of the locals about their Sunday lunches!

We would be grateful of a donation of £5 per entrant which will all go to the Cancer Research UK charity.



Run by a local Mum, who wanted the children to have a chance to meet and play together. As well as somewhere for their parents, grandparents or carers to meet and chat too!



Wanborough Primary School - July Issue

Reception's new topic is 'Under the Sea'. They have been reading *Commotion in the Ocean*, retelling and acting the story and creating their own sea collages on paper plates. They have used globes and atlases to locate areas of land and sea and discussed the habitats of different sea creatures. In Music, the children have been learning songs with movement such as In and Out the Dusty Bluebells.

Year 1 have just completed their Phonic Screening (reading a mixture of real and made-up words) to check their phonics knowledge, the basis for successful reading and spelling. Their new topic is Great Fire of London, learning about Samuel Pepys and what life in London was like in 1666. In Science, the class are growing sunflowers and learning about the parts and functions of plants.

Year 2 have been writing Pirate diaries as part of their Pirate topic. In Maths, they have been learning fractions (1/2, 1/4 and 1/3) and telling the time. In Science, they have been learning about seeds and plants and have planted Dwarf Runner Beans and Curly Cress seeds. In Geography, the children have been naming oceans of the world. In PE, they have been practising striking and fielding games, and practising for Sports Day.

Year 3 have been turning white roses blue in Science and exploring the functions of the stem. The class visited a Hindu temple in Swindon. They went into the Mandir and watched a prayer. They also learnt about the religion and watched videos of Hindu celebrations. In English, they started exploring the book Egyptian Cinderella and comparing it to the traditional Cinderella story that they know already.

Year 4 have just completed the Multiplication Checker required by the Government. In Maths, the class have been converting between measurements of time. In English they have designed their own Greek god /goddess in preparation for writing a non-chronological report. In Art, the children completed their Ancient Greek clay pots, painting them in Greek colours and then evaluating their pots.

Year 5 took a walk around the village undertaking a survey of the litter – where it was found and how much there was (the majority being next to bins!). In Art, they created flowers using a string-painting technique then painted their own vase to go with them. In Music, Year 5 learnt to compose in ternary form using a pentatonic scale and they are currently learning about music from India and Pakistan-singing in Hindi and performing moves to accompany the song. In Maths, Year 5 have been learning about angles, even enjoying a game of Angles Battleships. In English, the children have been writing persuasive letters.

Year 6 have completed SATS and have been on their trip to France, furthering relationships with our partner school in St Cyr near Poitiers. The children went to the annual Junior Young Citizen event where they had talks from the Police about 'Stranger Danger', internet safety, rail safety. Barnardos talked to the children about mental health and wellbeing. In Art, the children have created Mayan masks from clay as part of their topic about the Mayan, learning about their gods, beliefs and daily life.

The whole school received water safety information delivered by staff from Better (Leisure Centres) to keep the children safe near the sea, lakes and rivers. Each class also had the opportunity to engage in a Circus Skills workshop by the Sports Project and they built human pyramids of up to 6 children!

Debating Team – a team of 4 children from Year 5 brilliantly represented Wanborough Primary school at the finals of the local school debating competition against Lethbridge, Brookfield and Ferndale primary schools. They debated against the statement 'It would be good to be famous' The team did a fantastic job but were beaten by a very strong team from Lethbridge.

Our Young Carers have had fun with indoor games and creating Mexican Ojo's (coloured wool wound around a framework to create an eye-catching wall hanging).

Clubs this term are: cookery, colouring, mini craft, mini movers, cricket, rounders, gardening, Subbutteo table football, Adventure World story building, Strictly Come Wanborough and Zumba.

Bishopstone and District Gardening Club

Members of the Bishopstone and District Gardening Club were met with an array of jars and bottles full of beguiling ingredients for herbal medicine when they entered the village hall for their June meeting. There were no pointed black hats in sight just a very knowledgeable and articulate lady called Lyn Blythe who is a medical herbalist. Lyn was there to talk to us about herbal remedies from our garden. She has an extensive list of credentials, having started to train as a doctor for three years she was drawn to other ways of treating people for their underlying conditions. With first class degrees in herbal medicine, acupuncture, physiotherapy and a degree in physiology and biochemistry, she was the perfect person to introduce some of us sceptics to herbal medicine and the science behind why it works.

She talked about how to make herbal teas, tinctures and infusions with some of the herbs she had brought in. She explained how numerous plants we can find in our gardens and hedgerows can be used for many ailment including: cough and cold remedies from elderberries containing anthocyanins and vitamin C, tinctures of rosemary for digestion, memory problems and blood circulation, hawthorn berries for the heart and blood pressure, and many more plants at our disposal for our health. All this of course came with a warning

that no one should just give up their prescribed medicine and that many of these plants are often best used in combinations with others that medical herbalists (preferably a member of the National Institute of Medical Herbalists) will understand best.

Everyone agreed it was a thoroughly interesting and informative talk and I, for one came away thinking I probably had a use for almost every berb she mentioned for my allments and we all left honefully clut

every herb she mentioned for my ailments and we all left hopefully clutching a fistful of handouts to help us make simple herbal teas, vinegars and oils.



Wanborough "War Book or Defence Scheme"

Following the German invasion of France and the evacuation of Dunkirk in mid-1940, and the subsequent Blitz of urban towns and cities together with strategic industrial and military targets, it was perceived that the enemy was preparing for an invasion of Britain.

In the face of the threat of a German invasion in 1941 'Invasion Committees' were formed in towns and villages to cooperate with the military and plan for the worst should their communities be isolated or occupied. These committees were to prepare a 'War Book' using a standard format issued by the Ministry of Home Security. The members of committees included representatives of the local council, the Home Guard, the Air Raid Precautions wardens, the Fire Service, the Police, the Women's Voluntary Service and other local organisations, as well as officers for medicine, sanitation and food.

PART 22 ACTION TO BE TAKEN IN THE EVENT OF ENEMY AIRBORNE There are twenty-two Parts in a War Book starting with an outline of the problem and continuing with a detailed list of local assets and personal responsibilities with location and telephone numbers of the

various key individuals. Detailed inventories of local resources are included: vehicles, animals, stock of food and basic tools, and lists made of contact details for personnel. Plans were made for a wide range of emergencies, including care and accommodation of evacuees to mortuaries and places to bury the dead. Should hasty evacuation become necessary the war books were to be destroyed.

We are fortunate that a copy of the War Book prepared by the Wanborough Parish Invasion Committee survives. The date on the document is January 1943 so the preparation and typing the copies must have been in 1942 and provides fascinating details of local personalities and where they were living.

Wanborough Scouts during WW2.

During WW2 the Scouts played an active role on the Home Front under the slogan 'The Boy Scouts are carrying on'. Scouts played a key part in the Civil Defence role during the Blitz of Britain and by the end of 1940 Scouts had collected thirty five thousand tons of waste paper while others collected scrap metal. To prepare for the blackouts, teams of Scouts helped by painting white

lines on the edge of roads to improve visibility in the dark. Other duties included serving as Police messengers, firemen, stretcher bearers, assisting with the evacuation of children from towns and cities and rescuing people from the rubble of

buildings. Forestry camps were organized with Scouts moving felled trees to points of collection which was physically demanding as the camps lasted for several weeks.

During the WW2 the Scout Association issued a "Civil Defence" shield proficiency badge featuring a yellow shield



Although local records don't go back to 1940's, in 2005 the Wanborough Scouts enquired about details from The Scout Association archivist relating to The Scouts in Wanborough. The details confirmed "The first mention of a Group was in 1943 when the Group was registered on a temporary wartime paper." As the War Book was issued in January 1943 it could be possible the Group in Wanborough was registered in response to the allocated task as Messengers, elsewhere it lists the resource was 7 members. The Scouts were also tasked with maintaining and stocking the boilers at the St Andrew's Hall (Village Hall) Rest Centre, and "make themselves familiar with lighting them up". There's another proficiency badge!

At the outbreak of WW2 John Averies was aged 15 and still at school while living at Blenheim on Kite Hill, with his parents Stanley and Susan Averies. The Averies family are mentioned several times in the War Book; father Stanley was the Parish Council representative on the Invasion Committee and an ARP Warden while his wife was listed with son John under First Aid Personnel. Susan also volunteered for the Dinner shift, if required, at the St Andrew's Hall Rest Centre catering for evacuees and also included in a list of WVS Members.

As the 1st Wanborough Scout Group celebrate their Anniversary this month please get in touch if there are any further details of the Scouts during WW2, it would be amazing to find that one of the special badges still exist!



CHISELDON LOCAL HISTORY GROUP

Our next meeting is on Wednesday 17th July 2024 in the Church Hall, Butts Rd, SN4 0NN at 7.30 p.m. when the subject is "1066 and all that - The Bayeux Tapestry" presented by Timothy Brain. The Bayeux Tapestry is an embroidery cloth nearly 70 metres long and 50 centimetres tall that depicts the events leading up to the Norman Conquest in 1066, led by William, Duke of Normandy challenging King Harold II and culminating in the Battle of Hastings. It is thought to date to the 11th century, within a few years of the battle. Now widely accepted to have been made in England perhaps as a gift for William, it tells the story from the point of view of the conquering Normans and for centuries has been preserved in Normandy. The cloth consists of 58 scenes, many with Latin inscriptions embroidered on linen with coloured woollen yarns. It is likely that it was commissioned by Bishop Odo of Bayeux, William's maternal halfbrother. There is a huge amount of detail within the tapestry and scholars are still interpreting it and finding new information. Come along and see what surprises are in store!
