



#### Dear Friends

And so, we arrive at that great turning point of the year, Christmas, a season I have always enjoyed and welcomed with delight, as do so many of us. We celebrate the returning of natural light in the depths of a northern winter. Imperceptibly at first, but then more rapidly, the days begin to lengthen and the sun's light strengthen. But alongside this returning natural light, in the midst of the darkest weeks of the year,

we celebrate the coming of the one true 'human divine' light into our all too broken and dark human world, where good news of great joy is in rather short supply. What a relief, after a truly appalling year of news events from across the world, to be contemplating and celebrating the message of the nativity,



recorded for us by Matthew and Luke: 'Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord.' The shepherds were told that the evidence, or sign, to look out for, that would tell them they had found the right baby, was that it would be wrapped in cloth and lying in an animal feeding trough! Even in first century Palestine this would not have been the first choice of a cot for a mother to lay her new born baby in. Who would have thought, or predicted, that God would choose such humble circumstances in which to make his personal appearance on earth in human form? So, God's anointed, Saviour King, the Word made flesh, is born among us in humility, in poverty, temporarily homeless, and in weakness, dependent on Mary and Joseph for every need, amidst the usual political tension, unrest and violence of those who rule by fear and force.

Yet God's wisdom is always vindicated by His actions and by events. He comes to us, not to impose the solutions we need upon us, for then we would not be truly free or truly human anymore. But to show us the way and open the way, for our transformation from within, the making new of our own hearts, thorough faith and trust in Him, who loves us still, despite the mess we make of things. The solution is there for us all to choose and embrace. Will we follow where the evidence leads – however strange? Will we, like the shepherds and later, the Magi from the East, seek the one true human divine light that offers us a new start, a new heart and a new

vision of what it means to be human? Indeed, a relationship with the God, who created our universe and all life within it, and who came among us as one of us, full of grace and truth, and says to us "come follow me"?

Do join us for one, or more, of our Christmas Services, to welcome and celebrate "the good news of great joy which is for all

people": the birth of the Saviour. We would love to see you.

#### December 2024

On behalf of all Parish Council members, we are saddened to announce that Tracy, our Clerk, has resigned and will be leaving on November 30th.

During her eight months with us, despite being new to the role, Tracy quickly mastered her responsibilities and managed our council meetings with professionalism, ensuring that minutes were published within days.

Tracy oversaw the resurfacing of Hoopers Field Drive, implemented the village maintenance contract, and collaborated closely with the handyman to maintain gates, stiles, and footpaths. Tracy also upgraded our accounting software, providing better financial forecasting and visibility.

Tracy has been a tremendous asset to our village, always courteous and quick to respond to enquiries.

While the Council did discuss her reasons for leaving to understand how we might ensure greater longevity for future clerks, we recognize that several factors influenced her decision. Unfortunately, one of those factors remains outside the Council's control. A small but vocal group of residents regularly contacted Tracy to point out perceived shortcomings. Such interactions can be discouraging and hurtful. We urge everyone to remember that it takes time for a new clerk to settle in and hope residents understand that constructive support and patience can make a significant difference.

We wish Tracy all the best in her new role in the care sector.

Our handyman, Graham, has been hard at work. The hedge along Rotten Row to Magdalen Road has been trimmed back, making it safer for parents walking children to school. Moss and leaves were removed from Mayfield to help elderly residents during wet conditions. At Hooper's Field, Graham has repaired and repainted the dugouts, and worn patches of grass were infilled to prevent muddy puddles.

There is now a WhatsApp group for allotment holders to improve communication, and we'll continue working on enhancements over the coming months. A pile of old fencing is being cleared, with new hedging to be planted soon.

Hooper's Field will soon have a new pétanque terrain, and we invite anyone interested in joining the newly formed Wanborough Pétanque Club to contact the Clerk.

The village litter pick and sign cleaning, postponed due to bad weather, will be rescheduled, and Cllr. Sumner will communicate the new date soon.

Swindon Borough Council has published its latest Swindon Plan, which is open for public consultation. A copy is available on our village website, Wanborough.info, and listening events are scheduled at various local locations.

As we approach 2025, the Parish Council is finalising next year's plans and budgets. We aim to continue supporting local sports clubs while allocating funds for the betterment of other areas in the Parish. We welcome suggestions from residents, particularly those who recently settled in Redlands. Ideas on road, path, pavement, hedgerows or planting are appreciated, as are any proposals to foster better community engagement, where the Council could provide initial support or resources.

The recruitment process for a new Clerk is underway, and the job description and application details are available on our website. Applications are open until the second week of January. In the interim, we've appointed Sally as our Locum Clerk. Sally is highly experienced, and we hope everyone will extend her a warm welcome.

We also have vacancies for Parish Councillors; if you're interested, please come along or please contact the Clerk.



#### Your Ridgeway Borough Councillor update from Gary Sumner

#### There is no Ward Surgery in December, but do contact me by phone or email if I can help with anything.

**Wanborough Road:** I was contacted by residents about the missing section of pavement on the Wanborough Road and I chased this up with SCC and Conlon.

As a result, this is a recent update on works from Conlon, which should take us to mid-December. I've removed the section on works due to be completed before this copy goes out, but streetlights are now working and bollards on the build-outs will have been replaced and the build-outs will have been surfaced.

We have now received the bollards for the buildouts. I have had to submit a 171 licence to Swindon 'Streetworks' to put traffic lights onto the network.

Programme is as follows: Monday 18<sup>th</sup> November start works to the footpath including filter drain & headwall north of the SCR traffic lights approximately 4 weeks, under 2-way traffic lights.

This will then leave the Horpit junction for the New Year as this is yet to be agreed with clients.

**HGV traffic:** I have received numerous reports of construction traffic using The Marsh and Pack Hill. The developers have been reminded that until the SCR opens their delivery route is via Covingham. The 'No HGV' sign on the roundabout at Pack Hill is being removed by persons unknown and will be reinstated.

**Redlands Grove:** I've been contacted by residents (in particular on Redlands Way) about speeding and I've approached the developers (as the road will not be adopted for some years) about implementing an advisory 20mph zone and installing some temporary build-outs.

**Litter pick:** I was disappointed to have to cancel our recent planned litter pick due to a storm which did bring high winds and heavy rain. I will get something booked in for January/February and publish a date in the January edition of The Lyden.

**Winter problems:** If you spot blocked drains or fallen branches this can be reported online (links are on my website) but if there is something urgent do please contact me directly by phone or email.

#### Whose Turn is it this Christmas?

When my first wife and I separated over thirty years ago, we agreed all the necessary details about our home, our children, our income going forward and so on, and we did it without rancour.

We still smile about those two kids who married young, she at twenty and I at twenty-two. We were far too young, but it was common in those days to marry and get away from big families. The downside, as in our case, is that we grew up and we grew apart.

The separation was sad, yet formal and beyond reproach and we remain good friends to this day.

When it came to Christmas, I had no expectation that our four daughters would come to me on that day. Instead, we agreed that all six of us would celebrate in the week before Christmas and my ex-wife could plan Christmas Day to suit herself. We still do it now, four daughters and nine grandchildren later, and it even has a name: *Granddad's Christmas*.

I'll admit that heading back to England afterwards has always been difficult, especially on Christmas Eve in the early days when often I was the only passenger on the plane.

As the years went by, my daughters married and introduced in-laws through their husbands, and on reflection that decision about *Granddad's Christmas* was inspired. Everyone looks forward to it and the grandchildren see it as normal, the new normal I suppose.

There has only been one upset, many years ago. I bought a gift for one of my grandchildren without knowing she had requested the same gift, in writing, from Father Christmas. That required some white-knuckle explaining while I told porky-pies about being Father Christmas's messenger. The parents, not happy with me, had a mad scramble to change their gift on Christmas Eve.

Separation was a big issue in Ireland in my day.

Our story even got into the newspapers before the divorce referendum with a headline: "Hello Divorce, Goodbye Daddy."

Nowadays many couples have one or both partners with a previous marriage. My wife and I have history there. It's not uncommon. Extrapolate it though and it gets complicated. We have friends with children from current and previous relationships, who in turn have grandparents from separate relationships.

And then, along comes Christmas. Imagine the cocktail of multiple families trying to agree who visits whom, on what day, or who has their turn at hosting. It's a phenomenon of our generation, all those interrelated relationships that society struggles to explain.

Even the language is inadequate. We need a new lexicon to catch up on modern relationships. I've tried it as a poet over the years but writing about my own separation has eluded me, which probably says something.

Here are a few lines from one poem which you could play with over Christmas:

You and your ex, and me and mine, and your ex's ex and all the grandkids, and my ex's son marries your ex's daughter and we all live happily ever after . . .



#### Sue Birley - A resident from The Marsh

An article by me, about the 30+ years David and I have cycled in France on Bromptons, appeared in the Lyden last March. Since then we have enjoyed another 'tour de France', but I have also been whizzing round Wiltshire (in a car, I'm afraid), talking about our adventures to W.I. groups, and Probus and U3A.

A couple of years ago a friend asked me to speak about my travels and the book recording them at a Chiseldon Women's Institute meeting and soon after I became an approved speaker for the Wiltshire Federation. I have now given about 25 talks in the county with more to come, and have enjoyed meeting the members and visiting parts of Wiltshire I barely knew existed. It has been great fun and not without its excitement. My talk is illustrated and on two occasions I have been unable to show the slides – once on a sunny August day where there were no blinds for the windows and once when I forgot to take my computer. On such occasions the Brompton becomes the star so that rather than showing it off as a footnote after the pictures, the talk centres on how it folds and unfolds and how comfortable to ride it is, if slow. At Kington Langley (where I did show the slides) the W.I. President decided to see for herself and rode my Brompton round and round their very large hall and I must say there was quite a queue to have a go!







6,300 feet), which I heartily recommend if only for the coming down again. The next year we returned to Provence to visit the Verdon gorges and since then have revisited Alsace and explored the Basque country. We have had two trips to the Auvergne, on one occasion visiting Vichy, a spa town and seat of the Pétain government in World War 2. We have toiled up hills in upper Provence (upper in more than one sense) and, this year,

roamed around Champagne, Bourgogne and Franche-Comté. The area is less mountainous than the regions we usually visit and we exchanged hills for waterways, cycling down the Marne-Saône canal and joining the Voie Bleue for a couple of days, a cycle route which follows the Moselle and the Saône rivers from Luxembourg to Lyon. We went to the hilltop town of Langres which dominates the view from miles around. We were commenting on the wonderful sight as we approached, then

remembered we had to get up there somehow. Well, there was only one way and we arrived eventually and stayed there three nights as the weather forecast was a bit mucky. It was ideal, however, for tramping round the streets and particularly the one and a half kilometres of ramparts. The French philosopher Diderot was born there so nearly everything is named after him: Place Diderot, Rue Diderot, Maison Diderot, Boulangerie Diderot (not very good croissants, I'm afraid but the Place and the Rue furbished plenty of refreshment places so all was well). The museums were excellent – we don't normally visit many as we spend the days cycling but we enjoyed being cultured for a change.

The Saône trail took us to Dole in the Jura, one of my favourite towns. It is very elegant and there are good cycle ways along the main road to the centre. It is the birthplace of the brilliant Louis Pasteur and I was thrilled to be able to photograph his microscope in the excellent museum located in the house in which he was born.

Pasteur was an amazing chap. You might be familiar with the pasteurisation of milk but do you realise that our wine wouldn't be quite the same without it? (Pasteurisation, not milk.) OK, he tackled anthrax too, but when it comes to the order of things ...

I am often asked during my talks how far we go each day. I usually reply 'it depends' or 'not as far as we used to' or 'it depends if we find any lunch'. (As we rarely found lunch on our last holiday, the bars and cafés in the country disappearing as fast as our

country pubs, we managed respectable distances. We did once find an open 'Café de la Gare' but there was no longer any station.) I am also asked about electrification. I reply that it's good to know that it's there for when we get *really* old and crumbly, but it's doubtful that we'd add batteries to our vintage Bromptons, which are heavy enough to lift onto trains as it is. But the titanium electric model is only £4,500 and I for one think I'm worth it!

Please excuse me for mentioning that I'm told my book makes a nice present and I believe present time is approaching. Anyone who gets it directly from me can have it for £10 (RRP 10.99).

#### Fifty Years of The Lyden Magazine

#### From the Archives

Ron Kent, who lived in the village for many years with his wife Joan on the High Street, wrote a regular monthly article for The Lyden Magazine from the first edition in 1974 and continued for many years afterwards.

Ron was well known for his extensive knowledge on growing fruit and vegetables, he was a long standing allotment holder, winning many "Best Kept" allotment competitions and helped out at the Flower Show at the Annual Wanborough Show.

A copy of Ron's first "In the Garden" article in November 1974's Lyden as shown below.

In Your Garden.

By now the tops of the Dohlias will have been blackened by the frost, and no further time should be lost in getting the tubers up. They should be dug up carefully with a fork, and as much soil as possible shaken off, and they any remaining, carefully prised away with a blunt stick. The stems should be cut down to about six inches. After all this has been done the tubers should be stood upside down to drain the moisture out for at least a couple of weeks. They need somewhere where the sun and drying winds can get at them, but on no account leave then exposed to frost. When well dry, store in deep boxes with the tubers just covered with dry peat or soil, but leave the crowns above or they may rot. Damp and frost are the biggest enemies through the severe weather. The latest idea of storing tubers through the winter is to put them, well packed with dry straw, inside a black polythene bag such as a refuse bag. Tie the top with strong string or wire to make it airtight and keep in a dry frost proof place, but not in a centrally heated room. Have a look at them every month to see they are not developing mildews or dry rot. Gladioli corms should be dug up, cut off about two inches above the corn and put in boxes to dry. After a week or two, the old corm can be pulled away from the base and the new ones stored away. If you have the time, the little white cormlets around the base can be saved, and sown in rows next spring to grow on to flowering size which takes 2-3 years. Outdoor Chrysants can be dug up now, and after shortening the stems to about six inches, packed into boxes until the spring. Frost will not hurt these so they can be left in a cold frame for the winter. Give plenty of air whenever possible, but keep the rain off at all cost. It's not the cold that kills Chrysants but rather the wet conditions prevailing during the winter months. Keep the boxes on the dry side until the sun begins to gain power during the Spring.

If you want some scented flowers during early Spring, and possess a bed of Lily of the Valley, dig a few roots now, and select some of the fattest shoots. Fut about five of these in a five inch pot of good compost with the tips just showing after potting. Water well and place in a cold frame or a very house or sunny window and within weeks or two later take them into the green-appear. All the more enjoyable through the dull days of winter with their lovely scent.



#### Wanborough "War Book or Defence Scheme"

Following bombing during WW1 and growing tension in Europe and Asia the Government became increasingly concerned about the possibility of aerial incendiary and gas attacks on towns and cities resulting in a huge number of casualties. In 1924 a committee was formed and known as Air Raid Precautions (ARP) to prepare the country for air raids in the future.

#### Air Raid Wardens Service.

In April 1937 the Air Raid Wardens' Service was formed and The Air Raids Precautions (ARP) Act 1937 came into force on 1<sup>st</sup> January 1938, compelling all local authorities to create their own ARP services with responsibility for organising wardens, messengers, ambulance drivers, rescue parties, and for liaison with police and fire brigades. The aim was to seek 800,000 volunteers and by mid-1938 200,000 had joined. By the outbreak of war numbers had risen to more than 1.5 million. Wardens were responsible for ARP advice to the public, for reporting bombs and other incidents, and were joined by the Women's Voluntary Service in May 1938. In towns and cities air raid

shelters were distributed from 1938, and the Wardens enforced the blackout, using air raid sirens when required and issuing gas masks. Most Wardens were part-time volunteers who carried out their ARP duties as well as full-time jobs and although initially they wore their own clothes with a steel helmet, in May 1941 full-time and regular part-time Wardens were issued with blue serge uniforms and armbands.

The wardens were based at

home and the importance of their role is shown by each being marked on the War Book map, included in August's Lyden article.

The Wardens were Operational Members of the Invasion Committee and led by **Alexander Ford-Deacon** who was born and lived all his life at Parsonage Farm in Wanborough. When his parents Joseph and Emily died in 1932 both his brothers had moved away and Alex lived at Parsonage Farm until he died in 1975. He was often seen walking round the village with his dog.

#### Fireguards.

Originally formed as part of the ARP the Fireguards were volunteers organised by local authorities to report and deal with small fires caused by incendiary bombs, working alongside the Wardens and National Fire Service. These volunteers were



formed into small teams of 3 to 5 covering their home area and trained to tackle small fires using stirrup pumps and sand.

The plans were extended as the war progressed and in May 1942 (just as the War Book was being written) an Order was issued which made it compulsory for women to enrol for Fireguard duties. It was also compulsory for every person not engaged in any other form of part time civil defence duties to register. By the end of December 1943 it was estimated that there were some six million people enrolled in the Fireguards.

The list of volunteers in Wanborough includes names not appearing elsewhere in the War Book, perhaps due to the Order making it compulsory for people not engaged in roles elsewhere. The list also includes the first women in an operational role mentioned in the book, Mrs McConnell at The Gables and Miss Hollis in Rotten Row.

The Senior Fireguard was Edgar Frederick Frank Jefferies, who was a Constituent Member of the Invasion

#### Committee.

Frank Jefferies was born in 1887 at Stratton St Margaret and married Beatrice Clare Kent from Wanborough at St Andrew's Church in 1909. In 1911 he was recorded as a Plasterer living with his parents-in-law Leonard and Elizabeth Kent at The Orchard, Rotten Row.

During WW1 Frank enlisted in Royal Flying Corps in 1917, and after transfer to the RAF and promotion to Corporal Mechanic he transferred to the Reserve in 1919 before discharge in April 1920.

By 1921 Frank was a Builder and Contractor and also Postmaster and Shopkeeper living at The Post Office, Lower Wanborough between The Plough and The Harrow with wife Beatrice, daughter Marjorie, nephew Freddie Pullen from Swindon working in the Post Office and Beatrice Goddard a Domestic Servant

from London.

By the middle of 1930s Frank had moved to The Gables and later extended his workshop at The Close into a family home, and was living there when the War Book was written. In addition to Frank being Senior Fireguard, The Close was also a First Aid Point with the ambulance plus 2 stretchers stationed in the yard behind in addition to the fire pump.

During this time Frank was no stranger to the courts. In addition to disputes involving work related issues Frank made national news when a motoring offence involving a "HALT" sign progressed to the Court of Appeal where the judges sent the case back to the magistrates with instructions to reverse their decision to guilty!

Frank's wife Beatrice died in 1943 and the following year he married Phyllis Ruby Rudge, whose father was a jeweller living at 21 Regent Street, Swindon. Frank died in 1949 while living at Trees, Quarry Road, Swindon.





#### **Confessions of an Antiques Dealer**

#### No. 14

My sudden exit from my shop in Redland, Bristol and my subsequent retreat into my hideaway flat next door to the shop following my court appearance and resulting suspended prison sentence didn't mean that I could stop buying and selling. However, before I could concentrate fully on earning a living, I had a very pressing loose end to sort out. I had bought a very valuable and large piece of Art Nouveau silver from Dave and Andy, the likeable rogues and suppliers of antiques with dubious origins. It might be that this piece was acquired honestly, but I couldn't count on it, and they didn't offer a receipt for it. I needed to dispose of it as soon as possible.

I had heard of an open-air antiques market that operated every Friday morning in Bermondsey East London, so I decided to take the large piece of silver there. If there weren't any takers, then I could take it to Sotheby's in New Bond Street. It was a rare piece. I had done some research, but I hadn't seen any similar items in my sale catalogues. However, I still estimated that this exhibition piece could be worth somewhere in the region of £1800. It had only cost me £150, so I should be able to turn a decent profit.

I decided to ask £1200 and to accept any offer around £1000. My partner in my Redland shop, Jean, had a friend called Lou who was interested in learning the business. She was from a village in Gloucestershire, but she spent more and more time in Bristol, and we had become quite close.

She wondered if I would like some company on the London trip, so she joined me for the journey. I had disposed of my van by now and had bought a Ford estate car, so with the tea chest containing the sliver in the boot we set off for London down the A4 early one Friday morning in November 1971. Just the other side of Marlborough we were pulled over by the police. My worst fear was being realised.

The police explanation for stopping us was that there was a similar car to mine that had been seen following a burglary in the neighbourhood. "Can you open the boot, please, sir". So, I opened the boot and the only thing in there was the tea chest containing the silver. I decided that my confidence and enthusiasm rather than any attempts at evasion may be the best policy. "We are on our way to a market in London to sell a fabulous piece of silver". With that, I removed the lid of the tea chest and lifted out the silver. "What do you think, officers? Isn't it impressive?" Then I went on at length to describe the styles and decoration of the Art Nouveau period with reference to the silver piece. "Very nice, sir, do you have a receipt for it". "Not on me, but I can supply one when we return to Bristol". By now they were keen to get on their way. "That won't be necessary, sir. Best of luck in London" With that they drove away, and I breathed a sigh of relief.

Onward to Bermondsey London where the market was well under way. I parked the car, intending to sound out any silver or Art Nouveau dealers who were selling there. We found a couple of dealers who seemed quite interested, so we went back to the car to unload the silver. Disaster! The car was gone. Stolen? We went to a shop nearby to ask the owner if he'd noticed anything suspicious. "Ah. That'll be the police. They were towing cars away this morning. It's probably in the pound at Southwark" Semi relieved, but still apprehensive, we made our way to Southwark. A massive car park with the police cabin up in the air in the middle. Upon entry we were asked for the car registration number and my name.

A few minutes later I was approached. "You are not required to say anything ... etc. Don't worry, sir, we always caution drivers. Standard procedure. Here's your paperwork. You'll have to pay £20 before we can release your car" Very relieved, I coughed up quickly and we returned to the car. I told Lou "I'm not going to Sotheby's. Today's events have totally spooked me, let's get back to Bristol".

Once back in Bristol, I decided that the silver piece was bad news and I wanted to be rid of it as soon as humanely possible. I had a friend called George who had been with me on one of my trips to the continent a few years before. His parents were caretakers of a Psychiatric hospital not far from Bristol. It was a large mansion set in acres of grounds. I said to George "Would you mind taking this silver piece with the tea chest that it fits in and burying it in the grounds of the hospital? I'll buy you a drink or two!" George agreed. I never went back to look for it, so I presume that it's still there. Unless... Two weeks later I heard that George had bought a plane ticket to Australia. Did he fail to bury it but instead sold it to finance his future life abroad?

I'll never know for I never saw him again. It was time for me to move on and rebuild my business and somewhat shattered reputation.
