A letter from the Vicar – April 2025



Dear Friends

As we move into April, we complete the last few weeks of Lent and will soon enter Holy Week, culminating in Good Friday and Easter Day. Good Friday is a strange name for a day which remembers the execution of a truly extraordinary man, on trumped up charges, because he dared to challenge the status quo of the leaders and elites of his day. Jesus' death on the cross has reverberated down through

history and changed the world and countless lives. Here is one example.

A few weeks ago, a very dear relative died whom I had known for 50 years. As we all know for the immediate family this is a devastating loss and for other members of our wider family very, very sad indeed. As it happened, I had a very special half hour with this person in hospital, just a matter of 10

days or so, before they died. He was weak but perfectly clear in his mind and we talked. He said "you spend most of your life not thinking about it (meaning dying) and then it suddenly comes and knocks you for six". He was most concerned about his wife, my sister. I was able to reassure him that we would all do everything possible to make sure she would be fine and that was a nailed-on guarantee. But I was also able to look him in the eye and reassure him totally of the hope that is ours, in Christ.

I knew this was the case because some years ago now, he and my sister started attending a Christian Fellowship near where they lived and came to a personal faith in Jesus Christ. And in Christ Jesus we can certainly face death with a sure and certain hope. A sure and certain hope that death is not actually the end, that because of Christ's death in our place and His resurrection from the dead, the best is actually yet to come for us, beyond death. Paul says as much in his letter to the Romans: It is

Christ Jesus, who died, yes, who was raised, who is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us. ³⁵ Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword? ³⁷ No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. ³⁸ For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Our hope is sure and certain because it doesn't depend on our feeble efforts at goodness but on Christ's atoning sacrifice for us on the cross. On the cross Jesus' last human words were "It is finished", or in NT Greek, "tetelestai" which was the word written on business documents or receipts in

New Testament times indicating that a bill had been paid in full. Paid in full – the debt of our sin – paid in full. No more to pay. These are encouraging, life changing words. Looking back over our lives there will be regrets, failures, mistakes, sin too, but in Christ those debts have been dealt with, paid in full, no more to pay. In addition to this Jesus' resurrection is the concrete, physical and outward assurance we have of his supremacy over death. This easter let us thank God for his great love for us, revealed supremely in Jesus' death on the cross in our place and, for the promise of our resurrection from the dead in him, in the new creation to come.





Most merciful God,


who by the death and resurrection of your Son Jesus Christ delivered and saved the world:

I worked for Faringdon Town Council for over 20 years and have been involved in setting up and getting funding for many community activities and sports clubs. I live in the village and wanted to help with getting the Parish Council on a strong footing with a new team. The council have been extremely busy over the last month – a few highlights:

Following a recruitment campaign, we will be carrying out interviews for an **Assistant Clerk and a Village Handy Person and Caretaker** in the next month. We will also be recruiting for a permanent clerk in the summer so if you are interested – watch this space!

We are making several repairs and improvements to the **play equipment**. I hope you notice and enjoy the new marked basketball pitches. Keep an eye out for new signs for the play areas with contact details and to remind users that dogs should not be allowed within the fenced play area.

There have been lots of work going on at **Hoopers Field** too:

- You will have seen the Petanque Court which is almost ready to play!
- We have installed a temporary storage unit following the collapse of the cricket club shed.
- The Council have decided to progress Hoopers Field permanent storage as a matter of urgency this summer.
- We will also be working hard, alongside the sports clubs, to ensure all the repairs and improvements needed at the Hoopers Field Pavillion and Sports Ground are progressed.
- The balcony at the front of the pavilion has already been cleared and this makes a huge improvement for users and sports clubs.
- Fibre Broadband is being installed this month to make the hall more user friendly. Don't forget it is available to hire see www.wanborough.info for details.
- If you have any ideas or questions about Hoopers Field please get in touch.

The **Footpath and Village Maintenance Committee** are planning to walk all the **village footpaths** to create a comprehensive maintenance and improvement list. If you notice anything that needs attendance do let us know.

Your Ridgeway Borough Councillor update from Gary Sumner There is no Ward Surgery in April so please contact me about anything.

Solar Farm: In a very short timescale a 'public consultation event' was hastily arranged for 20th March to show residents a huge 150 acre (35mw) solar farm on farmland between Horpit and the A420 coming very close to Redlands Grove. (Area outlined in red on the map to the right).

They plan to submit a planning application with a view to getting planning consent later this year.

I'm a big fan of renewable energy generation, but there are some serious considerations including the fact that this is 'development' in the 'Area of Non Coalescence' designed to separate the villages from the new development area. The policy is very clear that only certain, small-scale development related to the countryside is permitted. Once someone succeeds or indeed if we support this then that protected area is worthless.

We fought the development at Inlands Farm, in a large part on opposing development in the protected area. Whether you are in favour of renewable energy, it remains a fact that this will (if approved) weaken that protected area.

During the last Local Plan back in 2015 I played a part in representing the village and our concerns and that is why the Amazon building and others are coloured in a certain way. The critical thing was the 'view from the AONB' (now called the National Landscape) which means that when you look down from say the old Black Horse Pub at Callas Hill you see countryside between Wanborough and new development. This proposal would fil in that gap and look like development all the way to the village.

I'll update once a planning application is submitted.

Redlands Grove: I believe the traffic monitoring cameras have now been installed. Nothing to worry about – just monitoring traffic going from Redlands Grove through the village. Once the SCR is open this will undoubtedly go back to expected levels. 20mph speed signs have been put up in the village after I chased. I'm still working on the play areas. Another note is to ask that if residents are walking dogs that they observe the footpath notices. On the other side of Wanborough Road there is a footpath towards The Marsh. A footpath is just that – an A-B route and not a right to roam the field. Concerns have been raised about people roaming the farmland and not cleaning up after dogs nor sticking to the footpath (which we hope at the other end will re-open in he next month or so.

On Monday 17th March, the Leader of the Council, Councillor Jim Robbins, along with fellow Cabinet Members and council officers, told potential investors, businesses and the Government why now is an ideal time to put their money into Swindon.

Taking place at the House of Lords, the investment summit was held to catalyse investment to reinvent Swindon town centre as outlined in the Council's 'Heart of Swindon' vision and saw presentations from representatives from Panattoni, FI Real Estate Management and Business West.

Informed by the expertise and input of partners, including key landowners and developers, as well as local residents, the vision includes plans to deliver up to 8,000 new homes and amenities to support a Swindon population growing much faster than the national average. Before attending the House of Lords event, councillors also visited No. 10 to deliver the vision to the heart of government.

Organisations who spoke about Swindon's potential at the event included:

- Business West: which is working with Network Rail, Homes England, SBC and other partners to create a new commercial and residential district on land next to the town's railway station
- Panattoni: which is investing £918m in Swindon to build new 7.2m sq ft of best-in-class logistics, industrial and data centres on the site of the former Honda factory
- FI Real Estate: which has invested into Newbridge Square, next to Fleming Way, and owns the Brunel Shopping Centre.



King's Award goes to Big Breakfast Plus





The King's Award for Voluntary Service went to a remarkable Swindon charity this year, Big Breakfast Plus. It was founded in 1993 and, like many charities, has had a tough genesis with funding and premises over the years.

It got a boost four years ago when Charlotte Mannion joined and energised it with the support of Sarah Smith and other volunteers from our villages: Stephanie Penfold, Mark Lever, Liz Bone, Christina Rattigan and Nicky Walsh.

I remember when they started in the Pilgrim Centre with seven breakfasts a day from Monday to Friday. Last year they served 25,000 breakfasts and are open all seven days. They deserve the King's Award.

The guests are the homeless of Swindon, and those who live on the edge, compromised by food poverty with little income and a stark choice of outlay: either rent or heat or food.

The guests aren't easily categorised. Every person with their own story is unique. I've interviewed several for previous articles and for the award bid. I've come away chastened and uneasy because I've faced the obvious: that any of us could be a few slippery steps from being in the same situation.

There is an inverted hierarchy here. Those who are guests and those who serve. This was the occasion when the servers, all volunteers, were recognised. They pitch up at 7am, know their positions in the kitchen or the dining area, as listeners and doers. They show open doors and open arms from 7:30am to

They've no expectations except ensuring their guests are warm and well fed.


Then we have the trustees, donors, farmers and retailers, the Pilgrim Centre itself, like a broad spread of the willing. Somewhere in the layers come the cooks as managers, the managers as activators, and Charlotte Mannion as the catalyst. The King's award isn't an easy award to get, "hen's teeth," said the Lord Lieutenant. Only two Wiltshire charities received it this year, so hen's teeth it is.



It was heartening to see Swindon's big names there to recognise it as a special occasion: The Lord Mayor, Councillor Imtiyaz Shaikh, the Lord Lieutenant, Mrs. Sarah Troughton (from Wanborough), Charlotte, I'm in the pink shirt (!), Shirley Ludford, head of FM105.5 and Deputy Lieutenant, and MP Heidi Alexander.

We had tea and cake, listened to the speeches, clapped for the awards, ensured the dignitaries met the guests and heard their stories. And then we drifted back to the streets, some of us lucky to have homes, and cars to get to our homes, and so many guests who went to the gaunt places that only they know about. We'll see them again tomorrow.



The problems of cold hands and cold knees, and the separate comforts of gloves and long johns. Age and birthdays. 70? 80? How was survival to be ensured? Daily cold showers was apparently someone's answer. Dunking in a cold tub in the garden for an interminable five minutes, was another.

They shivered and pulled their anoraks closer. But look, a swimming pool! A tennis court! A leisure centre! That should do it. They tiptoed tentatively along the path of righteousness and uniform and privilege, but the college boys they met were polite and gave no hint of pity. Sixteen years old. Their whole lives ahead. No huffing and puffing up hills for them.

The end was in sight. No, not the end of everything, merely the welcome appearance of the Golf Club and the final hurdle. Would they be allowed in? Were they too scruffy? Was there perhaps a little corner out of the way somewhere, where they could munch quietly and not disturb anyone?

Over there? You mean in the restaurant with that glorious view? That round table with the white cloth and vase of flowers? And already laid for nine people? But we're only having sandwiches, and a couple of pies and some chips. Is that acceptable? It was indeed. They are and chatted and caught up on the details of events of the past winter months. And one of them even had a chocolate mint. A successful day indeed for the ladies and gents who lunch.

Bishopstone and District Gardening Club

In March we had an excellent turnout, lots of new faces as well as old friends, for Helen Browning's talk entitled "Soil, Climate Change and Agroforestry". Helen has been a pioneering farmer all her life and now runs Eastbrook Farm in Bishopstone organically, promoting biodiversity and agroforestry alongside animals and crops.

She has been involved with the Soil Association for forty years, now as Chief Executive. In that capacity she has been involved in advising and lobbying the government and other bodies in a bid to stabilise Climate Change, maintain wildlife, improve food quality and the nation's health.

During her training she became concerned about the way the modern technique of factory farming, cutting down hedges to accommodate large machinery and the use of chemicals were affecting the health and wellbeing of livestock, soil condition and wildlife.

As a result she has become a passionate campaigner for organic farming, animal welfare, and maintaining wildlife habitats all of which work together to promote the vital food chain from the smallest insects upwards. Farming, she explained, when managed organically and embracing all aspects of biodiversity can be a major element in controlling Climate Change: reducing the chemicals used to improve soil condition and fertility, shortening the food chain across the world to reduce emissions and transport costs as well as eating foods in season and increasing our consumption of fruit, vegetables, nuts and pulses will all help to improve our diet.

Another passion of Helen's is Agroforestry which, she explained, can play a large part in all these aspects creating an environment for wildlife, large, small and minute, so important in the balance of nature. Trees not only provide natural habitat to encourage wildlife large and small but also play a vital role in reducing carbon emissions, plus they can produce healthy nutritious crops of nuts.

Following her talk Helen led a lively question/answer session in which we covered numerous topics including solar panels, wind farms, GM/GE foods, government subsidies, rewilding and many more.

Altogether a very informative and thought provoking evening.

Now that with spring just around the corner and, like me, you are all beginning to sow early seeds and clear out shrubberies and borders to let the new growth see its way, give a thought to the **Garden Club ANNUAL PLANT SALE on Saturday 10th May** (not 11th as previously listed!). It is not very far away and one of the main sources of income for the club. So when out tidying and dividing plants and sowing seeds, instead of discarding offshoots, cuttings and seedlings, pot them up to bring along for someone else to enjoy as well as rejuvenating your own.

Plant Spotlight

This month's plant spotlight illuminates 'Forever flowers. The RHS recommend that 'the best type of everlasting flowers should dry naturally on the plant while retaining their colour' and although they won't really last forever you can expect them to look good for at least a couple of years.

Many are available to buy as seeds for spring sowing. When the blooms appear, prepare them by bunching no more than 10 stems together [for good air flow], and remove any unwanted foliage. Then hang them upside down in a dark area at room temperature. Leave for three weeks to fully dry out and then they'll be ready to display. I've mentioned a selection below that you might like to try.

Things to do this month:

- Prune bush and climbing roses
- Plant onions and shallots
- Plant summer flowering bulbs
- Lift and divide overgrown clumps of perennials
- Plant early potatoes
- Mow the lawn on dry days if needed
- Cut back herbaceous perennials and ornamental grasses that have been left standing over winter
- Prune Buddleja to encourage new flowering growth

Circular Walk from Wanborough, including Hinton Parva Coombes (National Trust)

As the weather starts to improve it's great to get out and about and enjoy the lovely countryside we have around us.

Not too far away from Wanborough is the lovely Hinton Parva Coombes, land owned by the National Trust. You can enjoy the Coombes either by walking from the village but if you are looking for a shorter walk then you can park at Hinton Parva Village Hall car park and just walk up the Coombes. Dogs should be kept on a lead while walking up the Coombes.

A nice circular walk from Wanborough is approximately 5 miles.

There are a few hills so it is a more moderate level of walk.

From Calley Arms (Ham Road) turn left up The Hollow. At the top of

the hill enjoy the view across to Liddington Hill. Follow the road to the end where it joins the main road through Foxhill.

Walk along the edge of the main road, be careful as cars do drive fast along this section, walk past The Burj restaurant and continue along the road until you reach The Ridgeway.

Turn right up a short section of The Ridgway and as you reach the top of the hill, turn left down the footpath, back towards the road.

Go straight across the road and follow the footpath, along next to Hill Manor, you will reach a kissing gate and the footpath continues through paddock land. Dogs will need to be kept on a lead through this section as there are a number of horses.



Walk through a gate and enter the Hinton Parva Coombes, there is a seat just on the right that is a great place to stop for a picnic and enjoy the views across the Coombes.

Continue walking along the footpath, down the hill to Hinton Parva Village Hall. When you reach the road turn left up Bodyhorse Hill, as you reach the top of the hill on the right is a metal kissing gate (and farm gate), walk through and down the hill towards a wooden bridge then follow the footpath up to the road. When you reach the road turn left.

As you reach Home Farm on the right, turn down the track / footpath. Go through the wooden gate (stile next to it) down the track to the fields behind. Turn left after the first field and the footpath follows the hedge up to a small wood and brook.

Go over the stile into the fields.

Follow the footpaths across the fields, you will reach a narrow path that follows next to The Plough and comes out on the High Street.

There's plenty of flexibility with this walk, you can start from The Plough and go the other way round or just walk from footpath next to The Plough to the Coombes and then back the same way.

The Coombes is a lovely place, look out for the many wildflowers in the summer months. Happy Walking!







Wanborough "War Book or Defence Scheme"

This final article about the role of WVS volunteers during WW2 looks at Evacuees and Billeting. Unlike the Rest Centres that were prepared and ready for action but not called on these tasks started on 3rd September 1939, the day war was declared.

Evacuees

Possibly the most significant task for WVS, the arrangements for Evacuation and Reception of evacuees, was set out in The Government Evacuation Scheme issued by the Ministry of Health in May 1939. In the Evacuation Areas including London and the major cities WVS assisted with the relocation of nearly four million people while at the Reception Areas WVS arranged to feed and clothe the arrivals travelling by bus and train. Throughout the operation of the scheme the health and welfare of the evacuees had to be met and records maintained so that the whereabouts of each individual was known.

On 3rd September 1939 the Order to evacuate was issued and the well planned arrangements made by WVS with agreed priorities swung into action so when war was declared nearly one and a half million people had been evacuated.

A few days later the North Wilts Herald reported the arrival of the first evacuees at Wanborough. On the second day 50 arrived, 32 children accompanied by 18 mothers and on the third day preparations were made to feed a group of 33 evacuees heading for Liddington and later another group of 26 arrived en route to Liddington. These were unexpected and as they arrived at sunset arrangements were probably hampered by the blackout. Fortunately George Gibbs, the Parish Clerk and Eric Pittard, the village school Headmaster, had checked earlier and Wanborough was able to provide billets with the additional facilities needed for children with mothers. In this initial evacuation just 76 evacuees were billeted, far fewer than the 318 places in Wanborough allocated after the initial survey.

Throughout the evacuation scheme WVS produced many booklets and leaflets dealing with training and guidance for the health and welfare of all evacuees from nursing mothers and infants to the elderly and infirm. The process was not without challenges, volunteers at some Reception Areas were shocked at the "verminous condition of many children" and enuresis caused by the disruption and insecurity became a problem and lead to the leaflet "Information on Bed-wetting for Householders taking Unaccompanied Children".

Efforts were made to meet social and recreational demands and another WVS leaflet was "War Time Play Schemes for Children". On 7th February 1941 the Wiltshire Times reported that the Wanborough, Bishopstone and Hinton Parva branch of the British Legion had raised funds to provide about 120 evacuee and members children with tea, buns and entertainment.

Further evacuations occurred as circumstances demanded, in early 1940 as the invasion of France progressed and again during the Blitz. The evacuation process ended in September 1944.

Billeting.

The War Book shows that the Billeting Officer covering the Wanborough area was based at the Highworth RDC offices in Swindon and the Local Representative was **Eric Russell Pittard**, Headmaster of the Wanborough Council School and Operational Member of the Invasion Committee.

WANBOROUGH THE EVACUEES

Wanborough was con-So far as happened unexpected the cerned during the week-end. A canvass of the village last spring resulted in the offering of places of refuge for 318, of whom 250 approximately were for unaccompanied children. The parish was promised 100 children without parents on the second day of evacuation and 150 "others" on the fourth On the second day 50 "others" d. These were 32 children acarrived. companied by 18 mothers. On the third day a portion of the local helpers were requested to "stand by" to distribute rations to a party emergency evacuees who were to go on to Liddington, but after 51 hours of waiting telephone message was received stating that none would come that day On the evening of the third day and the morning of the fourth, in view of an intimation that no unaccompanied children were likely to arrive, the whole parish (apart from the area near the de-bussing station) was systecanvassed by Messrs. matically Gibbs and E. R. Pittard (billeting offi-Misses Hollis cers) and the Thomas to ascertain how many places were available for mothers and children, as it was readily admitted that householders who could accommodate children might not be able to take them with their mothers. No more arrived for Wanborough, but a small party of 33 were rationed en route for Liddington, and, at about sunset, a still smaller number, also for Liddington. The organisers at Liddington were evidently unprepared for them so late in the day, and Wanborough was asked to take them. This request was at once acceded to, and the very tired travel-lers quickly escorted to their billets, mostly a short distance away. With the 26 thus acquired, the total now accommodated was only 76, and quite a large number of householders have spent many hours in preparing for guests who did not arrive. The officials of the Ministry of Labour engaged the St. Andrew's Hall for an hour on Tuesday and Wednesday to grant monetar assistance to the needy amongst the visitors, and for a time will attend each Tuesday.

Eric was a descendant of several generations of leather dressers, sellers and merchants in the Yeovil area and was born in 1900 at Montacute near Yeovil, Somerset.

In November 1917 Eric enlisted in the Royal Wiltshire Regiment while a student at the County School in Yeovil and was posted to the Royal Flying Corps. He transferred to the RAF as a Pilot Cadet in 1918 but Discharged in February 1919 to his parents


address at Woodside, Yeovil, with his records bluntly noted "Unsuitable for instruction in Aviation". The undated photograph was probably taken in 1918 in his Cadet uniform.

By the early 1920's Eric was working as a Schoolmaster at "T S Mercury" at Hamble, Southampton, one of over thirty training ships created in the nineteenth century offering pre-sea training to boys for the Royal and Merchant Navies His employer was Commander C B Fry, the famous writer, teacher and sportsman who represented England at both cricket and football. In 1924 Eric married Dorothy Harbour at Yeovil. Dorothy was also from Yeovil and the couple spent six years in the area when Eric taught at Queen Camel School. Eric then moved to a school in King's Lynn, Norfolk, and their daughter Rachael Lisbeth Pittard was born in June 1932 at Downham.

Eric became Headmaster of Wanborough Council School in Church Road in 1934 and the family lived at Wynnstay in Kite Hill. In October 1937 Dorothy died aged just 39 after, as reported in the North Wilts Herald, "many months of patiently-born suffering". The funeral was at Yeovil Cemetery and had been arranged by builders and funeral directors Payne and Son of Hillside, close neighbours on Kite Hill. Dorothy, and Eric, must have been held in high esteem as the news report also mentions the four bearers and several attendees were friends from Wanborough with floral tributes from friends, school managers, staff and classes and Wanborough Amateur Dramatic Society.

Following Dorothy's tragic death daughter Rachael stayed at Yeovil in the care of Eric's younger brother Ernest and his wife Elsie. In August 1939 Eric married Hannah Louise

Christie at Swindon. Hannah was born in 1906 at Gorton, Lancashire, but moved at an early age when her father, a fish merchant, retired to Ramsey on the Isle of Man.



The Billeting Scheme ended in March 1946 and the Evacuation Scheme worked in reverse. WVS once again provided escorts for the travellers returning home and also dealt with the problem of people returning to damaged or destroyed houses. At this time WVS was also dealing with the returning demobilised servicemen, many injured and still needing hospital treatment.



Confessions of an Antiques Dealer

No. 17

I was still confined to my tiny flat in Redland, Bristol but venturing out to Bath Antiques Market in Guinea Lane every Wednesday to sell.

Bath was becoming more and more popular as an Antiques hub, especially since the opening of the final section of the M4 linking Bristol and London which was completed at the end of 1971. The Guinea Lane Market in Bath was expanding too; with the first floor opening and many extra stands added. I decided to expand with it; taking a larger stand on my own and parting amicably with Polish Mike who decided to remain on our old stand.

I had to find new buying opportunities as well; I found it hard to keep up with the selling which meant that my stock was dwindling, and the buyers didn't want to keep seeing the same stale stuff. I found it hard to compete in the salerooms, so it was back to Bristol and looking for new contacts to buy from. Several sources became available to me; not always reliable but buying from them there was always the chance of a rare find or a bargain.

Two people that I had first encountered at the end of the 1960's were Rex and Pat his wife; a couple who sourced Antiques on the doorstep. In other words, "Knockers". Rex was a giant of a man, standing 6' 8" tall and with a bulky frame. He loomed over me as he quoted prices, and it was difficult not to be terrorised by him. I had a feeling that he may have had an illustrious past, but I didn't enquire further. I first met this pair when they had a shop in City Road, St. Pauls, but they had just moved to a bigger shop in Midland Road, St. Philips. Every weekday at about 4pm they returned from their "knocking" and sold to a small queue of dealers that were waiting for their return. I was quite often first on their doorstep, but the rules of the queue didn't always apply. Rex preferred to sell first to the old established dealers who had pockets full of cash; he knew that I was new to the game and my pockets contained limited funds.

He'd try me out; if he'd just unloaded a good piece and I was first in the queue he'd bend over me and whisper "Here's your chance, Tony. This bookcase is worth over £1800 but you can own it for £600". Some days I only carried £300 in cash, and this was one of those days. I had to walk away and the regular old established dealer behind me bought it and peeled off the notes. I had to work hard to make my way up the pecking order, but eventually I was able to compete with the others. Rex took a liking to me after a while and set aside a few good pieces that I was able to buy at a good price. He could see that I was struggling to keep up and he helped out. Even though he was a scary man and was known to have a terrible temper, we got on ok. On the other side of town, in North Street, Bedminster was a large double shop run by Jack. A small, cantankerous man who was difficult to like. The first time I went in he shouted out "You won't pull one over on me, I know this game. I once owned five shops on the Portobello Road" I'm sure he did, but I was still able to bag a bargain occasionally from Jack. You had a job in those days keeping up with prices, and I was more abreast of the ups and downs of the trade. Jack was mostly a bullion dealer, so he relied on the precious metal prices and had several sets of scales dotted around his shop. I went on house calls with him occasionally, when he wasn't sure how to price furniture. He was a nightmare in a house, scurrying around and opening drawers and cupboards and shouting out. "I'll give you £50 for all this jewellery". The homeowner was confused and often gave in to him. I was keen to get out of the house as soon as possible and I tried to drag Jack out with me. I turned up at his shop one day. He opened with "So, how much cash have you got on you today". I knew there was trouble coming. "About £200, Jack." "Ok Tony, I'm going to give you the chance to make some real money.

I'll swop you that cash for the contents of my wall safe". Now, Jack's wall safe was large and always stuffed with gold and jewellery but £200 was about all the money I had, and it was a lot of dosh in 1972. So, I turned him down. Jack turned away and said "Right, I'm closing now. You'd better be gone". I never found out if his safe was full or empty, but the next time I went in he sold me a gift of a Camphor Military Chest for £27. £1200 worth! The best example I've ever owned. Then or now. Was that my consolation prize? Or didn't he know its worth? I fell out with Jack a few years later; he had started dealing with a man who had opened a business called Scadlyn just a hundred yards down the road. The man's name was John Palmer, better known as "Goldfinger". One of Bristol's more infamous gangsters. I steered well clear!


