



A letter from the Vicar – July 2025





In Sri Lanka we visited the beautiful Stukas of the landing place of Buddhism in that country at Anuradhapura and mingled with Hindu worshippers as they offered their burning bowls of food to one or more of the gods of Hinduism as they sought blessing and favour. We also passed many Mosques and Churches. It certainly makes you reflect upon your own faith journey. Once home we then watched the gentle and beautiful three-part series 'Pilgrimage'. This programme followed 7 individuals

with a moderate public profile as they followed the ancient pilgrim route of the Camino through the magnificent Alpine landscapes and visited churches, monasteries and charitable foundations established during the past Christian civilisation in those parts. Each person reflected on their own personal faith journey and issues they were grappling with as adults from their upbringings, family history or current experience.

It was a lovely programme but I couldn't help reflecting that there wasn't really any engagement with the nature or being of God or with the issue of if, or how, we can know him. The programme, perhaps naturally, kept strictly to the world view of postmodern western culture which states emphatically that there is no one truth, or no absolute truth, and that everyone's chosen beliefs are equally valid. The Pilgrims were hoping that during the pilgrimage their inner feelings about faith and God would suddenly spark into life and give them a new assurance of the faith they had once known or a new faith if they had none. Rational argument about God and how we can know him was kept out of the final programme by and large. The issue of truth was never raised as probably being too prob-

lematical. The programme did put forward the familiar belief that all religions are but different pathways up the mountain of God. Clearly freedom to believe what you want to believe, within reason, is an essential good. Faith and sets of beliefs can never be, and should never be, forced on anyone. Jesus himself invited people to believe and follow him – their response to his claims was always theirs to decide, as ours is today. But all beliefs about the nature of reality, or God, or the pathway to knowledge and relationship with him cannot all be equally true. Different religions all say very different things about God and the way to know him.

So, as finite beings in our time-space bound world, how can we know what may lie beyond? Is there any way to a sure knowledge of the transcendent? Well, only if that transcendent reality, God, chooses to re-

veal himself to us, in a way we can comprehend. Gloriously this is precisely the claim of the Christian faith. That in Jesus, God became human, revealing God the Father to us and opening the way for us into a personal relationship with him. This is a claim very well worth investigating if you have never seriously done so before. Jesus claimed to be the personal embodiment of the divine in human form and that through faith in him and his death and resurrection, we can come to know God as His precious forgiven children. Wow, what a blessed relief that we have not been left trying to guess and feel our way towards the essential truth of our existence. As Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth and the life" or to Phillip in John 14 "Whoever has seen me has seen the Father." If you would like to know more, try reading one of the Gospels (eg. Luke or John), or come to one of our Sunday services, or speak to me anytime and look out for a midweek course for modern pilgrims which I hope to run this Autumn.

Wanborough "War Book or Defence Scheme"

Summary and Feedback.

The War Book provides a snapshot of life at a turbulent time in the history of Wanborough. Using the Book as a guide this series of articles has looked at the places and key characters who featured in the preparations at the Home Front to counter aerial attack and possible invasion. As May Archer noted in an article in the Lyden in April 2024: "Wanborough was very important to the war effort".

Much of the research is from the Census returns up to 1921. Unfortunately, the 1931 Census for England and Wales was destroyed by fire in 1942 and there was no census in 1941. However, the 1939 Register records details of the entire population. It included less detailed information than a census and was used to issue ID cards and ration books, and later to administer conscription with possible conscripts noted as "HEAVY WORKER"! From 1948 the Register was used by the NHS and entries updated, with change of name, until 1991 when the paper records were discontinued.

residents George is a possible candidate for being the author.

George was born in Swindon and worked at GWR as a Messenger and then became a Telegraphist, but by the turn of the century the family had moved to 2 Burycroft Row and George worked as a Market Gardener. In 1971 George was honoured for 50 years' service as Parish Clerk by a plaque set into a local sarsen stone at Box Hedge, High Street, and was presented with an armchair and writing case. George made a donation for annual awards for outstanding performance at Wanborough Primary School which has been continued by the Parish Council. George died on 27th January 1972 and although the War Book gives no credit to who compiled it, with his knowledge of the arrangements being made through his work as Parish Clerk and his familiarity with parish

The official records show the basic information about the families and where they lived and news reports add the events and matters of concern, but they do not give any insight about the day to day life during a time of heightened tension and increased hardship caused by food shortages.

Thanks to the feedback from the previous articles information about daily life in Wanborough can now be added to the story.

Because of the nature of their work some members of the Committee, the Vicar, the Schoolmaster and the Policeman, were only living at Wanborough for a relatively short time and had no family connections. Examples of the information received are:

The background of Rev. Ernest Milner Swift is recorded in news reports and ecclesiastical records but his wife Dora's niece paints a vivid picture as she recalls: "My father Robert Ivor Jones, younger brother of Dora, emigrated to Argentina after WWI with a job with British Railways. After my father died I was only 9 and we came to the UK in 1946 but coming from Argentina where food was plentiful, food was rationed in the UK and I still have visions of Ernest slicing the loaf of bread very thinly and only giving me one slice! They both seemed to live, by my standards, a very strict life and I still think of living with them as living in Charles Dickens' era."

Similarly, the great grand-daughter of the Schoolmaster Eric Pittard provided news of Eric and Dorothy's daughter Rachael following her parent's death. However the early career of PC George Slater is not known and neither is his life after leaving Wanborough.

Several artefacts have come to light; Colin Hatch has an original photo of the Home Guard taken in front of The Brewers Arms, and a couple of copies of the welcome home card given to the men who

served have been found. Perhaps the most articles, guidance leaflets and even the gas masks from the Hinton family were saved when the loft at The Croft was cleared and saved by Richard Fisher.

It was interesting to learn that these Lyden articles have been cut out and filed in a copy of the Wanborough in Pictures book. Any missed articles can be found in the back issues of The Lyden magazine at the wanborough info website and when all the new information has been added it is hoped that the extended articles will form a section about the Home Front in the story of Wanborough during WW2, and added to sections about:

The Men on the Memorial – details of the five men who lost their lives for our country and are remembered on the memorial plaque in St Andrew's church.

The Bevin Boys – the story of Jack Morse, the only known Bevin Boy from Wanborough.

The Military Landscape – details of the AA Gun Battery and camp at Redlands, the RAF airfield on Wanborough Plain, the Searchlights and the Observation Post on Liddington Hill which acted as an observation post for the AA Battery and control bunker for a Starfish Decoy.

That leaves one section outstanding, the men and women from Wanborough who served and returned. Elizabeth Wilson's book mentions "ninety villagers served in the armed forces during WW2, five did not return", so there are possibly 85 villagers to identify. Unfortunately the WW2 service records are not yet available online so if anyone has any connections with National Archives or knows a way to get this info please get in touch, and if you have any family anecdotes, artefacts or photos please get in touch so we can add to the story of Wanborough during WW2.

Liddington needs your support . . .

I'm hopping mad.

On 10 June, I gave a speech opposing a Bio Station at Commonhead roundabout, between the GW hospital and Liddington village. Gordon Wilson, more grounded than me, gave the technical speech. We had five minutes each to sway the councillors in Swindon Borough Council (SBC). Andrew Popplewell delivered a Parish council letter threatening a judicial review. Gary Sumner was superb, unflappable, to the point.

Despite our efforts, we lost.

I don't mind losing a fair fight, but this wasn't fair. It was contrived to get the approval under the radar. SBC sent out a few letters, we believe to those who opposed it a few years ago. Those letters arrived three days before the hearing. Even so, we got fifty villagers to attend, and we acquitted ourselves well:

Three councillors voted against the motion and asked questions of the planners.

Six councillors never asked a question. Of those, 4 voted for the motion.

Two councillors abstained. They didn't like the application, so sat on their hands to mollify their conscience. They are gutless.

Those who had no notice included the majority of Liddington, Upper Wanborough, Badbury Park and Liden. The Chair and CEO of GW Hospital knew nothing about it.

It was the first foray by Swindon Borough Council into an area of AONB (Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty). It was billed as a "green" win for the council. In fact, it turns out the station will provide 99.9% fossil fuel. We have a new word: *green-washing*.

The Bio Station will be seen from Liddington Hill, the Clump, Liddington Village, Ham Road, Ridgeway Road, by the

church in Upper Wanborough. It'll stand like a carbuncle, as King Charles said elsewhere, and when we go out at dusk, the setting sun will be eclipsed by the light from the Bio Station.

Polluting the skies with artificial light is an abomination. It disrupts circadian rhythms and sleep patterns, negatively affecting human health and increasing risk of diabetes, heart disease etc., a public health concern for Liden and Badbury Park close to the site.

And here's a gem. The architects of GW Hospital changed the plans so the windows in the wards faced the panorama around Liddington Hill. Very soon the patients will have a new view, light pollution from the Bio Station. But there's more . . .

Given the short distance to GW hospital from the Bio Station, a single lorry fire of toxic fumes with the possibility of an explosion of gas could have devastating consequences for nurses, doctors and patients. Imagine an evacuation with only one exit from the hospital, ambulances and cars in gridlock.

We'll be taking all of this to a judicial review.

There's a plaque on Liddington Hill dedicated to nature writers, Richard Jefferies and Alfred Williams. The view from that ancient site will be the Bio Station. Richard Jeffries wrote:

Sweetly the summer air came up to the tumulus, the grass sighed softly, the butterflies went by, sometimes alighting on the green dome. Two thousand years! Stars, ruddy in the vapour of the southern horizon, beamed at midnight through the mystic summer night, which is dusky and yet full of light.

What would he write now?

Three key topics were the focus of the June Parish Council meeting:



- CNG BioGas Planning Application on Purley Road. Cllr Sumner had called this into the Planning Committee on 10 June 25 as the Planning Officer was recommending approval. See additional update below.
- Footpath Working Group. Maurice Spillane provided an update on the work completed so far and a meeting with SBC to discuss future plans. Huge thanks to everyone who is helping clear the verge along Purley Road. It's already looking a lot better.
- Traffic Calming on Purley Road. The next step is for Cllr Sumner to send the data from the existing speed indicators to SBC and ask them to implement their own monitoring devices such that we can make the case for additional calming measures.

CNG BioGas Application Update

More than 50 residents joined the Parish Council and Cllr Sumner at the SBC Civic Offices on 10 June to attend the Planning Committee meeting. The SBC Planning Officer was recommending to "Grant" permission of the application so we knew we had a fight on our hands.

Cllr Sumner, Cllr Wilson and Maurice Spillane presented the case for rejecting the application despite the meeting being a shambles. Some representatives on the Committee did an excellent job and it felt as though we were making progress, until it came to the vote. The application was approved by a majority of one. Given the application is now approved, the only option for us to prevent it happening is to instigate a judicial review. At the time of writing, we are taking external advice and will engage with residents in determining the best way forward. Thank you to everyone who has supported us so far. It really does make a difference.

We haven't forgotten about the Christmas Tree, the Bench on Purley Road that is falling apart or the sign opposite the pub that needs repair. We are a very small Parish Council team and there is a lot going on. If anyone would like to join us to share the load then we'd be delighted.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Wednesday 2 July 2025 at 7.00pm in the Village Hall. Residents are welcome to attend. Your Ridgeway Borough Councillor update from Gary Sumner There is no Ridgeway Ward Surgery in July, but Danny Kruger MP and I will be at Redlands Grove on the 5th July at 12.00 to look at some resident's issues.

Bio Compressed Natural Gas HGV Refuelling Station: On the 10th June I attended Planning Committee to speak against this highly inappropriate application on a greenfield site at the start of Purley Road in Liddington. This is within the 'National Landscape' (formerly known as the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty').

Having worked with residents we brought a very credible 60 residents to the meeting.

At the last minute the Planning Officer of the North Wessex Downs National Landscape Office submitted a highly damning letter of opposition as Swindon Borough Council has a legal duty to 'Conserve or Enhance' land within the area. This was not shared with Planning Members, nor was a letter from the Parish Council threatening a Judicial Review.

I insisted these were relevant and shared so the meeting was paused whilst they were printed and circulated and then after 15 minutes the Head of Planning read out the contents for the benefit of residents and the committee members.

The planning officer said he had considered the alleged 'green benefits' of bio gas as more important than the National Landscape. In my view he used the 'tilted balance' incorrectly. For information the site needs a connection to the gas grid as bio fuel is created elsewhere in the country and fed into the grid. 99% of the gas in the grid is fossil fuel.

I spoke strongly against the proposal, as did the Parish Council and a resident. The committee then considered the application and three of my colleagues tabled a motion to refuse the application. This was not supported by the other members, and they voted to approve.

Sadly, this was passed. The Parish Council have now instructed Planning Agents and are taking advice from a barrister on a Judicial Review.

Coach Tip - Throwing A Boule

Lee is a Pétanque England qualified coach with DBS clearance and many years experience in competition play.

Pétanque can be played by **ALL** ages and physical ability. The technique described is coached for the most reliable outcome. However, players can adapt as there is no rule restriction on throwing a boule, coaching will help along with practice for improvement where the following seems unnatural initially.

Holding The Boule:

With the boule resting in the palm of the hand, try to keep all four fingers together and the thumb resting on the side

(not underneath). When softly gripping the boule you should now be able to turn your hand over so it does not drop to the ground. Please refer to the June article if the boule is too large or heavy, if not possible!



• Swing

Holding the boule palm down, knuckles horizontal at eye level when fully stretched you can now slowly swing back like a pendulum, The wrist bends backwards before descending towards the line you started from.

As the swing goes above eye level the hand should open with the four fingers still together and pointing up to create a backspin. The speed should be natural and physics will want you to let go!

Eyes

When looking at the landing spot when pointing or the

bottom of the target boule when shooting this will keep your head position relatively still, all movement should be in the arm swing.



Ideally you are practicing from a 50cm wide circle, the throwing arm should force that same foot to point where aiming and slightly forward than back foot. A small knee bend will help to secure the feet, the actual rule is both need to be on the ground until the boule stops.

Bishopstone and District Gardening Club

At the meeting in June we welcomed Timothy Walker whose talk was entitled "A Blaze of Glory: Making Your Garden Colourful in Autumn."

Timothy worked at the University of Oxford Botanical Garden & Harcourt Arboretum, firstly as Director, and during his time the OBGHA won 4 gold medals at the Chelsea Flower Show. He is now a lecturer in plant Sciences at Somerville College Oxford, Pembroke College and Hertford College.

Timothy took us on a virtual tour of the world with photos of a host of plants and trees which will thrive here giving an amazing array of colour during the autumn, that season when the leaves change colour and begin to fall. He explained that we are fortunate in our climate that we can grow plants from almost anywhere in the world to enhance the colours in our gardens in the late season and through the winter.

He took us to Japan with its incredible slope of intense colour shown off by the green foliage and the late flowering Fatsia giving nectar for the insects followed by berries for the birds.

Then on to China, through Europe and down to South Africa and another beautiful array of colour and foliage. Across to the American continent and Chile, Mexico, and up the west coast of America where we find the Californian Holly, the plant that inspired the name of Hollywood and hence those famous letters above the town in the forested hillside.

From there to the East Coast and the familiar colours of the Virginia Cornus before heading back to Europe and the Algarve where we find the Arbutus or Strawberry Tree.

Back in Britain we have our own native colourful trees and shrubs including the Hornbeam and Sea Buckthorn.

Timothy is passionate about the variety of plants, their colours of flowers and foliage as well as the variations of texture and shapes which can give contrast and form to enhance our gardens. Autumn need not be a dull time as we have so many options and "Plants that Die Well": those that create striking seed heads and structures to add interest as they become dormant.

His entertaining talk was full of enthusiasm and anecdotes making it a very enjoyable and uplifting evening.




The New Calley Arms did an amazing job serving large quantities of typical festival food, paellas, pizzas, burgers, and hot dogs.

Lyden Magazine – July Issue – Wanborough Primary School

Reception: The focus in term 5 was 'All creatures big and small'. First, we learnt all about dinosaurs and even had a 7-foot dinosaur visit our classroom leaving footprints and a golden egg behind! We created different dinosaur art on the iPads and learnt all about herbivores and carnivores. Next, we learnt about minibeasts. We had a special delivery of some caterpillars that we carefully observed as they went through their life cycle from caterpillars to chrysalis until, finally, emerging as butterflies. It was magical to be able to release them into the wild! We went on our own minibeast hunt around the school and used



our learning to create minibeast fact files. We were also very excited to see three fox cubs emerging from under our classroom (where they had made their home) into the fenced off area of long grass.

Year 1: In Term 5, Conker Class were learning about the UK, finding out the countries that make up the UK and their capital cities. They enjoyed looking at a variety of resources such as maps, atlases and globes to find the UK, and understanding it's place within the world. In English, they looked at narratives and used the classic tale 'The Enormous Turnip' for our writing inspiration. The children eventually ended up inventing and writing their own version of the story; there was everything from an enormous drake, to a cow, an acorn, cake and a dress! It was great to see such creativity from all the children. In Art, we learnt about British land artist Andy Goldsworthy who uses the natural world to create his works. As well as in class, the children produced some lovely homework inspired by his art, and our unit culminated in the children creating their final piece using sand.

Year 2: Last term, Pinecone Class were learning about pirates. We found out about some pirates from history such as Blackbeard and Anne Bonney. We also read some stories about a pirate family called the Jolley-Rogers, and wrote a diary entry from the perspective of one of the main characters in the story. In Art, we learnt how to use clay to make different shapes and we created some gold coins and a parrot. In the final week of the term, we had a Pirate Day where the children and teachers all dressed in pirate clothing and we made pirate hats, necklaces and decorated cakes with a pirate theme. In Science, we learnt about different materials and how they are used. We learnt about their properties and why different materials are used for different purposes. We also looked at materials that are recycled and why recycling is important. What a busy term!

Year 3: In Term 5 we created our unique, beautiful, drip-paintings in the style of Jackson Pollock. Similar to the artist, we also put our canvas (sheet) on the floor and completed different splattering, dripping and flicking techniques to complete our work of art. In History, we learnt all about Egyptians and explored what their day in a life might have been like. We also wrote amazing non-chronological reports all about Ancient Egypt focusing on the mummification process, pyramids and the River Nile.

We also had the fantastic opportunity to go swimming at Dorcan swimming pool as well.

Year 4: Last term in Willow Class, the children began their Design and Technology learning about Ancient Greek vases. The children developed their clay-sculpting skills, focusing on slip and scoring, edging and thumb-gorging. After their skills lessons, the children designed, constructed and painted their own Greek pots illustrated with Ancient Greek mythological creatures. In Science, the children were learning about the digestive system and why it is important to look after your body. The children were able to recognise the body parts in the system and discuss their functions. They completed a touch-discovery lesson, where they felt the small and large intestines, the oesophagus, stomach, liver and the rectum (all parts were made up of different sweets, water or everyday materials). The children were fascinated and grossed out at the same time!

Year 5: Elm Class started their new topic 'The Natural World' which began with sessions exploring the structure of a river. In the following session, the children identified rivers of the UK and wider world, using an atlas to locate the rivers. Once located, the children then identified the source of the river; the towns through which it passed; and the mouth of the river. Towards the end of the term, Year 5 spent a day up at the Coleshill Estate as part of the 'Earth Summit' where the children engaged with a range of activities and workshops about the environment and sustainability. In Science, the children looked at different processes of reproduction in plants and explored the lifecycles of mammals, birds and insects - we even had some caterpillars metamorphosising in the classroom! Our art sessions last term focused on Vincent van Gogh. The children explored Starry Night and recreated it with oil pastels, before creating their own abstract prints. Year 5 participated in weekly swimming lessons at Dorcan Leisure Centre.

Year 6: Term 5 was a busy one for Oak Class as they completed their end of primary school national SATs tests. They worked extremely hard and made everyone at the school very proud. In the wider curriculum, time was spent studying the Maya civilisation and what life was like for these people. Year 6 then designed, made and painted Maya masks from clay. Auditions and preliminary rehearsals started for the end of year musical production.

Debating: Our school debating team, made up of four Year 5 pupils competed in the Blue Kite Trust Debating Competition final at Lethbridge Primary School. The team returned victorious with gold medals after coming in first place.

VE day: To commemorate the 80th Anniversary of Victory in Europe, children dressed in red, white and blue and undertook various activities in their classes.

PTA Disco: The PTA held another very successful disco for KS2 where the draw of sweets and the bar was equal to the dancing!

Music: We listened to Eurovision music from across the ages.

Happy Gardens by Jane Pearson

Months Musings

Clients often ask me for a low maintenance garden scheme and like many of life's dilemma's, there's never just one single solution. But with a little planning and a few simple changes including the following hints and tips, gardening life might get a little easier for you!

In my experience, A garden full of plants and shrubs that are as self-sufficient as possible is the easiest to maintain. It's right back to 'Right plant, right place' principles with less need for watering, pruning, deadheading and weeding. Prioritise what you most enjoy, it could be vegetable gardening or colourful seasonal pots and make the rest of your garden quick to manage with these ideas:

- Swap high maintenance plants like Dahlias and Roses for easy long flowering perennials or evergreen shrubs.
- Use mulch, such as gravel or bark chippings to keep weeds down and retain water.
- Choose reliable plants, look for those with an RHS Award of Garden Merit that suit your gardens soil and aspect.
- Avoid bare patches of soil, fill them with ground cover plants to supress weeds and brighten your borders.
- Lawns are beautiful but can be incredibly labour intensive so you might like to swap or reduce your lawn and embrace a gravel garden full of drought tolerant planting.

A final thought: Large containers dry out more slowly than small ones so go big, plant an interesting shrub or small tree that will stay in the pot all year and surround it with smaller plants or bulbs of seasonal interest.

Plant Spotlight: Four useful evergreen Ground Cover plants that tolerate shade: Pachysandra terminalis (Japanese spurge) forms a dense, evergreen carpet of shiny, serrated leaves, with tiny white flowers in May and June. It provides ground cover under trees and shrubs and does well in dry shade H x S: 25cm x 60cm

Epimediums (also known as barrenwort or bishop's hat) have heart-shaped evergreen leaves and delicate, nodding flowers in spring. They make good ground



cover plants under shrubs or trees in a shady spot. They look lovely planted with hellebores and other spring-flowering plants. For the best results, grow epimediums in dappled shade and cut back to near ground level in late winter to enjoy the spring flowers. H x S: from 30cm x 30cm

Brunnera macrophylla 'Jack Frost' is an attractive evergreen ground cover plant with eye-catching heart-shaped silver foliage with dark green veins. It is perfect for brightening a shady spot. In April and May, it bears pretty blue flowers that look like forget-me-nots and are attractive to bees. Grow in moist, well-drained soil in shade. H x S: 45cm x 60cm

Vinca minor. The pretty flowers of Lesser Periwinkle give a long season of interest under trees. 'Gertrude Jekyll' is a compact variety with pure white flowers and evergreen leaves, ideally for brightening shady areas. Cut back any unwanted shoots in spring to prevent it covering too large an area. Flowers: April to September

The Potting Shed: Things to do in June & July

- Deadhead bedding plants and repeat flowering perennials
- Pick courgettes before they become marrows!
- Start picking tomatoes as they ripen and continue to remove side shoots, feed and water.
- Clear algae, blanket weed and debris from ponds
- Don't worry if your lawn goes brown, it will soon bounce back when we have rain.




