A letter from the Vicar – August 2025




Dear Friends

On 1st June this year a small but not inconsiderable change came into effect in the history of our local Parish Churches. The four churches going back into medieval times were set in their own parishes. In the last century Bishopstone and Hinton Parva were combined into one Parish and then Liddington and Wanborough into one Parish. Then the two parishes were formed into one United Benefice of Lyddington and Wanborough, Bishopstone with Hinton Parva. That came into effect

on 20th March 1997.

On the $\mathbf{1}^{\text{st}}$ of June this year the United Benefice itself became the single Parish of the Wellspring Villages. We have been for some time one community with four church centres, so it is a logical step to formalise this into the legal structures of the Parish. This helps simplify the administration



And where did the name the Wellspring Villages come from you may well ask? It was inspired by the fact that the four villages all formed around sources of fresh pure clean spring water flowing out from under the North Wessex Chalk Downlands. Hence Wellspring Villages. However, wells and springs of water also have spiritual significance within the unfolding Christian

story of God's presence among his people, recorded in the scriptures. For example, Jesus said to the Samaritan women at the well in John 4:14 "those who drink of the water that I will give them will never be thirsty. The water that I will give will become in them a spring of water gushing up to eternal life." This spring of water is a picture of the Holy Spirit imparting God's life-giving presence, peace and power, to all who have put their faith and trust in Jesus Christ.

So, we are now structurally a single Parish with four church centres, all served by one, half-time, Vicar. Challenging? Yes, I know! But to celebrate this step in the history of our church life we are planning a series of a special events of different kinds, over the weekend of 4th and 5th of October.

We would love to see as many people as wished to come to any, or all, of the events. There will be a pilgrim walk around the four churches on the Saturday, with events in each church on route, and a special Harvest Service and Harvest lunch on the Sunday. Please do save the date in your diary and join us as we celebrate a new stage in our life together as the Parish of the Wellspring Villages.

Your interim Parish Clerk, Sally, summarises recent meetings

Annual Meeting of the Parish Council - 19th May 2025

- Chair and Vice Chair Elected: Cllr. Kathy Glanville was elected Chair, and Cllr. Omar Mirza was elected Vice Chair.
- Committee Appointments: Councillors were appointed to key committees including Finance & Policy, Hoopers Field, Footpaths & Allotments, and Staffing.
- **Policy Reviews**: A comprehensive review of council policies and procedures was initiated, including employment, financial, and corporate governance policies.
- Meeting Schedule: Full Council meetings will continue on the fourth Monday of each month at 7pm in the Village Hall.

Annual Parish Assembly - 14th May 2025

- Foxbridge Village Development: Chris Marsh from Pegasus Group provided an update on the planning application for 220 homes and associated infrastructure. Residents raised concerns about road damage and the need for the Southern Connector Road to be completed before further development.
- Community Group Updates:
 - Wanborough Tennis Club reported strong growth, with over 200 members and plans for court resurfacing and new floodlights.
 - Wanborough Toddlers celebrated new leadership and a generous £500 donation from the Old Boilers, which
 funded exciting new toys and equipment.
- **Open Discussion**: Topics included speeding, confusing road layouts at Commonhead roundabout and the importance of community involvement in shaping a 5-year village plan.

Extraordinary Full Council Meeting - 11th June 2025

- Hoopers Field Boiler Replacement: The council agreed to replace the failed boiler at Hoopers Pavillion
- Parish Clerk Recruitment: The Staffing Committee was authorised to progress the recruitment process and make a recommendation to Full Council.

Full Council - 23rd June 2025

- **Village Hall Future**: A working group was formed to explore development options for the Village Hall, including councillors and community representatives.
- Annual Accounts: The 2024–25 internal audit and financial statements were approved.
- Planning: The Council requested an extension and committee review for the proposed solar farm at Mount Pleasant

Farm.

- Speeding Concerns: An initiative to reinstate Community Speed Watch was agreed with community volunteers. Volunteers are needed—please get in touch!
- Wanborough Trails: The Council is exploring ways to enhance walking and cycling routes in partnership with Swindon Borough Council.

Footpaths, Village Maintenance & Allotments – 7th July 2025

- Wildflower Verges: Residents raised concerns about premature verge cutting. The Council will request Swindon Borough Council delay mowing until after seed setting.
- Allotments: A revised interim agreement with Wanborough & Covingham Allotment Society was approved. Discussions with Covingham Parish Council are ongoing to formalise a joint approach.
- Tree Management: A new tree policy was adopted, and quotes will be sought for recommended works. The Council also accepted a commemorative oak tree for WWII's 80th anniversary.
- Play Areas: Repairs are underway at Church Meadow and Lower Rec. Additional guotes are being sought for resurfacing.
- Dog Fouling Consultation: The Council supports the continuation of current dog control measures and will respond to the borough-wide consultation.
- Cycle Event Approved: A Cycle Roadshow will be held at Hoopers Field on Sunday 10th August details below!

Extraordinary Full Council - 7th July 2025

- New Parish Clerk Appointed: The Council unanimously approved the appointment of a new Parish Clerk, following a recommendation from the interview panel. Please watch this space for the full announcement next month!
- Contract Finalisation: The Staffing Committee was delegated authority to finalise and issue the employment contract and job offer.

Liddington Parish Council

The July Parish Council meeting was well attended with approximately 20 residents joining us to discuss our response to the BioGas HGV Refuelling Station planning approval and plans for the verge alongside Purley Road.

BioGas Planning Approval

Our initial legal approach to SBC to try and get them to overturn their decision was unsuccessful. We have therefore instructed our legal team to prepare and submit the Pre-Action Letter for a Judicial Review. At the time of writing, we are waiting for SBC to respond. Thanks to everyone who has been able to donate to our 'fighting fund'. It's been a great team effort from the village and surrounding areas.

Purley Road Verge

The Parish Council is hugely appreciative of the many hours of work that volunteers have put into tidying up the verge alongside Purley Road. It is now safe to walk along away from the road and generally looks much better. The volume of litter being discarded from cars has reduced significantly as well.

The Parish Council received presentations on planting plans and improving the appearance of signage around the village. These were well researched and presented and the Parish Council is supportive of the majority of the ideas put forward. We will be taking these forward with the relevant teams. We have also ordered a bench to replace the one on Purley Road that has lost most of its back.

Farewell to Barbara

One of our Councillors, Barbara Affleck, has resigned from the Parish Council. We would like to take this opportunity to thank her for everything she has done over her time as a councillor. Amongst other things, Barbara was the driving force behind the new platform at the Trig Point and the new play equipment that was installed earlier this year.

Your Ridgeway Borough Councillor update from Gary Sumner Our next Ridgeway Ward Surgery is 9-10am on August 30that Wanborough Village Hall.

Planning application North of Redlands Grove: An application that has continued to rumble on since 2022 has reared its head again. 248 homes (partly within the Area of Non Coalescence again) in land designated as 'Green Infrastructure' and also for sports facilities North of Redlands Grove. They have submitted new documents, but it is still not a great application and one that should be resisted for the reasons above. It also raises the concern of more vehicles and construction traffic using Redlands Way and in turn Wanborough Road. The application reference on SBC's planning portal (search for planning applications) is S/OUT/22/1415. You should email sbcdc@swindon.gov.uk to comment.

Mount Pleasant Solar Farm: This is an application for a 150 acre, 35mw solar farm on farmland and within the 'Area of non Coalescence' and if anyone thinks that covering all of that land with solar panels is good then consider what this does to the area that in policy terms is meant to protect us. Even the applicants acknowledge that it is 'major development'. It will also affect the setting of Earlscourt Manor and mean that all construction traffic has to go via Horpit. Roads/verges: One of our biggest issues is the lack of Swindon Borough doing anything about the safety concerns about white lining of junctions and the cutting of vegetation of sight lines at junctions. Everywhere from Redlands Grove junction to Callas Hill to Hinton Parva, Bishopstone and Liddington, the junctions are awful. I've been raising this constantly and have a motion going to full council on the implications of this lack of care

Liddington: I must sing the praises of Maurice Spillane and a crew of about 25 volunteers who have met with Borough officers for advice and transformed the rural pathway opportunity alongside Purley Road all the way from the village down to Commonhead. I have just secured them 250m of tree planting via SBC from Wiltshire Wildlife trust (for free) as well as another chunk to the allotment site in Wanborough.

Would it be an option to create our own team here in Wanborough to do the same? Email or call me if it's of interest?

An Irish Funeral



My Aunt Margaret died recently, the last of my parents' generation.

Margaret was ninety-eight, a smiley person who'd do anyone a good turn. Months previously, my sister and I had driven to Tipperary to see her. I was keen to know why my father, the eldest son, didn't get the family farm. He never spoke about it and the best we had was speculation. Margaret was my final chance to get to the truth of it. She opened the door, clapping her hands, hugs and greetings, a wonderful little woman, then stood back and said: "Now, tell me, who are you?" End of research. Within days she was in a care home.

Her funeral was three days after her death, typically Irish. My sisters and I went, the mass proceeded with standing and kneeling, sitting and responding to the priest, a ritual comforting in its normality.

Her grandkids gave gifts to remember her: a loaf of bread because every visit started with tea, bread and homemade jam; six eggs from her hens that she gave on the way out, a trophy for country dancing as she and my uncle were Irish champions. Another granddaughter gave the homily, so funny, so many tears. Outside the hearse waited for twenty minutes while we greeted cousins and family and then the burial and off for a drink to celebrate a great life. Laughter, poems, songs, stories. Normal.

I'm telling you this because it's so different to England where there may be a wake, but the family go back to work while the corpse is in a fridge and mourning restarts weeks later.

After forty years in England that still freaks me. It's the single difference between the two cultures, other than the Irish speak several languages and can sing.

I decided at Margaret's funeral that if my English wife predeceases me, she'll not be left freezing in a fridge for weeks. I'll fly her and our friends to Dublin next day and wake her properly among the hundreds of mourners who love her, and we'll party and sing and recite poems and drink and celebrate a great life.

May the old ones greet you with open arms, Those you've loved and lost before. May the emerald hills be your new home, And peace be yours evermore.

May the stars light your way above, As loved ones bid farewell, Memories sweet, like Irish rain, In hearts forever dwell.

Maybe I should check with Fiona first . . . Or maybe it's a wrenching call from the heart that if she predeceases me, I don't want to end up in a bloody fridge!

Every 10 seconds, Samaritans respond to a call for help without judgement or pressure. There's no typical person who calls and no typical problem which is talked about. What matters is how life is making you feel.

Every life lost to suicide is a tragedy and Samaritans vision is that fewer people die by suicide - we hope that by encouraging people to talk about suicidal feelings fewer people will make this choice.

We also know that many people who call us are not suicidal but are at a point where they feel they can't cope, where it all feels too much to handle and there's no one to talk to. Sometimes feelings can become intense and overwhelming, that there's no way out.

This is where Samaritans come in. We offer people the time and space to talk through whatever is troubling them and help to work through what's on their mind. We don't give advice but listen with undivided attention and with empathy, to help people to find their own way forward. When anyone is in crisis, talking to Samaritans may help to make someone feel calmer and more able to get through that moment.

As Gareth, a Samaritans caller, said: 'I don't remember much about that call but what I do know is the person I spoke to showed me a lot of empathy and they didn't judge me...letting me talk and explain how I was feeling. That's what I really needed.'





Lee is a Petanque England qualified coach with DBS clearance and many years experience in competition play.

Petanque can be played by **ALL** ages and physical ability. Playing matches can be daunting even at your own club. We do play a sport, so we score and play with team mates. However, at Wanborough PC it is primarily a social activity, light exercise and an environment to improve wellbeing. With all that in mind some players have really enjoyed playing against other clubs especially those with a similar view to why we all play (for FUN)!

Cotswold League



We have been placed in the lowest Division 3 with four other clubs and have played our first home game against Cheltenham. Three of our 7 players enjoyed the first introduction to competition. Petanque England (PE)

- Open Competitions: Many clubs run competitions without license requirements and at every standard of play, some will have a trophy, charitable donations or cash prizes. Our players have played in the EU25.uk,Sherston tournament and Bath Open, we are still in the Western Shield. The team beat Cricklade but lost to RWB in Round Two. Having then progressed against Cirencester we now wait for the next opposition.
- World Championship Mondial La Marseillaise a Pétanque This is a unique competition held the first July Sunday in Marseille. The 65th running saw a record number of over 4300 triple teams and the first non-French winner Madagascar. One of our members has played 5 times with 10 match wins and 5 defeats!

Year 2: This term we have been learning about simple maps in Geography and we have drawn some sketch maps. We took a walk to Warneage Woods and Hooper's Field so that we could track our route and create our own sketch maps of our journey. We tried to include different physical and human features such as trees, the pond and gates on our maps. In DT, we have been working towards creating a healthy pizza. We have tried different pizza bases and toppings and then designed our own healthy

pizza. We then enjoyed making and taste-testing our creations. We had a great Sports Day and really enjoyed the different races. We have also continued to read and enjoy a range of pirate themed books. We have particularly enjoyed the stories with the Jolley-Rogers family and we even wrote our own story featuring our favourite pirate family! What a fun-filled term we've had!

Year 3: This term in Maple Class we have been learning all about plants in our Science lessons. We have turned white roses into blue roses when investigating how a stem works, and we have grown our own plants. We had the fantastic opportunity for a specialist historyeducation company called 'Portals of the Past' to come in and complete an Egyptian day with us! This meant we could explore new artefacts, investigate different gods and goddesses and dress up as Egyptians and Egyptologists! In DT, we have made our own photo frames and in English we wrote our own Egyptian Cinderella stories



Year 4: This term, the children have been completing some fantastic learning and participating in wonderful events. The class performed brilliantly for their respective houses during Sports Day. The children were competitive, supportive and showed great sportsmanship. For History, the children took part in their Ancient Greek WOW day. They dressed up as Greek gods, goddesses and heroes, and took part in Ancient Greek Olympic events, Greek food-tasting, used the Greek alphabet to write their names and re-enacted Greek battles!

Some of the class performed a small concert for the rest of the class, showcasing their musical talents on the piano, and the whole class completed the Government Multiplication Checker. Finally, in English, the children wrote and published their fantastic Ancient Greek myths!

Year 5: Throughout Term 6, Elm Class continued their topic 'Natural World'. Whereas last term focused on rivers, this term the children have been exploring tectonic plates and how their movements form mountains, earthquakes and tsunamis. As part of their homework, the children have explored different natural disasters since 2000, focusing on earthquakes, tsunamis, volcanic eruptions and floods. In English, the children have been using their learning to write a newspaper report on a tsunami event.

Our Science unit has explored how humans develop and change through their lives - from babies to old age. Our DT sessions, have explored cam mechanisms and how they are used within toys and other everyday items. The children then planned their own toy using a cam mechanism, before building, decorating and evaluating their creation in the final weeks.

Year 6: Term 6 has been an incredibly busy one for Oak class. A fantastic week was spent on our residential in France. We stayed near Poitiers and visited our link school. A highlight of the week was a visit to beautiful La Rochelle. Upon our return, it was straight into rehearsals for our end-of-year production of Shrek. The class worked incredibly hard to learn both their lines and the



choreography for the songs. We also took part in Junior Good Citizen where the class learnt about various topics, such as the importance of mental health; road safety; and online safety. The children took part in various sporting events, such as the Blue Kite Games where some members of the class received gold medals! Finally, to top off a fantastic and busy term, the children visited South Cerney lakes where they did paddle boarding and kayaking to celebrate a brilliant final year at Wanborough Primary School.

Whole School:

Music: We have been broadening our horizons by listening to Caribbean and Latino music going to and from assemblies.

Young Carers – We finished the year with our annual Picnic in the Park. During lunchtime we went to the park behind the village hall where we had a picnic. The Young Carers played on the equipment, had a game of football and burst some bubbles. This year we say goodbye to six Young Carers from Year 6.

Sports Day: We had the perfect weather for Sports Day - dry and warm but not the heat and sun of the previous week. In the morning, Reception and KS1 competed in obstacle races, egg and spoon, sack race and a running race. In the afternoon KS2 competed in the same races plus a relay running race and a long run. The children competed on behalf of their houses – Air, Water, Fire, Earth but at the end of the day it was Water house that came out victorious.

PTA: we have a wonderful PTA who work very hard to raise funds for the fun stuff and, increasingly, the more critical stuff required in the school. At Sports Day they provided a bar and hot drinks plus a second-hand uniform sale. The biggest event of the year is undoubtedly the Summer Fete with loads of different stalls including the popular tombola and adopt-a-teddy plus inflatables and refreshments, not to mention selling tickets for the fantastic rainbow-coloured hampers.

Bishopstone and District Gardening Club

David Cramp has had a lifelong interest in natural history and in particular birds. He has volunteered for the RSPB for over 50 years including serving on the RSPB Council for 5 years until 2018 and acted as Chairman of the RSPB's Gloucestershire Local Group for 23 years until 2023. Also he has given over 550 talks to local clubs and societies. So it was a great pleasure to welcome him as our speaker on a hot July evening to tell us all about "Swifts, Swallows and Martins".

David began by explaining the main differences between the species, which can be a problem as they are mostly seen on the wing and rarely perch. The **Swallows** who fly low over our gardens are found in the countryside and are recognisable by their long trails and blue colouring. The **Sand Martins** are never far from water while the **House** Martins prefer urban areas, both of these flying at medium height. The Swifts, however, are actually a different species, being more closely related to humming birds and fly much higher.

He then showed us photos of their nests, the Swallows and House Martins using mud, while the Sand Martin burrows in soft cliffs and the Swifts, who live, eat, mate and sleep on the wing, only coming to roost on their nest, built out of airborne debris.

He told us about their migration routes, diet, breeding and longevity; the Swift being the largest, spending more time in the nest before fledging and then spending 4 years on the wing before coming to roost for breeding. They also live longest, and have been recorded up to an amazing 21 years old!

This was a very informative and enlightening talk and we can now all watch and identify the fascinating birds when they visit our gardens for those few months in the summer to nest and bring up their young before setting off to far flung places in search of food.



Circular Walk around Wanborough Village

We are spoilt with choice for footpaths to walk around Wanborough but if you are looking for a shortish circular walk then here's a suggestion.

- 1. Starti at Wanborough Village Hall (although you can start at any point on the route).
- Walking up the High Street, just before you get to The Plough, there is a footpath sign on the left, walk along this which follows the edge of The Plough back garden until you reach a kissing gate. Turn left at the kissing gate and follow the edge of the fields (passing over several stiles) until you reach Horpit.
- 3. As you reach the road turn left towards Horpit crossroads.
- 4. At the crossroads turn right along the Wanborough Road path. Before you reach Redlands House, on the left there is a footpath.
- Walk across the field until you reach a stile and small bridge. Head over the stile and along the edge of the brook until you reach the path through HoneyField Farm.
- Walk straight along the path through HoneyField Farm until you get to a gate.
 Walk across the field to a farm track. Turn left and walk to road in The Marsh.
- 7. Cross over the road and head across the field towards Sharpes Farm.
- 8. Walk along the path through Sharpes Farm to Warneage Wood.
- Follow the path through Warneage Woods and along the back of the houses on Kite Hill until you reach Kings Lane. Walk up Kings Lane to Mayfield.

Please note: There is livestock in some of the fields at this time of year so please keep dogs on lead when walking through farmers' fields.



- 10. At the top turn left and walk on the path between 1 & 2 Mayfield that takes you to Kite Hill. Cross over the road carefully and walk up the path next to Wheelwrights.
- 11. Follow the path along the top to Springlines, then to Badgers Close and Lower Rec back to the Village Hall.

May Archer's personal account of World War 2 in Wanborough. (Part 1)

Whilst the country has been celebrating the 80th anniversary of VE Day, I have been thinking a lot about my own experiences during the War and being a nine-year-old child, living in Wanborough, when the War broke out. Whilst lying in bed, I began reminiscing and, with nothing better to do, decided to go street by street and count how many houses there were within the village - 500, most of which were thatched. Not including the extra buildings that were put up to house the soldiers in and around the village, it was one way to pass the morning!

The current Cross Keys was built behind the original Cross Keys (which was built just before the War), the original building was thatched during the War, and the pub kept going throughout. Within the pub there was a bread oven, this was built just before the War and used throughout. We used to go down to my Granny Keen's house down Foxbridge, to have our tea and then perhaps, in the summer, go to the Cross Keys and sit in a separate room to the pub - only for the children - whilst the adults had a drink in the bar.

The aircraftguns were down Stratton Road, when the sirens went off, we would then have to make sure that we went for cover. During one incident, I was wearing my sister's sunglasses and when the guns went off, it made me jump, they fell to the floor, and smashed. I still chuckle about this now, I never admitted it, but I am sure that she knew it was me.

The searchlight field was up at Manor Farm at Fox Hill, and to this day they still call it Searchlight Field. You could see the Searchlight go up and see all the planes flying over and they always used to reckon, they (the planes) would fly over Wanborough Church and straight over to Old Town Church and follow the churches on their way to bomb Coventry. When they bombed Coventry Cathedral, that's what they would say, that they could mark out the churches and follow over the top of them to find their next bombing location.

When we were at school, if the sirens sounded, we would go down King's Lane and sit underneath the verge down there, as the hedge was cut right back, and sit under the trees. Then, later (as the War progressed) when the sirens started, we would run along the road and go into the cellar at The Calley Arms. If there were too many of us, especially when the evacuees came, the older children would be able to go to houses instead of going to the Calley Arms. As there were too many of us to go into the cellar, I used to go to a house in Westview in Aunty Patty Constable's house. She was some relation to my Granny Keen, my mum always used to talk about Aunty Pat Constable.

There was also a thatched cottage that was part of King's Lane, and a lady called Mrs Gale lived there. When her husband went into the army she went to live with her mother and father in the High Street at Ambrose Cottages. She didn't like to stay in the cottage on her own. Houses on King's Lane used to have to go to the top of the Lane to get water from the well because there was no water in the houses at the bottom and now there are ditches on each side of the lane. A lady used to come to our house and see my mum, with a big basin of dripping and ask my mum to give some to Carrie, who was my Granny Keen. She used to wear this old fashioned white bonnet and a big white apron and a black dress underneath. Her husband jumped down the well though and committed suicide but that is where everyone on King's Lane had to get their water. My brother Bob always laughed about her and her bonnet too.

Quite a few men went to War in the village, in the Post Office Mrs Horton had a big board and it had all the names of the different men. There were two Smith brothers (Ken and Bradley) both went in the Navy, Eva Kimbery she went in the WAFs, Gilbert and Bob Kimbery went in the army, Bob Dance went in the Army but he came from Bishopstone but there were quite a lot. We were lucky though and not many died. Aunty Patty's daughter was in the Naffy, and her husband got killed in the War and he is buried up the churchyard. We used to have these dances with the Welcome Home fund round the Village Hall to celebrate the men coming back from the War. Some didn't come back though, as they found wives and moved to various places to be with them, the Kimbery brothers moved up to Leicester.

VE day was a big celebration with activities in the hall and on the playing field, they had a marquee at the bottom of the field as the swings were up at the top of the field in those days. There were four swings for the older and two for the youngsters, but they were always locked up on a Sunday, they were always chained to the side and locked because of Chapel. There was a chapel along the road here, in Rotten Row where the garages are now, and one at the bottom of the Beanlands and one at the School Room.

During the War, Mrs Palmer who lived at College Farm, she used to get the cheese, and several ladies would go along there and make cheese sandwiches for the soldiers that were at the camp. I went with Mrs Higgins once and I had to go up to College Farm and get some more cheese because there were quite a few soldiers there. We had to grate the cheese and then put it in sandwiches but I was afraid of the dog, so I would run along the road to the farm and back as quickly as I could to avoid the dog. There were no lights though so I ran as quick as I could and hoping not to be chased by the dog or fall in the ditch.

My husband, Bob Archer, was a farm hand and all the teenagers on a Sunday used to meet up at the crossroads at the top of Callas Hill. Everyone went to the top of Callas Hill, there was a rail and that is where I met Bob, nowadays some children get into gangs but that was the spot that all the teenagers used to meet up and that's where I met my future husband. In those days, Chaney's bus used to put on a bus to take Wanborough Football Club to their matches in Swindon where they used to play, we all used to go on the bus to watch the football and then meet up at the top of Callas Hill after.

Old Mrs Horton started up Wanborough Carnival and she used to sell tickets, those who sold the most would be the Carnival Queen. I was the queen once when I was 15 towards the end of the War, so I must have sold a lot of tickets. But Elsie Kimbery was a carnival gueen, and they used to sit on a chair on the horse and cart and two of the maids stood at the back of her and two in the front sat facing her. Rupert Ogborn used to bring his horse and cart. He would decorate it all up with flowers all along the wood at the back. They used to put lots of bunches of flowers around the top.

This stopped during the War though but started again at the end as a celebration. Mary Stratford and a Hewer girl were also queens and my sister Phil she was also a Carnival Queen and one of the maids was Elsie Gills, my hairdresser Judy's mother, she later became a Kimber.

There were a lot of soldiers at the camp. There were huts, where the first two cottages are now, just as you go past the allotments, and the gun fixers were there. Further down, there was a little cottage which the Warren's got and that was a farm cottage. Foxbridge was across the field and there were several huts down there because when the War ended and there was a shortage of houses, the council took those over and made Warneage Green. Most of the people from the Camp went into and lived at Warneage Green.

Yes it was, and no it wasn't. Same walk, but parched and cracking ground. Hard ridges fit to break an ankle, so plenty of opportunities for complaining, if the mood took them. But sunshine changes things and a happy brood in tee-shirts and sun hats, awaited instructions in the car park. Not a long walk, apparently, though as there were several men in the group now, a longer option would be offered halfway through in case the men were feeling unchallenged by the strolling pace of Ladies Who Chatter.

In fact there were several opportunities for the men to prove themselves: stiles to stand by with the offer of helping hands, gates to hold open, and of course shouts to be shouted when dawdlers threatened to be late for the lunch at the pub.

Those metal gates had a message anyway: not kissing gates as much as squashing ones. Do not eat puddings ever again, or you will be too fat to get through. And bare legs on a hot day? Remember: nettles love to sting you. It hurts.

Hurting and health, the evergreen topics of conversation. New knees, new stents, new problems with an ear, with a headache, with a kidney, (can a bad arm really compete with that?) and some very pretty patterns in front of the eyes. They can run an organ recital forever, they find. Then the other welcome perennials: house selling, holidays and grandchildren. Trips to two sorts of the frozen north: Norway and Yorkshire, and the number of jumpers packed. A tale of a narrowly -averted catastrophe in a shower in Devon. And the way that Australia never seems to get any nearer.




Happy Gardens by Jane Pearson

Mid-summer is always a busy time for us all, both in and out of the garden. So, I'm keeping things short in this month's musings. I hope you're all enjoying the beautiful weather, but personally, a little rain would be appreciated!

Brighten up a shady spot.

Last month I mentioned a few of my favourite evergreen ground cover plants for awkward shady spots. We are following on the theme this month, with plants that brighten up and or add interest to your shady border, a patch under a tree, a north facing wall or a dark corner surrounded by buildings.

If you want to introduce a degree of privacy or sense of





Some early flowering summer plants can look a little sad at this time of year with sprawling foliage, fading flowers, and flopping stems and even some mildew. They've worked hard and need some tender loving care. If you missed The 'Chelsea Chop' back in May, it's not too late to cut certain perennials back. They will reward you with fresh new growth and maybe a second flush of late flowers.

Plants such as Salvia, Nepeta, Alchemilla, some hardy geraniums, Centaurea, Delphiniums and Lupins can be cut-back to just above ground level. After their chop, water well and feed with a granular fertiliser or liquid seaweed, and you'll be rewarded with fresh foliage within a couple of weeks. You might like to stagger the cut back to avoid losing all the growth at once and seeing too many bare patches.







Grow your own plants

Take shrub cuttings of Hydrangea, deutzia, weigela, philadelphus and buddleja. For best success I like to take my cuttings first thing in the morning.

- Choose nonflowering stems with 4-5 sets of leaves and pop into a plastic bag straight after cutting to preserve their
- Trim the cutting 5-7cm below a leaf joint and remove the lower leaves.
- Insert into small pots of compost with at least 25% vermiculite or perlite mixed, this improves drainage and cover with a polythene bag or mist regularly with a water spray bottle.
- Just give them moisture, humidity and not too much heat in a shaded greenhouse or north-facing windowsill out of direct sunlight and they should root within 4-6 weeks.




