


A letter from the Vicar – September 2025




Dear Friends

So, we are now structurally a single Parish with four church centres, with the aim of developing times of worship, learning, fellowship, prayer and service, each week, for all the residents of our villages, which are accessible, friendly, welcoming, thought provoking and deeply rooted in the



We extend a very warm welcome to everyone who would like to join us. Come to some, or all, of these celebration events. We would love to see as many of you as possible, whether you come to Sunday worship regularly, or have never attended a service at all. You are all very welcome. There will be The Wellspring Pilgrim Walk around the four churches on the Saturday. This walk, starting at 9.30am at St. Andrew's Wanborough, on the Saturday, will finish there at around 4pm. The distance in total is around 11 miles (4.5 hours of walking) and is a beautiful, varied walk, through stunning countryside, while visiting each of the four Grade 1 listed historic churches on the way. On the Sunday we will gather at 10.30am at All Saints, Liddington for the Wellspring Villages Harvest Celebration Service. Do bring items to donate if you wish.

After the service at 12.30pm at Wanborough Village Hall, there will be a 'Bring and Share' Harvest Lunch. Here we will round off the weekend with cake and bubbly in the traditional way and a ceremony to mark this new chapter in our life together. All Welcome.

Wanborough Parish Council

Over the past month, Wanborough Parish Council has held a full council meeting, an extraordinary meeting, and several committee meetings focused on staffing, facilities, planning, and village maintenance. Below is a summary of the key updates for residents.

Solar Farm Application at Mount Pleasant - Council Objects

The Council has submitted a formal objection to the planning application for a new solar farm on greenfield land near Horpit Lane. Key reasons include:

- · Loss of open countryside
- · Visual impact and potential noise
- · Concerns around access, traffic, and decommissioning
- Lack of community benefits

The application has been requested for referral to Swindon Borough Council's Planning Committee.

Village Maintenance and Play Areas

At the Footpaths, Village Maintenance and Allotments Committee meeting on 7 July, councillors discussed a range of ongoing issues:

- Wildflower preservation: A resident request was received asking SBC to delay verge cutting to allow flowers to seed. The Council agreed to contact SBC's Highways Team and copy in Ward Cllr. Sumner.
- Encroaching hedges and fences: Residents are reminded to ensure that vegetation does not block pavements or public paths.
- Play surface at Lower Rec: One quote has been obtained so far for resurfacing. Two further quotes will be sought, and a final decision made at Full Council.
- Church Meadow: The broken gate at the bottom of the park will be removed, and minor repairs made to the trampoline and basketball hoop.

Allotments and Partnership Review

At the same meeting, representatives from Wanborough and Covingham Allotment Society (WCAS) and Covingham Parish Council (CPC) discussed partnership arrangements. It was agreed that:

- An interim agreement will continue between WCAS and WPC
- A joint agreement with CPC will be drafted for future consideration
- Warning letters, risk assessments, and expenditure for ground maintenance (e.g., tarpaulin for unused plots) were approved

Tree Management and Commemorative Planting

A tree survey was reviewed, and the Council resolved to seek quotes for recommended works. A new Tree Management Policy was also adopted. The Council accepted the offer of an 80th Anniversary WWII commemorative oak tree, subject to identifying a suitable planting location.

Wanborough Trails and Active Travel Promotion

The Council is looking to support walking and cycling initiatives in the parish, including:

- · Featuring monthly "photographed walks" in Lyden Magazine
- Supporting a bike event at Hooper's Field on Sunday 10 August with a "bike doctor", free security marking, maps and giveaways, and a led community ride.

Staffing Update - Clerk Resignation and Recruitment Plans

The Parish Council is moving quickly to recruit a new Clerk following a recent vacancy. A focused recruitment campaign is underway until 27 August, with interviews planned promptly to ensure the right person is in post as soon as possible.

In the meantime, experienced interim Sally Thurston will provide mentoring, support, and financial duties, and new software will be introduced to streamline administration. These measures will keep council business running smoothly while we complete the recruitment process.

Hooper's Field Sports Pavilion - Club Reports and Improvements

- The Hooper's Field Committee met on 14 July to hear updates from local sports clubs:
- Tennis Club: Busy summer programme; grant application in progress; repainting and floodlight projects delayed due to costs
- Cricket Club: 1st and 2nd teams doing well; under-13s active; field needs improvement grant applications for pitch upgrades being explored

- Football Club: New season expected to field 18 teams; exploring pitch preservation through rotation
- Bowls Club: Planters praised; requested defibrillator training; mobile/wifi signal remains an issue

It was agreed to:

- Undertake health & safety upgrades, including actions from a CHUBB fire inspection (£942.01)
- Seek quotes for deep cleaning, descaling of showers, and general improvements
- Review options for coded access and key management

Policy & Finance Committee - Budget Oversight and Resourcing

The Policy & Finance Committee met on 23 July to review Q1 finances and staffing matters:

- Quarterly accounts were noted
- Cllr. John Warr appointed to carry out internal finance checks
- Hooper's Field cleaning was discussed; current provision was found to be insufficient. A deep clean will be commissioned, and costs reviewed for ongoing increased provision
- Footpath maintenance will be outsourced temporarily, with AllBuild approached for a quote
- Tackling vehicle speeding remains a priority. Options including new or repositioned Speed Indicator Devices (SIDs) will be explored
- A recommendation to allocate £10,000 toward the cricket nets project was made, subject to final approval

Borough Consultation on Dog Fouling

The Council submitted a response in support of Swindon Borough Council's current dog fouling and exclusion from children's play areas policy, which is up for renewal.

Wanborough Cricket Club Nets Project - Update August 2025

Cricket Nets - Parish Council Considering Funding Support

The Parish Council recognises the important role local sport plays in community wellbeing and youth engagement so they are actively considering a proposal to help Wanborough Cricket Club install new cricket nets at Hooper's Field.

Thanks to successful fundraising efforts, the Council has already secured £20,045 in external grant funding. The club has also raised £250 locally and gained an additional £2,500 grant, bringing the total secured so far to £22,795.

With the total project cost at around £32,700, there remains a funding gap of approximately £10,000. The Council is being asked to provide this contribution so the project can go ahead in full.

An earlier decision made in July could not be confirmed due to a publication timing issue. The proposal was therefore discussed again at an extraordinary meeting on 13 August, where councillors agreed to hold a dedicated meeting to give the project full consideration. Updated quotes will also be reviewed to ensure the best value for the community.

Liddington Parish Council

There was no Parish Council meeting in August but there are a few things to update residents on.

BioGas Planning Approval



On 10 July 2025, Liddington Parish Council (LPC) served notice to Swindon Borough Council (SBC) of a Judicial Review into the BioGas Planning Approval by sending them a pre-action letter that we had our legal counsel prepare. The cost of this was covered between LPC and residents through a Go Fund Me campaign. LPC would like to thank all those residents who donated.

On 24 July 2025, SBC responded to our letter, challenging our arguments for a Judicial Review and forcing us to take the next step which would be to apply for a judge to review our case. From this point we would become liable for SBC's costs as well as our own should we lose our case. LPC took legal advice and decided that on balance, we couldn't be sufficiently confident of winning to take this next step. Success would likely come down to the judge we were assigned and whether they believed SBC or LPC had the stronger case. Given the cost implications for a small Parish Council should we lose, we decided we couldn't take the risk.

Whilst this is very disappointing given the approval decision still stands, we hope that SBC will recognise that future planning processes need to be much more collaborative and engage local residents and the Parish Council as part of the assessment process.

Thanks again to everyone who supported us through what has been a very painful process.

Marion Warren

It was sad news to hear that Marion Warren, a stalwart of our village, Liddington, died on Thursday 10th July at the age of 92. Her husband, Ben Warren, ran the farm in Purley Rd.

She was greatly involved in moving Liddington forward through her many years on Liddington Parish Council, All Saints Parochial Church Council and as a leading governor of Wanborough Primary School. She was also a Justice of the Peace.

Marion became a Liddington Parish Councillor in May 1984 and went on to become Chairman for 9 years from 2000 to 2009 which were key years in making Liddington a lovely place to live. To celebrate the 2000 Millenium year there were a number of village events, in particular a flower festival in All Saints Church, the twinning with Lyddington Rutland when a large group of us went over to Rutland for a special event in April 2000 with a return visit to our village in 2001, a Millenium Party for village children and a special historical exhibition about Liddington held in the Village Hall, December 2000, with a collection of items from the Trowbridge records office.

Work also started on the large embroidered Millenium village map on display in the Village Hall and the planning of the Millenium Viewing Table and Platform located at the Liddington Castle trig point, both opened in June 2006 by Lord and Lady Joffe. During her term as Chairman the old milestone on Purley Road was restored and the new children's play park was planned and constructed.

Marion was also devoted to the fundraising for the new Village Hall opened in March 1994 by The Duke of Marlborough and also for the new set of Bells for All Saints Church Tower dedicated by the Bishop of Bristol in October 2016. These now ring out on a regular basis.

Marion certainly worked hard for Liddington. She organised monthly trips for villagers to various destinations and with Kaye Archer and a band of helpers also planted a large range of daffodil bulbs around the village which continue to provide a lovely spring floral display.







Her funeral was held at All Saints Church, Liddington on 13th August. Our thoughts are with Ben, Alison, Nigel and Marion's grandsons, granddaughter and three great grandchildren.

Your Ridgeway Borough Councillor update from Gary Sumner Our next Ridgeway Ward Surgery is 9-10am 27th September at Wanborough Village Hall.

New Eastern Villages Schools: I had an update from the Chief Executive of Swindon Borough Council that she has received a reply from the Department of Education about the paused 'Free Schools Programme' which was approved to deliver a 3,000 pupil secondary school at Great Stall East (to serve the whole of the NEV) and primary schools at Redlands Grove and Lotmead. This was paused in the spending review and the DofE have said that at this time it remains paused, pending prioritisation based on demand/need.

Clearly without any schools the whole 9,300 home project has a big question mark over where it goes next and I know that Redlands Grove residents are really upset about the lack of a primary school. I'll keep chasing for updates and have asked our MP Danny Kruger.

Local Plan: A new 'Regulation 18' consultation on the Draft Local Plan is to be published on the 1st September for a 6-week public consultation.

In our area there are no new sites of concern, although as mentioned above, the overall NEV number is now 9,300 and although not part of the consultation, there are several sites where they propose to encroach on the Area of Non-Coalescence.

What can you do? The Local Plan Consultation isn't live as writing this before I head off to sunny Devon, so I'll publish online and in the October issue as it will still be live then.

Why comment? Well, we should be asking that 'greater protection' is given to the Area of Non-Coalescence to make it really effective. We should also be concerned about the council's plans for 5000+ homes in the Town Centre. Whilst a laudable ambition, there is no viability which means that developers come back to pick off additional housing in 'viable land' i.e. Around the NEV.

Southern Connector Road: Works will start into the end of summer/autumn to reinstate the compound on Pack Hill (no road closures) to implement the remedial works that Buckingham Group did badly before they went into administration. The plan is to get it open to construction traffic spring 2026 and public by August 2026. They still have funds left from the original project.

Roads/verges: Ironically after raising at Full Council at SB about safety on our rural junctions I was amazed to see that the Foxhill crossroads was re-lined and that Callas Hill had some preparatory markings.

This year it has been primarily the lack of rain since early spring, and several heatwaves resulting in rock hard ground, brown lawns and large cracks appearing. Countless hours spent with watering cans and hosepipes to keep things alive, and now a hosepipe ban!

However I have also noticed it is the 'Year of the Ladybird', hundreds of them have along with their larvae, set to work to devour the aphids and keep the crops clean.

I have found them everywhere, even making friends with a slug, albeit a ceramic one! Well done little beetles and welcome to my garden.

Wanborough Petanque Club (Wanborough PC)

Coach Tip - Practice ideas with basic or no equipment

Petanque can be played by ALL ages and physical ability. At Wanborough PC it is primarily a FUN social activity, light exercise and an environment to improve wellbeing.

Lee is a Petanque England qualified coach with DBS clearance and many years experience in competition play.

Some ideas when starting out and maybe want to practice the techniques explained at our free Introduction sessions.

In a Triples team we normally have a pointer and shooter plus the middle (Milleau). In both Singles and Doubles knowing how to shoot is useful tactically, to both defend and score as an alternative to point nearest to the jack.

Warm Up

Stretching and loosening from head to fingers/toes. Swinging your arms with a boule but not releasing. Bending your knees if possible, even walking to the practice area with arms swinging will help as well as will some deeper breaths.

Pointing

So holding the first boule picked up, hopefully palm down with fingers only (thumb resting on side) throw to land at a particular spot. After all three have landed close, return from the other end and land a metre further away. Next use a jack at about 6.5 metres away, if no circle/jack use your bag and a stick. Land in front of jack but only award a point if you do not roll past it. Change the height to adjust distance and try to improve each throw, but pick up just one boule and reset feet position each time.

Shooting

Starting at 6.5 metres place a boule and try to hit it with a looping action landing just in front of target. When both boules thrown, place again at 6.5 metres and keep going both directions until you have hit twice. Next session record how many you hit without a miss!

Now place one boule directly behind with a 10cm gap, throw over the first and hit the boule behind. Count how many attempts to hit the boule behind cleanly. Next time hopefully will be the first time. For any progression on all exercises you can increase distance up to maximum 10.5 metres away but most shots normally are between 7m and 8m in matches. If you need a loop in throw when going over top of target_release later, maybe place a piece of wood in front.

May Archer's personal account of World War 2 in Wanborough (Part 2)

The searchlights were manned by the army, and the field by The Hollow was shut off as that was the airfield where they trained the gliders. There was always a couple of airplanes there that would take up the gliders and would return with the tow rope hanging down after they had released the glider. At that time, at The Grange, that belonged to the Hintons. They used to let it out to a man who was a major in the air force. He used to fly this plane and if he was coming home for tea he would fly low over the houses once but if he wasn't and wasgoing out over Germany, he would come over twice so that his wife would know that he wasn't coming home for tea. There was no fences or trees or anything, you could see her running out with a tablecloth to show that she was looking out for him.

The Miles family used to live up at Kite Hill farm, he never used to work, and their son Jessie Miles worked at the Great Western Railway and they had a donkey. If we got up there at 9am on a Saturday then he would give us a donkey ride for an hour, we used to go up most Saturdays to try and get a ride.

My mum Polly Wallace belonged to the Mother's Union, and they used to knit gloves and socks for the troops, and we used to knit these cuffs. Mum was only really good at knitting dish cloths on four needles, but they used to knit cuffs to cover their wrists that they could put underneath the gloves and sleeves. The army used to give them this khaki wool to do it or Air Force blue ones. She also used to knit balaclavas, I then used to knit them for my boys too after the War, and that was all done on four needles. We used to get terrible winters so it was important that as many gloves, socks and cuffs were knitted as possible.


My Granny Keen died on 8 February 1940 and Grampy Keen died on 15 March 1940, Grampy Keen had been in hospital and Granny Keen died at home, it was all icy, frosty and snow and that. They had to take Granny Keen from Foxbridge to Wanborough Road in a dung cart because it was so icy to stop the horses from getting injured, before she could be taken up the church.

There was a Home Guard in Wanborough and there was a picture outside of the Brewers of the Home Guard, with two little faces looking out of the bedroom window. Those faces were Pam Smith and Maureen Crawford who were cousins, and they were looking out the window when the picture was taken. It is in Elizabeth Wilson's Wanborough book that I have full of pictures of Wanborough. We had a fire brigade that was based out of the blacksmith shop in Upper Wanborough, up where the bus stop is now. In those days we used to have a Bristol bus when the Chaney's bus would go into the railworks factory at 7am in the morning and would, then on its way back, pick up the children from Coate Water to bring them to school. After Rimes' took it on, they used to pick up children from Nythe and Stratton too.

My dad fought during WW1, he was a lorry driver, and during WW2 he worked for Bradley's as a lorry driver, but he did join the home guard towards the end. Once the soldiers moved out of the camp at the end of the War, a lot of Italian Prisoners of War moved in, they were able to walk around the village and Glynnis Hatch, who lived at Hinton Parva, even married one of them. There were various people who we went to school with, but I can't remember all their names, but he was a window cleaner in Swindon (isn't it stupid how I can't remember their names?).

Heft school at 14, I used to wear a hair net. I used to put dinky curls in my hair to try and curl it under and it once hooked up on Reg Coward's tin lunchbox and for the rest of the lesson, I had to sit with a crooked neck with my hair attached to the lunchbox. I couldn't move my head because of the damn hair net! When they started the school dinners up at school, they used to come up with urns and a little oven they used put it outside of the school gate. Then the form would come and put the urn on a trolley, wheel it across the playground and take it to the classroom. The food would come from a school in Swindon; we had to make sure that all of the classroom was clean before the food could be taken to the next room. After the War, they brought up a big hut from the field and they used it as a dining room so all the kids could be in one room - this happened in 1945. There used to be a sentry box on the end where the horses are at Fox Hill now, at those stables, and lots of mushrooms used to grow there. We used to get up there really early in the morning before the sentry got there else they would tell us off for stealing the mushrooms.

These are just some of the tales that I can remember today, but I will think of some more and make sure that they are written down too. I can't believe that I have spoken for 45 minutes "good god" were my exact words when I was told! Sorry that I can't remember all the names of the people.

There was great excitement that the Thatcher was coming, the same jubilation that you'd associate with a pop star. The women got a bit giddy, the men chuckled, nice to see a bit of life there yet.

It was like a Rock 'n Roll gig in the '60s when hysterical teenager girls threw underwear on to the stage. I often wondered where they are now, those grannies. Alive and well, it seems.

Between the end of the "Chatterley" ban and the Beatles' first LP

Thatching is totally manual, months from start to finish using old tools as described in the poem. Gary Martin created a work of art. You'll see examples of his wonderful work in all the villages around Wiltshire.

We were also hopeful that his apprentice, Aidan, makes a good life as a thatcher, carries that trade to another generation.

The women, they framed this photo, taken from a bedroom window and gave it to him. When he left, the village went back to itself.



The miracle was he came at all booked out for years on end, our high expectations marred then suddenly the truck appeared, the yellow sheaves his calling card.

Next day, the scaffold and ladders, tools as if from an old shrink's satchel, the wonder in the rustic plage of reeds and batons until the roof is a snug overcoat over the old cottage.

We watched in awe those several months, cased the sky for clement weather for the thatcher, to say it'll be dry, the women watching as he watched them from his eerie, exalted as the red kite.

There's no nod to the modern here just layer upon layer of wheat straw hand-pinned, split hazel and willow sticks, knit one purl one to trap the air bubbles in a set that began with last year's ricks.

Then the last days, wisps around each rod until the ridge board, adorned by a necklace in perfect proportions, the tighter shave to trim and shape before the encasement, the sweep of straw and he's gone next day.
